A Partial Victory.

The Wheeler Lumber Company has scored a partial victory in its fight with the Oregon & New York Coal & Timber Company for the privilege of using the Nehalem River and its tributaries. The last-named company first filed notice of its intention to improve the streams, and as the law required the County Clerk to refuse any other such declaration made within three months, the instrument of the Wheeler people was rejected, not only at Astoria, but in Columbia County. Will Test the Law.

Suit to test the constitutionality of the act of February 23, 1901, which authorizes counties to sell all land heretofore bid in by them for delinquent taxes, filed by the Title Guarantee & Trust Company in the State Circuit Court. Multnomah County is made the defendant. The papers in the case were prepared by E. B. Seabrook and William A. Munly, of the law department of the trust company. This is the first suit in Multnomah County against a law which has been the subject of widespread discussion. Under the act the county is empowered on and after the first Monday after July 1, 1901, sell property taken in for delinquent taxes. The county is making lists of the delinquent property with a view of beginning sales in September.
