Judge Chas. H. Carey, of Portland, was in the city this week in connection with legal business at the circuit court.

Easter was observed in the churches of this city on Sunday with special services, which attracted good congregations.

Mr. Eugene France, of Aberdeen, Wash., left last week and will return to this city shortly to purchase a number of timber claims.

Mrs. Lem Parker was up from Hobsonville spending Easter with friends in this city, and returned on Monday with Mrs. Sheldon.

Fairview Grange, No. 273, will meet in their hall at Fairview on Friday, April 12th, at 10 a.m. A full attendance is solicited.

District Attorney J. N. Hart came in on Sunday, and after attending to what little business there was at the circuit court, left on Tuesday.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore arrived on Monday from Astoria, but did not reach this city until Thursday through running aground coming up.

Drew & Monroe will give their new and novel entertainment in Ackley's hall at Fairview on Friday evening, and in this city on Saturday evening.

Captain Geo. Hunt was up from the lighthouse Friday and enjoying city life, away from the monotonous roar of the mighty ocean and the sea lions.

County Clerk Homer Mason, who was authorized by the Oregon City land office to take testimony in the timber claim contests, commenced doing so on Wednesday.

Mr. George Bacon left on Saturday for Forest Grove, having raised his bid for the Forest Grove toll road \$100, making it \$450, which was accepted by the receiver.

The lumber schooner C. H. Wheeler and tug Geo. R. Vosbury left Nehalem on Wednesday morning with a cargo of nearly 400,000 feet of lumber for San Francisco.

The reading room next to the Headlight office is closed and the furniture removed to Geo. Edmunds' building, where it is proposed to start a Young Men's Christian Association.

President McKinley will arrive in Portland at 2:15 p.m., on May 22nd, and remain in that city until nine o'clock the next morning, a somewhat brief stop in so important a city as Portland.

Three attorneys, Messrs. J. F. Watts, of Portland, and Frank Hays and Chas. E. Hayes, of Seattle, are in the city looking after the interest of those who are contesting a number of timber claims.

Mr. William Wallace, of Eilers Piano House, Portland, is in the city, and has a number of splendid sample pianos on the Elmore, which is unloading today. They will be on exhibition in this city.

Commissioner C. Ray was in the city on Tuesday. He does not think that the cut worm will bother the dairy ranches and garden truck this year like they did last year. He claims they were nearly as bad seven years ago.

What's the trouble? There are not as many persons of school age in the county—by the returns furnished the different school districts at the last annual meeting—as there were a year previous, for it shows a decrease of five.

Judge G. H. Burnett arrived in the city on Sunday, and after holding circuit court left on Tuesday, dressed in rubber boots and rubber coat. He must have expected bad weather outside, in contrast to the nice weather we are having in Tillamook.

Next Sunday morning in the Christian church, Mr. Thornquest will preach on "Our helpers in life's work contrasted with our enemies. The evening subject, "The four kinds of hearers," will be illustrated with a chart. A hearty invitation to all to attend these services.

It is expected that the steamer W. H. Harrison will be put into commission on or about the 1st June, and when she slips in the water again she will have been practically reconstructed. This will enable the Pacific Navigation Company to give more regular service between Tillamook and Astoria.

Let the city council pass an ordinance prohibiting parties plastering buildings, telephone and electric light poles with all kinds of advertising schemes. Most of these people use consummate gall, so it is just as well to let them know in the future that they cannot have a free hand disfiguring the city.

Mr. J. D. Edwards will open a real estate office next to the Headlight office. From all indication there will be considerable call for real estate in this county, especially for land suitable for dairying and also dairy farms. If the real estate agents would endeavor to get some of the unclaimed land on the market and sell it to those who would clear it up and turn it into dairy farms they would not only make money for themselves but it would do the county a lot of good as well.

It is reported that the Bay City school board has engaged two teachers belonging to Eugene, as the one they had engaged from Newport had declined. The board had also engaged Miss Bella Watt, but for some reason the board changed its mind, preferring an outside teacher to one who resides in the county.

Mr. E. K. Scovell came down from the Nehalem on Tuesday to enjoy city life in Tillamook's metropolis for a few days—the first time in three years. Mr. Scovell fell into good hands, for Mr. Wist was piloting him around and introduced him.

At one time Mr. Scovell knew everybody in the county, but the newcomers have become so numerous he cannot keep track of them. Miss Ora Scovell is down also, taking the teachers' examination.

The editor of the Headlight objects to being called "The railroad smasher," for that is not true. Gentlemen, we are not claiming that honor, for so little printer's ink would never have smashed the proposed railroad so suddenly had there been something more substantial than wind behind it. You can call us "Wind Jammer" if you like, but not "The railroad smasher," for there was no railroad nor anything else to smash—but simply a flimsy inflated bladder.

Another term of circuit court is over, with the result that the county jail remains tenanted, it being now eighteen months since a prisoner was sentenced to durance vile for a few months in the county jail. This is a good record for Tillamook, and one in which the county saves a lot of money, for it becomes quite expensive to some of the counties in Oregon feeding and caring for prisoners. CIRCUIT COURT.

Miss K. E. Parker gets a Judgment for \$1,000 against Claude Thayer.

Judge G. H. Burnett held circuit court in this city on Monday, and, as usual, the docket was exceedingly light, there being only one case of any interest, that of K. E. Parker, plaintiff, vs. Claude Thayer, administrator of W. W. Thayer, deceased, defendant. It was an action for money, Miss Parker claiming that during the month of May, 1895, she entered into an agreement and contract wherein she was to perform certain office and clerical work and services as stenographer and clerk in the law of W. W. Thayer, and for such service he had promised and agreed to pay Miss Parker an amount sufficient to enable her to purchase a house and lot, the same to be at least a seven room two-story house and a lot not less than 100 feet square; that in pursuance of said agreement W. W. Thayer was to purchase real estate for the consideration of \$1,000, which he did at Ivanhoe, upon which W. W. Thayer and Claude Thayer had paid the sum of \$308, leaving a balance due the plaintiff of \$692 and interest thereon, which she now sued for. In addition to this Miss Parker sued Claude Thayer for \$1,000, for certain and diverse house work and nursing, when sick, W. W. Thayer and Samantha, his wife. This, the plaintiff claimed, was at the special instance and request of W. W. Thayer, who promised and agreed to pay her a \$1,000 for performing these services. Messrs. S. C. Spencer, of Portland, and B. L. Eddy were attorneys for the plaintiff, and Judge S. H. Cary, of Portland, and Mr. T. B. Handley for the defendant. It took all day Monday to examine and read the testimony of witnesses, and nearly all Tuesday morning to hear the arguments. The jury brought in a verdict for Miss Parker and allowed her \$1,000. A motion for a new trial was made and Judge Burnett took this under advisement, his decision to be given during vacation.

State of Oregon vs. W. Schlotter. This was a case in which the defendant was charged with beating and ill-treating G. W. Parrish, and pleading guilty the judge fined him \$10 and costs.

J. W. Roth, plaintiff, vs. H. T. Withrow and Annie Withrow, defendants. Judgment of the county court filed, which was affirmed.

G. W. Kiger, plaintiff, vs. Frank Long, defendant. Motion to dismiss filed by plaintiff, which was granted.

W. J. May, plaintiff, vs. Florence A. Hardman and S. M. Hardman, defendants. Action for money. The case having been settled, it was dismissed.

F. Botevahr, doing business as F. Botevahr & Co., plaintiff, vs. Chas. H. Smith and Helen Smith, defendants. Action for money. Case was continued.
