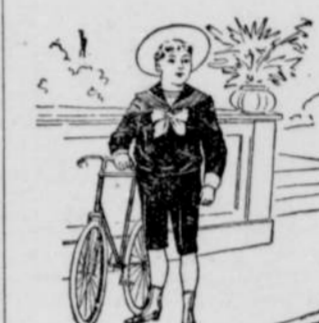
Word was received in this city on Friday evening that Mr. P. W. Todd, who had gone outside on business, had his leg broken in an automobile accident near Aberdeen. The telegraphic news of the accident was as follows: "The automobile bus recently built in San Francisco and put on between Aberdeen and Hoquiam met with disaster late on Friday afternoon, midway between the two towns. The bus, run by steam power was mismanaged and the men in charge lost control of it, the big wagon going off the plank road into tide land, a distance of six feet. There were four passengers, all of whom were injured, P. W. Todd, of Tillamook, Or., having his leg broken. The bus cost \$3500 and is badly damaged."
