BIG MONEY IN THE DAIRY

Tillamook Will Average \$40 Per Inhabitant This Year.

Between 35 and 40 Factories Will Produce 1,250,000 Pounds of Good Cheese.

Receipts from butter and cheese manufactured in Tillamook will this year net nearly \$40 for each of the 4500 inhabitants of the county. According to Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey, who returned yesterday from a tour of inspection, the cheese product will be 1,250,000 pounds at 11 cents; butter, 200,000 pounds at 20 cents; total income from a single industry, \$177,500.

"Seven years ago," said Mr. Bailey, "such a thing as a cheese factory was unknown in Tillamook. Now there are between 35 and 40 factories in the county. Conditions for butter and cheesemaking in Tillamook County are not excelled anywhere in the world. That is a broad statement, but it is true. White clover grows everywhere, from the ocean side to the mountain top, and the purest of water is abundant. The climate is particularly adapted to the making and curing of cheese.

San Francisco knows the worth of Oregon cheese, but would like to get around our law requiring cheese to be labeled so as to show its true character. A San Francisco firm recently wrote to a Tillamook manufacturer asking him to ship cheese without marks, so that it could be labeled "New York cheese." The request was declined. Tillamook manufacturers are supporting the new law, and want to see it enforced to the letter. They realize that the time is coming when Oregon cheese will not have to bear a "made-in-New-York" label in order to find sale. And they will see the time when New York cheese will be seeking a buyer under an Oregon label.

"It is likely that a large exhibition of cheese will be made at the State Fair in the Fall. To encourage manufacturers the State Board of Agriculture will offer a gold medal for the best exhibit of cheese and another for the best exhibit of butter. These will be in addition to the usual premiums for dairying.

"Butter and cheese manufacturers are prosperous in Tillamook. They report a large increase in business compared with last year, and the outlook is for development on a still larger scale. In April the Tillamook creamery paid its patrons an average of \$50 a month. In May the amount was doubled."

Commissioner Bailey said that Tillamook needs only a railroad to make it one of the richest counties in Oregon.—Oregonian.

Fools And Their Money.

A street faker gave an illustration yesterday of how the American people like to be fooled. He stood in a buggy on Stark street, near third, and passed out little round phials of water at 50 cents each. For quite a while the rush was so great that people struggled and crowded each other to pass up their half-dollars, while the faker was kept as busy as he could be taking in the coin. He gave away, with each phial, a diminutive mirror which he said was Edison's invention and the possessor could tell what was going on behind him. The phials had magnifying power to some extent, but their sale did not depend upon their merits, but rather on the vender's fluency of speech. The purchasers in comparing notes thought they cost, wholesale, about 50 cents a gross.

Another faker held a crowd on Third street near Alder, to whom he sold soap three cakes for a quarter. The same article can be procured at any drug store for 5 cents a cake, but the "guaranty" of the faker was what influenced people to buy. It would render the complexion soft and as smooth as velvet, he said, and it was surprising to see the large numbers of apparently sensible people who took him at his word.—Oregonian.

To Mine Nehalem Coal.

ASTORIA, July 20.—Articles of incorporation of the Nehalem Coal Company were filed for record in the County Clerk's office today. The incorporators are W. J. Cook, J. F. Hamilton and W. H. Copeland, of Astoria, and James L. Foy, of Omaha, and the capital stock is \$150,000, divided into 1500 shares of \$100 each. The principal office of the company is to be in Astoria, and it is authorized under its articles to buy and sell lands in Clatsop and Tillamook Counties, engage in the coal mining and logging business, build and operate railroads, steamships and other vessels and carry on a general merchandizing business.

On the south side of the McCamey Mountains the company owns 525 acres of coal lands, which are known as the Kinney coal fields. On the property are four veins of what is pronounced by experts to be the best steaming coal found on the Pacific coast. The veins are 27 inches, 33 inches, 38 inches and 57 inches respectively in width, and the assayer's report shows the coal to consist of 48.5 per cent carbon, 42 per cent gas, 5 per cent water and 3.5 per cent ash.

The mines are located within one and a half miles of deep water, and the right of way has been secured for an easy railway grade over that distance. Barges with a carrying capacity of 1000 tons each can be taken to and from the landing place at any season of the year. Those interested in the enterprise assert that when the plant is in operation, coal can be brought to Astoria and sold at a profit for \$3 per ton. The company has ample financial backing to carry on the enterprise, and active operations will be commenced within the next few weeks.

Plenty of Deep-Sea Fish.

The incident of a fishing schooner going to Portland with a load of fish and not being able to sell it has caused considerable comment. The fact that most of the fish dealers are personally interested in the fishing business at Seaside and are consequently interested in procuring their supplies from that place, accounts for the unwillingness to buy the fish brought there. The dealers say that there are large fishing banks off the mouth of the Nestucca and at other places along the coast of Oregon, from which a plentiful supply of halibut, black cod, rock cod and other good fish could be obtained to supply this market, and if any one would go into the business of fishing there to supply this market, the dealers here would only be too glad to get their supplies from him. The fact that there is plenty of fish on the banks along the coast of Oregon not far below the mouth of the Columbia was proved by Captain Exon, who rigged up a trawl and caught more fish on one of these banks than the market at that time could utilize. A small auxiliary steam-power schooner plying between these banks and Portland might do a good-paying business, and sooner or later some one will engage in this fishery.

Large Run of Salmon.

ASTORIA, July 21.—The run of fish for the past 48 hours has been better than for any season since 1896, the year of the big strike, when the National Guard was called out to settle the question whether the price should be "5 cents or no fish." The five cold-storage plants in Astoria are blocked, and a majority of them have not cleaned up their floors since Friday. Extra men are being put on for night work, but white men are not available. No others are used in the cold storage plants and the Caucasians are gradually superseding the Chinese in the canneries. The present run has affected the price to the reduction of chinook salmon of weight of 25 pounds or over from 7 to 6 cents. The latter price is that fixed by the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union before the opening of the season, and it is not probable that it will go below this figure, with a good chance of its increasing when the present large run ceases. While runs have come into the river in previous years during this portion of the season in similar quantities, the character of the fish is entirely different. The former July run was of a small fish in comparison with those of the earlier run, and were called "July" fish. They were an inferior quality, and so packed and graded for the market. The fish delivered today average about 30 pounds, firm in flesh, coral equal to March fish, and with eggs only partially mature.
