SERIOUS SHOOTING AFFAIR.

W. Heitmiller Shot Emil Arndt Twice at the Truckee Saw Mill.

A serious shooting affair occurred on Tuesday morning at the saw mill of the Truckee Lumber Company, the result of which Emil Arndt was nearly killed. William H. Heitmiller, an old settler of this county, did the shooting. It appears that his wife filed a petition for a divorce on Saturday, and this seems to have worried Heitmiller considerably, so much so that it was thought it affected his mind. He came to the city on Saturday and Sheriff Alderman took him home with him. Having loaded him up with provisions, Heitmiller left this city on Tuesday morning about eight o'clock, when Mr. Alderman advised him to go straight home to his place, which is on the Nealem beach. He promised that he would do so, but stopped on his way at Bay City to visit his daughter, Mrs. Bod'e. From what can be learned they talked about the divorce proceedings, when Heitmiller got it into his head that Arndt was the cause of the trouble, and who was going to marry his wife after the divorce had been granted. Leaving Bay City he drove to Hobsonville, and on his way made up his mind to shoot Arndt and then kill himself, having lost all reason as to the consequences. Arriving at the mill he asked where Arndt was working—he did not appear to know Arndt in person—and being told at the edge, he went into the mill. After entering the door he passed along the side of the rollers, at the end of which several men were at work. He asked Guss Nelson and Joe Harrison which was Arndt. Not suspecting any trouble they pointed him out. Heitmiller then passed down between the two rows of rollers, across which Arndt was at work at the edge with his back to the rollers. As Arndt took his foot off the lever and was about to turn round, Heitmiller pulled his revolver, and without even a word passing between them, he shot him in the side. Arndt must have intended getting out of the way, and in doing so had to jump over a piece of board on his right. But before he could do so Heitmiller shot him again in the left side and Arndt fell to the floor the other side of the board. L. M. Biggs, who was at work at the end of the rollers saw Heitmiller pull his revolver, and before he could reach him the shooting was over. Heitmiller then tried to make his escape, and instead of passing round the same way that he came in, he jumped over the rollers and made for the door, where he was prevented from leaving. Mr. J. E. Sibley, the manager of the mill, was immediately on the spot, when Heitmiller jerked his revolver out again with the intention, it is thought, of shooting himself in the head, but his hand was grabbed, and he was prevented from committing another deed. Arndt was carried from the mill and Dr. Wiley was sent for. One shot entered the left side between the ribs and passed through the body, the doctor taking it from the right side. The other bullet had passed through the flesh on the left side. Naturally there was some indignation with the men at the mill, who looked upon it as a cold blooded attempt at murder, and as Arndt appears to be a man who was well liked, Heitmiller must thank himself that he did not meet with rough treatment. The arrival of Sheriff Alderman allayed all feeling, and the prisoner was immediately brought to this city and placed in the county jail. Heitmiller has been a resident of this

county for 20 years and no one thought he would be guilty of such a crime, for he was well respected and had never given any trouble. Living alone and brooding over his domestic troubles appears to have worried him. Arndt came from Emma, in the south part of the county, and the men at the saw mill speak in the highest respect of him.

The last account of the condition of Arndt is that he is still alive and has a show for his life, but it will take a few days to tell whether he will pull through. Heitmiller will be brought before Justice Geo. Handley on Friday.

The Divorce Petition.

Nancy Heitmiller, Plaintiff, vs. William Heitmiller, Defendant.

Plaintiff, for cause of suit alleges: That Plaintiff and Defendant were intermarried at Fredonia, in Wilson County, state of Kansas, on or about the 13th day of December, 1873, and have ever since been and now are, husband and wife.

That about the year of 1883 plaintiff and defendant became residents of Tillamook County, state of Oregon, and have ever since continued to reside therein, and that they are now residents of said state and county.

That the conduct of this plaintiff towards the defendant, ever since said intermarriage has always been that of a good, faithful, loving and obedient wife. That at the time of said intermarriage the defendant was a sober and industrious man, but that about nine years thereafter the defendant became addicted to the drinking of intoxicating liquors, and said habit grew upon the defendant until he became a habitual gross drunkard, and defendant has been such an habitual gross drunkard for the past ten years.

That the defendant has for the last past ten years treated the plaintiff with such cruel and inhuman treatment and personal indignities that the life of the plaintiff has been thereby rendered burdensome.

That a part of said cruel and inhuman treatment of plaintiff by defendant was as follows:

The defendant has been during all of the time since said intermarriage, and is now possessed of irritable and ungovernable temper and in the habit of working himself into a violent rage and passion about the merest trifles, and frequently for no cause whatever; this occurring as often as two or three times per day and at most not more than a week apart, and at such times, while plaintiff lived with defendant, the defendant used towards this plaintiff the vilest and most abusive language, calling her such names as "A God damn fool," "A God damn bitch," "A God damn sow," or "An old slouch," and on or about the 21st day of August, said defendant told plaintiff that she, (meaning this plaintiff) was a God damn fool when he (meaning defendant) married her, on or about the 10th day of December, 1893, and also on or about the 21st day of August, 1897, the defendant, without reason or provocation, struck plaintiff violent blows with his fist, and in the year 1893 and on or about the last of August 1895, the defendant accused plaintiff of being untrue to him as a wife; and on or about the 31st day of July, 1897, at which time plaintiff and defendant were living together at their home along the ocean beach, several miles north of Garibaldi, in Tillamook county, Oregon, the defendant purchased in said county, a quantity of strychnine for the express purpose of poisoning plaintiff, and threatened to take the life of the plaintiff therewith.

That by reason of the aforesaid treatment, plaintiff being afraid that her life was in danger, was compelled to and did on the 22nd day of August, 1897, leave the home of said defendant, and for the aforesaid reasons and the further reason that defendant has since, to-wit, in the spring of 1895, at Hobsonville, in Tillamook County, Oregon, and at other times also threatened to take the life of plaintiff. Plaintiff has ever since said separation been compelled to live separate and apart from defendant, and plaintiff now believes her life to be in danger from said defendant.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays for a decree dissolving the bands of matrimony existing between this plaintiff and the defendant, and that plaintiff recover here in her costs and disbursements of this suit.
