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Mismated Couple Sues for Divorce.

The following mismated women have filed suits with the county clerk to be freed from their husbands, who have deserted them:

Ursula J. Austin Thrall, plaintiff, vs. C. W. Thrall, defendant. These parties were married at Rochester, N.Y., on the 23rd of May, 1899. No children were born to this union. Plaintiff has never depended in any way upon defendant for her support, although he had ample means to support her. On August 9th, 1899, defendant disavowing the bonds of matrimony between them, deserted and abandoned the plaintiff, and has continued to do so, without assigning any cause. Plaintiff petitions the court to make an order allowing her to assume her former Christian and maiden name, and that the court dissolve the bonds of matrimony now existing.

Lula E. Malaney, plaintiff, vs. Albert H. Malaney, defendant. They were married in Tillamook county on October 23rd, 1895. In the month of August, 1898, in this county, the defendant, without cause and against the will of plaintiff, fully deserted and abandoned plaintiff, and has continued to live separate and apart from her. One child was born of this marriage, Howard M. Malaney, now three years old, who is in the care of the plaintiff. The plaintiff prays that the bond of matrimony now existing between her and defendant be dissolved, and that she be awarded the custody and control of the child, and have such other and further relief as the nature of this cause may require and the court may seem meet.

Beginning to Remonstrate.

ASTORIA, Aug. 9.—The petition of the Wheeler Lumber Company to lease the Nehalem River, Rock Creek, Buster Creek, Humboldt Creek, Fishhawk Creek and the north fork of the Nehalem River for floating logs was formally presented to the County Court this afternoon. After hearing the arguments, the court took the matter under advisement and will not render its decision for several days. Some of the owners of property along these streams have remonstrated against the granting of the petition, and a meeting of the property owners with representatives of the Wheeler Lumber Company has been called for August 19.

In the petition the company agrees, if given the lease, to remove all obstructions from the streams, secure rights of way from the settlers and to allow the general public to use the streams for floating logs upon the payment of tolls, the rates of which shall be fixed by the County Court.

Goble Road in Hands of Receiver.

ST. HELENS, Or., Aug. 8.—Yesterday morning the sheriff served attachment papers on the Goble, Nehalem & Pacific Railway Company, to satisfy claims amounting to \$4423.27, \$290 of which was in favor of Dr. H. R. Cliff, company physician, and \$4223.37 in favor of William L. Brewster. A telephone message was also received stating that claims for labor to the amount of \$2800, the amount of last month's pay-roll, were on the way to be filed as laborers' liens upon the available assets of the company. Later in the day additional suits were filed, and the total amount of claims and mortgages shows an indebtedness of \$52,248.55. Certificates of attachment have been filed against all the real estate of the company. One of the donkey engines has been taken to the Goble incline of the Northern Pacific, but no attempt has been made to ship it thus far. A Deputy Sheriff has been appointed keeper and placed in charge of the property. The available assets of the road will amount to several thousand dollars more than their liabilities, but if placed under the hammer it is doubtful whether it will sell for enough to pay off the claims.

The real and personal property belonging to the company is covered by mortgages amounting to \$39,000 in favor of the Portland Security Savings & Trust Company. This mortgage covers the roadbed and rolling stock, including locomotives and logging engines. The Simpson Lumber Company holds a real estate mortgage against the railroad company's real estate for \$5000.

Suit has been brought to foreclose the \$39,000 mortgage against the Goble,

Nehalem & Pacific Railway. A. L. Maxwell, of Portland, has been appointed receiver.

No Place Like Tillamook.

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.]
DEAR SIR,—I promised to send you a letter for publication so that my many friends in Tillamook will all hear from me at the same time. After leaving Tillamook I went to Portland to see Dr. Dickson, who advised me to go to Eastern Oregon, so I drove to Salem from there. I went to Lebanon and Sweet Home, the last towns before going over the Cascade mountains. It was very hot in the valley, but when we got up to the Soda Springs it was very cold, and when we got to the summit of the Santa Ann route it was snowing and freezing. So you see it was quite a change of climate, and talk about mountains, the North Yamhill road is nothing but foot hills to them. There is one grade of seven miles, all going up. At another place there is a five mile hill of sand, of from six to twelve inches deep, which was very hard on my little team. I should think it was about 175 miles from Lebanon to Prineville, and one house to every 50 miles. I paid as high as \$2.00 per sack for flour on the road and in traveling from Prineville in Eastern Oregon to Fort Colamoth, a distance of 150 miles, you only see few places that are settled and then only one or two families at a place. We stayed at Prineville three days and met an old Tillamooker, Wm. Armstrong, who said that Fred Martin, a barber, who used to be at Tillamook, is living close to town. I also met Dad Carey's brother, who is running the hotel, but has sold out and will go to live on his farm of 1100 acres in a short time. He showed me some of our Tillamook papers, which I was glad to see. But we did not like Prineville, so we crossed the 35 mile desert to Fairwell Bend on the Deschutes river and camped there a week, fishing and seeing the sights, being there over the Fourth. There is where the big Ditch Company is commencing to make their ditches for irrigating the desert, which in my opinion, will never be finished, and if it is, I would not give one acre of land in Tillamook for 160 of it. Every night it froze our water in the wash basin and about 90 in the shade in the day time. No fruit raised in that country and not much of anything else except bunch grass, and the sheep is getting away with that. We went over to the ice cave on the 5th of July and made ice cream, but we soon got tired of staying in that place, so went about 150 miles over deserts to Fort Colamoth, and from there started to go over the mountains to Crator Lake. I killed a deer while there, and not having any fresh beef for a month, we did not let any of it spoil. My children had a fine time playing with the snow on the summit, sliding down hill and throwing snow balls. We have seen deer, mountain lions and coyotes, but have not seen any place since leaving home that can hold a candle to Tillamook. This place is about 60 miles from Crator Lake, and 14 from Medford, but our nearest R. R. station is Central Point. All campers pass through this place to go to Crator Lake. We were tired of camping, and my health being better than for four or five years, we concluded to stop at this little town for the winter. Lots of grapes and peaches and good gardens here, but they irrigate their fruit and gardens and have a ready sale for all they can raise at good prices. For anyone that likes to raise berries and onions for a living, this is the place to do it in. I have rented a block of land with fruit and houses on it, also plenty of water for \$3.50 per month. Lots of grapes, peaches and apples on the place, but I think you will see us back there next summer, as it is a little too warm here. It was 105° in the shade yesterday. Everybody said it was the hottest weather they ever saw here. I went to Medford and Jacksonville last week, and I think it is about 6 to 10 degrees hotter there than here. We get a good breeze every day, at this place my family are all feeling well, and if anyone wants to know more about this place write to me and I will answer. Another good store would do well here. I am buying up all the bailed hay I can get, as it is scarce here on account of so much dry weather. I will sell it in the winter and

hope to make some money out of it. Please send me your paper, as I want to know how things are going on in Tillamook. I think I can get some of the people from here to go there.
