The city council on Monday evening showed good judgment in passing an ordinance making it rough upon fakers, fake medicine and fake shows, for they have imposed a tax of \$5 a day upon all those who participate in that kind of business. We have frequently mentioned in these columns the number of persons who infest this county every summer for the purpose of imposing upon the citizens, and endowed with the gift of gab, they succeed in selling articles at an outrageously high figure, to say nothing of the fakes and those who pester people almost to death with their jaw bone exercises. We would like to impress upon the minds of the people of this city and county that it is to their advantage to trade with the home merchants, and in doing so we can recommend every business man in Tillamook City, while, on the other hand, all that we need say for peddlers and fakers is that it is a hundred chances to one that they will cinch you if they get the least chance or encouragement.

Barnum knew perfectly well what he was talking about when he remarked that the American people liked to be humbugged. This reminds us when we held a commission in Uncle Sam's stamp licking corps. A party had read an advertisement in the newspapers that by sending money to certain brokers they would invest it and double it in value every 30 days. That was just what he wanted for some spare cash he had, so sent off a money order to this sure thing investor. About two weeks after the stamp licker received word from the department, with the letter, money order and advice, with instructions to refund the money, because the parties whom the money was sent to were frauds and were using the mails to humbug people. Instead of being thankful, the party who sent the money began abusing the postmaster and the department for interfering in his private affairs, and that in a free country as well. That is about the same argument some persons use in behalf of fakers and quacks who come here every year to humbug and humbo people with their truck and jaw bone. Oh, yes, Barnum was right, the American people like to be humbugged.

We are glad to hear that Captain W. C. Langfitt, who last week paid Tillamook an official visit as the U. S. Engineer in charge of this district, went away favorably impressed with this county, for he saw the necessity of government improvements to the bay and bar. Although the members of the Port of Tillamook Commission did not have much time with the captain, they placed before him a number of unvarnished facts, which speak for themselves, showing the necessity of government improvements, which, when completed, will make this a lumbering district of large proportions. The citizens are indebted to the Commission for the lively interest it has taken in this matter, and we believe it will be instrumental in accomplishing a great deal to bring these improvements about by laying before the proper parties at every opportunity the claims of Tillamook. Another thing the Commission might do, and that is to get every member of the Oregon delegation interested in the improvements for Tillamook. Senators Simon and Mitchell and Congressman Moody should be just as energetic in the matter as Congressman Tongue, and we believe they would be if the Commission would get in touch with them.
