The Army Canteen Again.

Strange how people differ about the army canteen with its uses and abuses, and without passing an opinion of our own, we will give a few extracts from a letter published in the Oregonian from a soldier in the Philippine islands. Following are the extracts:

When officers of the army were asked their opinion on the canteen question, they said, almost invariably, that temperance people had better let well enough alone. But no, you know more about the Army and Army institutions than even the officers, and now you have placed us in the clutches of bino. I say, and others will say the same, that bino has already killed more men over here than have died in battle. What can you expect as a result when the comparatively harmless liquors are no longer procurable?

And where went the profits of the canteens? They went to the mess funds of the companies. The majority of those who read this very probably never lived on "Government straight." You wouldn't enjoy it, and neither do we, and hence, when dividends were declared and we received the money with which to buy commissaries, such as sugar, condensed cream, pickles, macaroni, cheese, corn, peas and a hundred other articles, we cannot give the people at home a very warm thanks for having deprived us of the means of obtaining better food. Imagine living for two or three years on bacon, beans, hardtack, canned salmon, black coffee, occasionally a tough piece of beef, and more seldom light bread. From the canteen, indirectly, we received bread every day, sugar and cream for our coffee, and many other things small in themselves, yet they improved a meal wonderfully.

An American soldier's life in the Philippines is not, never was, and never will be, a bed of roses. Yet you took from us one of the things nearest our hearts for the shortest way to a soldier's heart is through his stomach. Every American soldier, whether he drinks or not, had a vital interest in the canteen, for did not all share alike in the improved mess?

In all probability the ones who prayed most against McKinley's re-election, who worked hardest against the canteen, have husbands or sons who are on the way to ruin. They could not turn their attention to those at home, to whom their interference would bring naught but good; they must look clear across the Pacific to the soldiers in the Philippines.

We were hoping and praying for a safe return to home and friends, while you were working with your might to take from us what few comforts and advantages we had. Very few soldiers have acquired the liquor habit in the canteen. Those who drink learned to do so long before they ever entered the Army.

The much-discussed question as to whom would fall the honor of launching the battle-ship Ohio has been settled by the announcement that this function will be performed by Mrs. William McKinley.

The Columbia River Fisherman's Protective Union has decided to raise a fund and employ two men to kill sea lions at their breeding grounds on the rocks near Tillamook Head. It is believed that thousands of sea lions can be exterminated in this way, and they are considered by the fishermen to be the greatest menace to the fishing industry on the Columbia River. The union has also decided to purchase a sailboat for the use of the secretary in visiting the different parts of the river.

EVERYTHING STRICTLY FIRST CLASS

In two weeks more the general laws passed at the last session of the Legislature will go into effect by constitutional operation, and there are probably but few of them in which the general public feel much interest.

The run of fish is still disappointing, and poor catches are being made by the fishermen. Receipts have been very light at the canneries and cold storages, and an improvement is not looked for until the high water subsides.

While the Oregon statutes governing the handling of state school land funds seem to relieve the State Land Board from all responsibility for the defalcation of the clerk, there are many who contend, with strong show of reason, that the statutes do not have that effect, and that the board is lawfully bound to make good the defalcation of George W. Davis, amounting to \$31,000.

During the last few days there have been wholesale arrests and seizures in connection with the alleged revolutionary movement in Russia. It is reported that persons of high position and reputation are involved. Several hundred persons have been arrested during the last 48 hours, including a number of prominent men.

After a careful consideration of the situation, the administration has decided to reduce the army in the Philippines to 40,000.
