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CIRCUIT COURT.

Tomlinson Wins Injunction Suit--Mismated Couples Divorced.

The injunction suit of J. P. Tomlinson vs. Andrew and John Zuercher created a good deal of interest in the circuit court last week, which was tried before Judge R. P. Boise, who rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff with costs, the decree enjoined and restrained the defendants from in anywise molesting or injuring or removing the dock upon the lands of plaintiff.

Sarah F. Smith secured a divorce from her husband, Allen N. Smith, on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment and that the plaintiff's life was made burdensome by the defendant.

The case of John K. Lester vs. Frank S. Fairhurst was a suit to elicit deed. On motion of defendant the order of continuance was opened up for the purpose of hearing the application of defendant for a change of venue to Baker County, which was overruled and the case continued to the second week in October.

Mrs. Bertha Nodine sued for a divorce from her husband, John Nodine, and the complaint stated that for a long time prior to the commencement of the suit the defendant had failed, refused and neglected to provide for the plaintiff; that defendant was of a sullen, remorse and passionate nature; and that he would frequently get mad, strike and beat his wife, the children having to interfere to save her from receiving a severe beating, etc. Defendant abandoned his wife in 1897. The court granted a divorce.

R. D. Peckham vs. Charles L. Chatterton and others was a foreclosure suit. It being shown that the defendant owed plaintiff \$400 with interest, a decree was entered foreclosing the mortgage.

In the matter of R. D. Peckham vs. the Wilson River Boom Road and Improvement Company, Claude Thayer, receiver, filed his report, and it was ordered that all parties interested have twenty days in which to file objections.

Otto Johnson vs. James F. Tomlinson was a case to quiet title, and the conclusion of the court was that plaintiff was entitled to a decree and adjudged that defendant had no estate or interest whatever in or to the same.

Mrs. Jane Conklin secured a divorce from her husband, Andrew Conklin, who abandoned her on April 18, 1898.

For compensation as bailiffs at the circuit court, it was ordered that warrants be drawn in favor of C. N. Drew for \$12 and A. D. Sanders for \$3.
