The machinery is in place and the craft is regarded as one of the finest built in that city. It will be launched probably this week. In the same yard also is a barge 140 feet long building for the same company.

Dr. James was house surgeon at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland, where he gained considerable experience, and being highly respected by the citizens of this city and county, it is safe to predict that as a medical practitioner he will become quite popular in his profession, and coupled with Dr. D. J. Wiley's age, success and long experience as a doctor, we are satisfied that the sick folk will be well and skillfully cared for in the hands of these gentlemen.
The city council held a meeting Monday evening, with President A. J. Cohn and Councilmen M. Leach, L. Olsen and S. Brodhead present. The councilmen mutually agreed to pay the water company \$30 per month for water rent, to commence from the 1st of September, as the company could not at present take the reservoir above the barn, but as soon as this is done the council will sign the contract. Mr. W. H. Cooper was present, who stated that when the contemplated improvements were carried out the council should make the water contract to extend over six years. An ordinance making the sidewalks in the business portion of the city eight feet wide was introduced and passed its final stage. The question of placing electric lights in the residence portion of the city came up through a letter handed in from Mr. C. Thayer, who wanted to confer with a committee of the council. The president appointed Councilmen Leach, Olsen and Brodhead for that purpose.

SUMMARY OF TILLAMOOK'S ASSESSMENT.

Increase of \$78,971 in the Taxable Property—Only a Small Increase in Cattle and a Decrease in Other Stock.

Assessor J. S. Stephens gave out on Wednesday a summary of the assessment roll for Tillamook county for the year 1900, which is as follows:

The total value of taxable property last year was \$1,257,041, this being an increase of \$78,971. There is a slight falling off in the number of horses, mules, sheep and swine from last year, the figures then being: Horses and mules, 1,041; sheep and goats, 1,430; swine, 808. In cattle, the increase is only 190 head over last year, which is, perhaps, owing to the great demand in this county last summer for young stock.
