Ye Editor and De Preachers.

DEAR SIR:—Permit me, in behalf of the Tillamook Ministerial Association, to remind you of a matter that you, evidently, had forgotten when you penned your editorial condemning the preachers for attempting to do their duty as citizens because, forsooth, they happen to be mostly new ones.

Is it not the duty of ministers, and everybody else, to seek to bring about respect for law and order, so that we may preserve and advance our civilization, and may this duty be overlooked just because a person happens to be a recent arrival in a community?

I know you are ready to give the only proper answers to such questions.

Very well; that is exactly what these men were doing. They asked no candidate in the canvass for city election any more radical question than this, "Are you willing to enforce the laws relating to certain institutions here, which have for a long time violated them?"

Regretting that you did not have the full courage of opinion previously put forth in your paper (and hence did not feel ready to assist in such landable work), but must go out of your way to condemn the very men who were doing this.

[We were glad to receive this letter from the Tillamook ministerial association, for the simple reason that the members of that body have fallen into an erroneous impression about the editor. We thank them for criticizing us and for the opportunity to define our position more fully. The Headlight has never swerved one iota in regard to the enforcement of the law and is just as convinced as ever that it is for the best interest of the city, and, furthermore, we will say this, and emphatically, no matter what the personal of the newly elected officials may be, or whether they obtained office with saloon or prohibition votes, the sentiment of the better element of Tillamook City will have weight with the new city council, for they demand that which is only reasonable, proper and lawful. Where the ministerial association and the editor disagree is whether they introduced prohibition into the election. One of the rev. gentlemen said to us "No, sir, we did not," but for all that the editor cannot seem to break away from the impression he has formed that a strong fight was made for prohibition candidates, but if we formed wrong impressions then we are ready to plead guilty. Another thing, when it was seen that a number of prohibitionists started into the fight without first consulting some of the level headed men and those who have large business interests here, it did not take long to convince us that they were only courting defeat, hence our "Thoughts on the City Election" in our last issue, and not because we wished to "crawfish" as one gentleman prohibitionist insisted that we had done. The editor of the Headlight tries always to tell the truth and picture the truth as earnestly as any member of the ministerial association, and after submitting the article to several parties before and after the election, the consensus of opinion was that we had pictured the situation correctly and expressed the sentiment of the conservative people of this city. The gist of the editorial is proven by the result of the election in the fourth ward. True it is that the press seldom criticizes the pulpit, but as the press is often accused by the pulpit as having no backbone, surely the press has as much right to criticize the pulpit when a wrong course is being pursued to bring about good results, which was the aim of the Headlight as well as the Tillamook ministerial association.

In thanking Rev. Gabriel Sykes for his kindly criticism of the editor in behalf of the Tillamook ministerial association, he has done so in a fair and gentlemanly spirit, and for that reason we show the rev. gentleman the same courtesies, and have refrained from personalities. If at any time Mr. Sykes is under the impression that the Headlight is giving bad advice or pursuing a wrong course in the body politic of Tillamook City we hope he will call our attention to it, for editors are human as much as preachers are, and

both are liable to make mistakes and err in judgment. But, of course, the editor is always the blackest sinner, for he has to put his opinions into cold print, while the preacher has not—no matter how radical they are or how severely he may criticize others—and this is where he has the advantage over the editor.—EDITOR.]

A committee appointed by the legislature of Rhode Island to consider the advisability of establishing a state sanitarium for the treatment of consumptives by the open air method, has made a report in its favor.
