Execution of Czolgosz.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 21.—Warden Meade, of Auburn Prison, spent several hours today in conference with Superintendent of State Prisons Cornelius V. Collins, arranging the details for carrying out the sentence of death imposed on Leon F. Czolgosz, the murderer of President McKinley. They went carefully over the 1200 requests which have been received for invitations to the execution. There will be but 26 witnesses admitted, the law limiting the number. The prison physician will be assisted in the conduct of the autopsy by Dr. Charles F. Macdonald, ex-president of the State Commission in Lunacy, and one of the greatest experts on insanity in the country. There will be a number of other physicians in attendance.

Superintendent of State Prisons Collins is silent as to whom he will invite, but it is learned that the Sheriff of Erie County, within whose jurisdiction the crime was committed, will receive an invitation. Because of the small attendance that can be had under the statute, there will be but a limited number of representatives of the press present. The details of the execution have been practically completed, and while the prison authorities guard with great secrecy all facts, it is thought the execution will take place before 6 o'clock on the morning of October 28, or if everything cannot be made ready on that day, at a similar hour on the 29th. The work of selecting the jury to sign the death warrant of the murderer has been completed but their names are withheld from publication. They will not be known until the morning of the execution.

Propagation of Salmon.

ASTORIA, Oct. 21.—From the present outlook more young salmon fry will be turned into the Columbia River this Fall than ever before in one year. Master Fish Warden Van Dusen has returned from visiting the hatcheries on the Clackamas and Sandy Rivers. He found that the state hatchery on the Clackamas will have about 4,000,000 eggs and that on the Sandy 2,000,000. The United States hatchery on the former river is expected to turn out 8,000,000. The total amount of young fish which will be turned into the Columbia River this year is estimated at about 60,000,000, of which experts believe that one-tenth will go to sea, mature and return to this river. At the present time the annual pack of the Columbia River, allowing three salmon to the case, represents about 1,000,000 fish. Sixty times this amount will be released this year with a good prospect of 6,000,000 returning. This estimate of course does not take into consideration any but artificially propagated fish. With the agencies now at work the output of the hatcheries in another year should be nearly double that of the present year.

Edward W. Bingham, the well-known Portland lawyer, was seized with a fit of dizziness on Monday about 6 o'clock as he was leaning out of his office window at the Union block, and he fell to the sidewalk, a distance of about 20 feet, sustaining probably fatal injuries. He was taken to St. Nincent's hospital.

Joe Levy, a Frenchman, and two French women, were taken into custody at an early hour Monday morning on suspicion of having been implicated in the murder of the wealthy miser, David Levy, of Boise, Idaho, several weeks ago.

Rev. Geo. W. Olmstead, pastor of the Methodist church at Tower Hill, Ill., pleaded guilty to sending obscene letters through the mail to both men and women, and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.
A petition asking that Cuba be annexed to the United States is being circulated among Cuban business men, and every effort is being centered upon annexation, as business men generally, it is alleged, believe that the reciprocity movement will amount to nothing. A meeting has been arranged for Wednesday next, at which, although held under the guise of reciprocity, it is said the first gun in the campaign for annexation will be fired by Cuba's orators—Senors Desvergne and Lanza and the Marquis de Montora.

While Harvey H. Stanton, of Salem, was returning home last Saturday evening he was attacked by an unknown man on the covered bridge near the Reform School, knocked from his wheel and was stunned from a blow from some heavy weapon. The young man recovered his senses as his assailant was rifling his pockets, and then followed a hand-to-hand struggle in which the thug was thrown off. Young Stanton took to his wheel and started to get away, but the ruffian renewed the attack. Stanton managed to throw the rascal, and putting his knee on him, proceeded to pummel his face. He succeeded in his efforts so well that the attack was not renewed. In fact, the thug was barely able to crawl off.
