### Wants to Develop Oil Wells.

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.]

DEAR SIR,—During the past year I have visited all of the oil fields of California, carefully examining the formation and surface indications for oil. I have also passed through Tillamook and Clatsop Counties in Oregon, and I am satisfied that there is oil in both of those Counties. I find in each of those Counties sandstones, the shales, the fossils, the conglomerate, etc., and I am informed by most reliable parties in Clatsop Co. of seepages there. Oil in California is changing lands from a valuation of \$2.50 per acre to \$1000, and in some cases to \$4000 per acre, and is selling at the latter price. It is making millions for California, and the development of good oil wells in Oregon will do as much for that state.

A good producing oil well anywhere in Tillamook County would more than double the valuation of the entire county and cause an active demand for the poorer lands of the county at prices that would astonish its citizens. It would cause numerous other wells to be put down at once. Would assist in bringing a railroad, in improving the harbor or causing it to be improved and in general development.

The coast portion of Alaska, Washington, California and Mexico each has valuable underground wealth. Is it reasonable to suppose that state lines, established by men long after this coast was formed, has barred out underground wealth from the coast portion of the state of Oregon? The idea is absurd. There is underground wealth there. It simply awaits enterprise to develop it. Now a company could easily be formed in your County, each citizen taking a few shares, a piece of ground obtained and a well put down, and if either oil or coal was found in good quantities it would return to the stockholder many dollars for each dollar invested.

[The above letter makes nice reading and, of course, places everything in a favorable light. The solitary statement that a person is satisfied there is oil in Tillamook county is not convincing evidence to justify the Headlight in recommending the citizens to put money into a company to make research, although, no doubt, many of our citizens would not scruple to do so. We do not wish it to be understood that we are opposed to any such undertaking, but it is just as well to be a little conservative when a proposition is made to convert land worth but a few dollars to that of \$4000. As so many schemes are concocted to defraud the public it is just as well not to take any chances until there is some assurance of success. We had plenty of fakirs through the county last summer, and we presume they will be just as numerous next. If the Phoenix Oil and Fuel Company of San Francisco can convince the citizens it is "a sure thing," there should be no difficulty in getting citizens interested, but they should require plenty of proof before they put up their money—something more than a person who is a suave, persuasive, persistent talker who succeeds in convincing some people that
