The memorial services in Tillamook City last Thursday in token of respect to the martyred president, William McKinley, brought together a large audience in the opera house, which had been fittingly draped for the occasion. The speeches and singing were all that could be desired for such an occasion. The city had a mournful appearance, with all business houses closed and draped in black.

The dairy interests have the right to demand the stamping out of this fraud. We know that it is the age of evolution, but we still do not believe that we have come to the time when legitimate dairying will be conducted with a drove of steers instead of dairy cows.

The city council has taken upon itself to settle the question of high or low license without asking consent of their constituents or receiving a recommendation from them to increase the license to \$800. If, however, the city council decides to raise the license to that sum of money, let us hope that those who want the license raised now will not use the same means to have it reduced after they have gained their object. We have no objection whatever to the city council raising the license if that is what the citizens want.

The Evening Telegram pretends not to understand why Portland is losing the Tillamook trade. Let's give the Telegram a pointer. The Portland wholesale merchants have a disposition to be pigish, swinish or hogish. That's the only trouble, and of the Telegram would rip them up the back for their gluttony it might do some good. To prove what we say about their hogish natures, the

Eastern wholesale merchants handle cheese for 1/2 or 1/4 of a cent a pound, while Portland wholesale merchants have the gall to demand 1 1/2 cents a pound. And because Tillamook dairymen and manufacturers can't and won't be made suckers of is the reason that the Portland merchants are losing, as they deserve to, the trade of this county.

As previously announced, there will be a special meeting of the school district to-morrow (Friday) to give the school directors the necessary authority to have the 9th and 10th grade taught in the public school. This should receive the hearty approval of every citizen, for this is something we should all take a pride in. What is wanted is a county high school for Tillamook, and this is another matter which will receive the consent of the people of this county before another twelve months rolls round. This would give the young people, after passing through the district school, an opportunity to take up the high school course, from which they could go to the state university. Pupils in every district will be afforded the same opportunities, and it will be of great advantage to those who have an appetite for learning.

The Northern Pacific surveyors are headed for Hobsonville, that being their objective point which they expect to reach in a few weeks. They are now near Nehalem. This is a preliminary survey, undertaken to ascertain what the cost of constructing a road from Scappoose to Tillamook would amount to. From what we can learn the surveyors have not come across many difficult places to contend with, and it is expected that the cost of building the road will not foot up nearly as much as it was first thought. As the matter of cost in building is first to be taken into consideration, nothing is definitely known whether the work will be commenced or when. As the survey will come as far as Hobsonville, no doubt it will be extended to Tillamook City, as that would only entail a few more weeks work.

Died, in this city, on Monday last, Mr. Geo. A. Barton, aged 44 years, the cause of death being consumption. Being a member of Star lodge, A.O.U.W., the funeral was taken charge of by that order. At the request of the lodge, Rev. Ernest Thornquest conducted the religious services and gave a touching discourse in the Christian church, where a large number of workmen had followed their deceased brother in token of respect, also sorrowing relatives and friends. The service was impressive, and at the grave in the Oddfellows' cemetery the ritual of the A.O.U.W. was gone through and the remains laid to rest in the silent city of the dead with a cordon of workmen encircling the grave. It was only a few years since that George Barton was considered one of the healthiest, robust citizens in this county. All who knew him respected him, and now he is gone the consensus of opinion is, "George was a fine fellow." He had a long illness, but his sufferings were alleviated by the care that his sister, Mrs. Ruth A. Rees, bestowed upon him and the kind attention by the members belonging to that great order, the A.O.U.W., which ministers to its members and throws the hand of protection around the widow, the orphan and those dependant upon its deceased members.
