Mr. Eotts Pleased with Tillamook.

In an interview with H. T. Eotts in regard to his proposed removal to Tillamook, Oregon, we learn from him that Tillamook County seems more prosperous generally than any other part of the country visited by him on his recent trip through the west. No such thing as drouth is ever known there. The country lies immediately on the Pacific coast and the ocean breeze keeps the temperature at a very agreeable point all the time. The country has a great deal of the finest timber and its lumber interests when developed will yield great wealth.

After the removal of the timber it is found that the land is almost unequalled for the production of grass and consequently the dairy industry is being greatly developed. The grass is green from one end of the year to the other.

The thermometer hardly ever gets above 80 degrees in summer and very little below freezing point in winter.

Stock cattle are never fed, living on the grass until ready for beef. Cows are usually fed on hay about six weeks or two months of the year. Hay yields a crop of from 3 to 5 tons per acre and the grass is immediately good enough to pasture. The weather is not hot enough to mature corn and grain, so grass is the principal production.

Most of the milk produced is converted into cheese, with some butter, there being 48 cheese and butter factories in the county. Farmers are thus assured of a permanent and profitable market, 80 acres being sufficient to sustain from 30 to 60 cows from which an income of \$1,500 to \$3,000 may be easily had. Fish in the mountain streams and game in the mountains are abundant. Mr. Eotts is very enthusiastic as to the prospects in Tillamook and think that no better place can be found. He especially advises farmers who are thinking of moving to investigate the opportunities there offered, being satisfied that in no other place can they make money easier or live more comfortably. Although the County seat is 45 miles from a railroad, land sells in its vicinity for \$50 and upward for well improved farms, which however, is not surprising or unreasonable when the returns had by farmers are considered, some farmers who rent paying \$8 to \$10 per acre and clearing \$15 per acre above the rent. Unimproved and partly improved farms sell from \$6 to \$10.

The description of the climate for this summer is very attractive. While people here were sweltering in 112 and 120 degrees of heat Tillamookers were enjoying life at from 60 to 75. No wonder that people should be attracted there—Edina Sentinel.

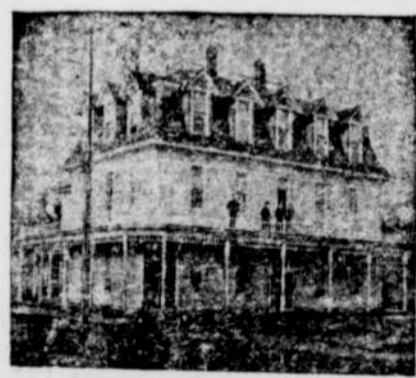
