APPEAL FOR AID.

Miss Stone Sends Piteful Letter to a Friend.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—According to a dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Sofia, further word has come from Miss Stone, in the following letter, written to W. W. Piet, president of the Turkish Mission in Constantinople:

"My Honored Friend: I write to inform you that on the 3rd of September I was captured by a great number of armed men—some 40—as I traveled from Bansk to Diamala with about 12 teachers, students and others. They took with me for my companion Mrs. Catherine Tsilka. The reason why they captured us is for ransom. The price which they demand for us is £25,000 Turkish, which must be paid in gold, and this entirely without the knowledge of the Turkish and Bulgarian Governments, within the term of 18 days from to-day. The condition of Mrs. Tsilka decided the limit, as she is to give birth to a child in three months.

"We are pursued by a Turkish army. I beg Dr. Haskell himself to go to Constantinople and exert himself for the payment of the ransom at Samakov, where men will receive it on presenting an order from me.

"The men who captured us at first showed courtesy and consideration towards us, but now since Turkish soldiers and Bashi Bazouks have begun to pursue us and the ransom is delayed, our condition is altogether changed. Therefore I beg you to hasten sending the ransom demanded and that as energetically as possible you will present to the Turkish Government that it stop pursuit of us by soldiers and Bashi Bazouks, otherwise we shall be killed by the people in whose hands we are. I pray you to communicate without delay the contents of this letter to the representative of the United States at the porte and request his most serious co-operation.

"Pray for us, we are at peace with God.

"With hearty salutations, Your friend,

Harry Ferguson, known far and wide as "Peget Sound Pirate," was captured Sunday by Sheriff Zimmerman's deputies, in his lair on Whidby Island. He had a companion named Turpin. Ferguson one year ago successfully stood off the Sheriff's forces, drove them back to a tug and narrowly missed killing an officer. He was wanted for numerous thefts committed at Everett, Wash., and locality. He always employed a naphtha launch, which was captured with him. A quantity of firearms was also seized.

A sensational suit was begun in the Circuit Court of Linn County, at Albany on Monday, in which A. W. Blackburn is plaintiff and G. L. Rees is defendant. The plaintiff is a son of Attorney-General Blackburn, of Salem, and is a clerk in his office. The defendant is a former member of the State Board of Agriculture, and last year was a candidate for Representative on the Republican ticket in that county. The plaintiff charges the defendant with alienating the affections of his wife, resulting in separation and divorce, and asks for \$10,000 damages. It is said the case will be warmly defended.

Violators of Law and Anarchy.

Since the assassination of President McKinley a great deal of controversy has been indulged in about anarchists and their disregard for law, not only in Tillamook City but all over the United States. They have been condemned, and rightly so, in the press, from the pulpit and the rostrum. But are the anarchists the only citizens who openly violate the law? Without going farther than Tillamook City we can find plenty of law breakers right here in our midst. For instance, it is a violation of the law for saloons in this city to do business on Sunday, but they do so by the side door process; it is a violation of the law to allow gambling in the saloons, but it is carried on "wide open" nevertheless; it is a violation of the law to start up gambling joints in this city, yet the latest to start up and run unmolested is only a few yards from the Headlight office; it is a violation of the law to allow houses of ill-repute to exist within the corporate limits of this city, but they do exist and from all appearances appear to be multiplying; it is a violation of the law for houses of ill-repute to sell spirituous and malt liquors without taking out a city license, the government has compelled them to do so; it is a violation of the law to run nickel-in-the-slot machines, yet for all that you can luck a slot machine the whole day in a futile attempt to beat a man at his own game with no fear of the owner or player getting pulled. We would like to ask some of the eminent attorneys in Tillamook City if those who openly violate the laws we have enumerated are not, in the eyes of the law, equally as guilty as the anarchist who assassinated President McKinley? This is bringing the question of law and order down to fine points, but if we want to stamp out anarchy and convince anarchists that they cannot violate the law, let a rigid enforcement of the law in every particular be insisted upon, and in thus attempting to remove the beam in our own eye we shall help to pluck the mote from the eye of the anarchist. One peculiar feature connected with the assassination of the President is that most of the municipal bodies have passed resolutions, strongly worded, denouncing the anarchists because they respect no law, yet a lot of these city officials allow the law to be openly violated in their midst and have not the discernment to see that they, the city officials, are sanctioning and aiding the very doctrine taught by the anarchists—a disregard of the law. Consistency is a jewel, but how inconsistent it appears when facts are pointed out. This is getting at the root of anarchy. The editor of the Headlight is no crank on moral crusades on the blood heat and zero process, and it is not for that purpose that this article was written, but we do say this that it is the duty of every citizen to obey and respect the law, and when this is infringed upon the city, state or national authorities should leave no stone unturned to make them do so, whether they be saloon keepers, anarchists, gamblers, etc. It is a bad precedent to allow people to violate the law, and those who do so cannot logically be called good, law-abiding citizens, no matter how much they may prate about their patriotism, republicanism or democracy.
