EDITORIAL NOTES.

According to reports the Chinese empress has been deposed, poisoned, driven insane, restored to life and is now again in power. Wonder if there is such a person as the empress, and if there is such a place as Peking ?

The country press of Oregon appear to be unanimously agreed upon one subject. It is opposed to the state legislators appointing H. W. Corbett United States Senator. In view of this fact, it is probable that the senators and representatives will vote in opposition to the will of the people, for the opinion thus expressed is only the sentiment of the people.

The Indianapolis News says that while we recognize the weakness and inconsistency of Mr. McKinley, we are decidedly of the opinion that the welfare of the country will be safer in the hands of Mr. McKinley and the republican party than in the hands of Mr. Bryan and the aggregation of parties of unrest and reaction now supporting him.

E. A. Clark, manager of the Sioux City exchange of the Iowa Telephone company, is the inventor and patentee of an automatic switchboard which will do away with the necessity of central offices and the announcement, is made that the Clark Automatic Switchboard company has been incorporated at Providence, R.I., with a capital of \$1,500,000, for the manufacture of the switchboards. This invention is declared to be one of the most important improvements ever devised in connection with the great facilities of the country. Under the workings of the automatic switchboard the telephone user makes his own connection and there will be no more "Hello" girls.

However much the United States may be inclined to avoid a declaration of war with China, this country had not the provocation and outrage heaped upon it at the time of the Cuban crisis as is now in the China crisis. If the United States is to be recognized as one of the leading nations of the world, it must resent barbarous insults upon Americans. China has insulted the representatives of the United States, and instead of paralyzing that country, let the government of this country adhere strictly to international law. There is, however, confidence in the republican administration seeing that the honor of the country is upheld, and should the United States be compelled to return the Chinese minister his credentials and declare war upon China, it will not do so without just cause.

From the summary of Missouri's productions for 1899, prepared by the Labor bureau of that state, it appears that the total number of pounds of poultry, live and dressed, shipped from Missouri's 114 counties in 1899, as reported from the railroad and express companies, were 106,988,710, an increase of 36,907,443 pounds over the preceding year, while the total number of dozens of eggs shipped last year were 34,875,040, and the aggregate value to the producers of poultry and eggs was \$12,091,048.54. Commenting on this exhibit the St. Louis Republic, which, in its zeal for the Bryanite cause has been denying the advent of prosperity, says: "If the present rate of increase continues for ten years, at the end of that time the poultry industry will rival the total output of all our mines." If people have to be shown in Missouri, the hens and roosters are enlisted for the work of convincing them that they are sharing in the benefits of restored good times.

The new charter of the city of Havana will go into effect in a few days and will afford a test of the ability of the Cubans to govern themselves. If it is successful the administration will have but little difficulty in carrying out President McKinley's expressed plan and policy of giving the Cubans complete local self-government as soon as they show their ability to govern. Under the new charter the native Cubans are given remarkably liberal powers. The members of the council and all of the city officials are Cubans and the council has powers fully as large as those which fall to similar bodies in American cities.

Among the powers fully in the hands of the council is the right to grant franchises and concessions. With the influx of American capital and enterprise there will be applications galore for franchises and concessions. Under the old Spanish rule concessions and franchises were sources of great corruption. Even in American cities the question of franchises is a source of frequent scandal. If the Cubans show themselves capable of managing this feature of their new power with satisfaction their capability for self-government will not longer be questioned.

We notice that quite a number of politicians are still trying to make political capital out of the Boer war, thereby endeavoring to prejudice the minds of the Irish and Germans in this country. President McKinley is not deserving of criticism, for he followed the only wise course which was left to the United States, and for that reason the republican administration is deserving of commendation. The United States is on friendly terms with England, and any act on the part of this country encouraging or lending assistance to the Boers would of necessity be a breach of international law. If England had aided Spain in our late unpleasantness with that country, the citizens of the United States would have been justified in becoming righteously indignant. So would England be if the United States had to interfere in the South African war. The politicians who try to create an agitation for political purposes over the Boer war appear to be indifferent whether this country is plunged into a war with England as long as they can attain their ends. President McKinley has done the country a great service in the wise manner in which he adhered to what was right for this country to pursue, and every time he is criticised on this subject, intelligent and thoughtful citizens cannot but feel gratified with the republican administration.

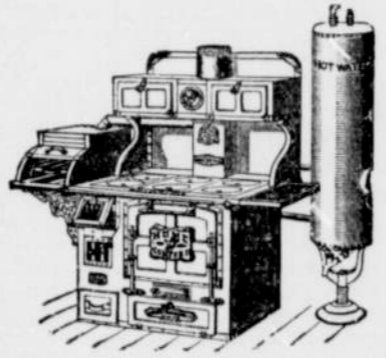
