General News.

The Great Northern Railway is about to introduce electricity as a motive power on its line over the Cascade Mountains in Washington.

Lionel Stagg, formerly a bank examiner, and well-known in Portland, is occupying a cell in the Tombs prison, New York, charged with forging the name of Homer Davenport, the noted cartoonist.

Rear-Admiral Sampson has requested the Navy Department to relieve him of his present duty as Commandant of the Boston Navy Yard on October 1 on account of the bad condition of his health. Secretary Long has granted the request.

The United States training ship Mohican returned to San Francisco on Sunday from a prolonged cruise. She left several months ago with 400 landsmen, who were to be molded into seamen. There were about 90 desertions during the cruise.

The most important development in the Czolgosz case was the announcement that no poison had been found on the bullets or the revolver with which the anarchist assassinated President McKinley. Chemical and bacteriological examinations were made.

The nine anarchists who have been under arrest at Chicago since the assassination of President McKinley were given their freedom on Monday, Judge Chetlain so ordering after the prosecution had answered that there was no legal evidence against them. Emma Goldman was not a party to the proceedings.

The run of fish in the Columbia river has dropped off considerably. The traps, however, can easily supply all demands. The fresh fish dealers pay 1 1/2 cents per pound, and the remainder are sold at Steglers' cannery at 5 cents each. The steelheads caught are sold to the cold-storage men at 5 cents per pound.

Johann Most, the anarchist, was arrested in New York on Sunday while haranguing a crowd of 500 people in a dance hall back of a saloon in Corona, L. I. Captain Hardy and five policemen in citizens' clothes had entered the hall quietly before their presence was suspected. Most was on the stand at the end of the hall declaiming loudly.

Resolutions bitterly condemning Rev. Silas C. Swallow, of Harrisburg, Pa., for an attack on the late President McKinley in a late issue of the Pennsylvania Methodist, of which he is editor, were adopted at a public meeting held on Sunday attended by 100 persons, under the auspices of the McKinley Veteran Patriotic League of Duplin County.

Aguinaldo's body-guard, Major Alhambra two Captains, two Lieutenants and 29 men, with 28 rifles, surrendered about 40 miles north of Baler, Island of Luzon, to Captain George Detachment, of the Twenty-second United States Infantry, on Sunday, and took the oath of allegiance and were released.

There has been no material change in the condition of Mrs. McKinley. Those about her say she is holding her own, and this is as much as can be expected. To correct an impression that has gone out in some quarters, Dr. Rixey authorized this statement: Mrs. McKinley is not being kept up on opiates or other artificial stimulants.

Baron von Lynden, the Minister of Foreign Affairs at the Hague, has forwarded to the Legations and members of the council of the court of Arbitration a copy of the Boer appeal for arbitration with a notification that he intends to bring up the appeal for consideration at the first meeting of the council. The date of the meeting is not fixed.

In financial circles the opinion is growing that there will have to be further

borrowing by the British Government as the result of the continued fighting in South Africa. The only relief to the drain upon the resources of the nation is the money which is expected to be realized by the sale of farms belonging to those irreconcilable burghers who have left their wives and children to the care of Lord Kitchener.

Richmond Person Hobson, the Merri-mack hero, has become a partner in a big cotton buying firm, with headquarters in Atlanta Ga., and agencies in forty southern cities. The firm is composed of W. H. Beatty, a first cousin of Hobson, and Joseph M. Hobson, his brother. Hobson will not retire from the navy, his new connection being in the nature of an investment.

As a result of several conferences between President Roosevelt and General Wood, Governor-General of Cuba, it has been determined to negotiate a reciprocity agreement between the United States and the Island, the agreement to be sent to Congress early in December. Cereals and machinery from the United States will enter Cuba at reduced rates, and sugar and tobacco will be the principal Cuban products affected by the agreement.

Commissioner Hermann arrived in Washington on Saturday, and called on President Roosevelt. In the course of his conversation, the President told the Commissioner he intended to visit Oregon and Washington next Spring, in order to become better acquainted with the people of that section. Roosevelt desired to visit the Pacific Northwest during the last campaign, but his services as a speaker were desired elsewhere.

The steamer Ha Ting arrived at Victoria, B. C., from Skagway, Saturday evening, bringing a report of the alleged absconding of Edward Daniel, cashier for Barsch & Co., merchants of Dawson with a sum of money variously estimated at from \$35,000 to \$50,000. Daniel is said to have since been taken in charge on the American side, near Eagle City, Alaska, and he will probably return to Dawson to stand trial. The money all belonged to the one firm mentioned, of which Daniel was acting in the capacity of manager.

A shooting affray occurred at eight o'clock Friday night in the lobby of the Layton Hotel at Grants Pass, Ore. D. Holliday, of San Francisco, was shot through the head by Frank McCann, proprietor. The wounded man will die. Holliday is of the firm of Peacock & Holliday, contractors and builders, of San Francisco. He arrived in the city a few days ago to look up mining interests in which he and McCann were concerned. They had had trouble previously. The quarrel ended in McCann drawing his revolver and firing, the bullet entering over his left eye and passing out over the left ear. The cause of the quarrel is not known. McCann is in jail.

The Dawson News prints a remarkable story about the prospecting tour just completed of H. W. Bracken, who has returned to Dawson after six months in Northern Alaska. According to Bracken's narrative, while in the Romanoff Mountains, about 1000 miles from Dawson, he and his servants ascended a mountain glacier. At a height of 8000 feet they found herds of mountain sheep frozen in the ice. The theory is that some extreme mid-winter blizzard had caught them while stampeding over the dome. Then the sheep huddled together and perished, the snow gradually forming an icy coating. Whatever portions of the bodies of the sheep were above the ice were devoured by Arctic bears and wolves. Bracken is said to be a scientific miner of 25 years experience, having resided three years in Yakut.
