In this collapsed condition the children thought their parents were dead, and so spread the news and telephoned for a doctor. But after the excitement was over they were the most surprised lot of people to be found anywhere. As to the coroner, he is not much stuck on being called to hold an inquest on people who suddenly come to life, for he does not like to be fooled that way.

As long as an editor coincides with some people he is considered a fine fellow, but let him criticize, no matter how honestly and truthfully, some public matter which they are connected with, then it is that, instead of saying a good word for the editor, they consider him a dangerous and bad man to run a newspaper. It is the same old adage as to whose ox is being gored. Gales Creek Saw Mill Destroyed by Fire

The saw mill belonging to W. H. Nighty, of Gales Creek, Oregon, burned down yesterday, about 2000 feet of lumber being destroyed. The loss amounts to \$8000. It was insured for something over \$400.

Wilson River Road.

Runyon's Wilson River Road, which crosses the Coast Range of mountains from Gales Creek, Or., to Tillamook City, a distance of about 50 miles, will be improved this fall. Capital furnished by a prominent Tillamook banker is behind the enterprise, and from all accounts the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible. A call has been made for every available laboring man, in order that the work may be completed before the fall rains set in, which will make further work this year in that country impossible.

The crew will begin work at the Wilson River Ford, seven miles from Tillamook City, and will open the road this way. This road was built about 10 years ago and was one of the most gigantic pieces of grading ever done in that section of the country. The road during the past year has been in an almost impassable condition, and the news that it is to be reopened has met expression of satisfaction. The property, since being built has had rather a checkered career, and is at present in the hands of a receiver.—Telegram.
