The relatively recent establishment of this industry, covering a period of not more than seven years, and the comparative isolation of that section of the state as regards market facilities, combine to render its growth astonishing. With the output of between thirty-five and forty cheese factories aggregating 1,250,000 pounds this season and the product of its creameries amounting to 200,000 pounds, it need hardly be said that the people of Tillamook are prosperous, while they are proverbially among the most contented people of the earth, asking only suitable railroad facilities to complete, commercially speaking, the sum of their desires.
