The steamer Louise, which went on the Nehalem spit Thursday of last week got off the same evening. She met with another accident a few days ago. Coming down the Nehalem river, with Commodore Wheeler at the helm, she ran into a snag and ripped a hole in her side. She was headed for the shore, but she filled with water so fast that she took her second baptismal bath in the Nehalem.

The weather for the past two weeks has been delightful, and coming at the most desirable time for hay harvest, the grass is nearly all cut, cured and put away in good condition, which is an assurance that most of the dairymen will have more hay next winter than they can use, which is in marked contrast to Kansas and Missouri, where the farmers have already had to dispose of their cattle for the want of feed. Truly Tillamook dairymen are in clover.

On account of the timber land frauds discovered in Montana and Idaho, Commissioner Hermann, of the General Land office, has suspended all proofs made during the present year under the timber and stone act, pending conclusion of the full investigation and inquiry begun some time ago. The suspension applies to all states where Government timber land is purchased, and involves thousands of cases. Many large companies and speculators, it is alleged, have had "dummies" as agents, making purchases of these lands from the Government.

Every newspaper treasures up in its memory the names of its friends and likewise its enemies. —We can stand a good many things, but when people in the east want to know if we are civilized in Tillamook county we feel like exposing their ignorance. Out of several questions sent us to answer this week, this is one: "Are the people law abiding citizens, or are there, as in some mining districts, lawless people who commit many acts of violence not known in older settled places." The fact that the county jail in Tillamook has been almost tenantless the past three years is sufficient reason to ask our correspond-

ent in Chaplin county, Conn., if they have such a record as that there.

Mr. R. M. Trowbridge died suddenly at the residence of his sister, Mrs. B. H. Hathaway, in this city on Saturday, no doubt from the effect of the stage accident on the mountain on the 4th July, when his arm was broken and his brother was killed. He had remained at Trask house until Thursday, when he was brought to this city. He was on the street Saturday morning, and returning to Mr. Hathaway's was taken with chills and died at noon. The body was taken out the same evening for Dayton, where it was to be buried.

Articles of incorporation were filed with the County Clerk on Monday incorporating the Wilson River Road Co., its purpose being to construct and maintain plank and clay roads on what is known as the Wilson River toll road, at a point at Besler's ford in this county to Gales Creek in Washington County, and to charge, collect, and receive tolls as by law provided. This corporation also proposes to engage in the construction, owning and operating of a railroad from the city of Tillamook to Forest Grove. The incorporators are Oak Nolan, Geo. W. Kiger and G. O. Nolan, the capital stock being \$1000.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, who was on the program to take part in the teachers' institute and lecture in this city, was unable to attend. We will forgive the professor, but don't let it happen again. The editor doesn't like to tell tales out of school, but the last time the state superintendent came to Tillamook he was "sea sick" and "fed the fishes" while crossing the mountain in the stage, and, probably, didn't care a whoop whether he was thrown overboard or not. Let's hope the professor was not in dread of another ordeal like that, for we can sympathize with him. He is not the only pebble who gets white in the gills crossing the mountain.

Fisherman and packers on the Columbia river, who expected a falling off in the supply of salmon, have been disappointed, for the present record breaking run increases every day. In past years there have been great runs for a few days but never before has such a run been reported in the Columbia. Gillnetters drift for half an hour and catch more fish than the canneries will take from them while the seines and traps are actually giving away under the weight of the salmon caught. It is an unprecedented situation and will live in the history of the salmon industry as a remarkable one. At Sand Island on Sunday one seaman took nine tons of fish in a single haul. When the next haul was made so many fish were caught that most of the gear was carried away. In the small pieces remaining there were 400 salmon. The "outside" traps are reported to be full of salmon, and some of them are said to have been broken by the weight of the fish.
