The fame of Tillamook butter is assured, and the yearly increasing output demonstrates the value of Tillamook lands for dairy purposes. It should also emphasize the need of the long-talked-of, frequently projected but still unconstructed Tillamook railroad.—Oregonian.

The only business that came before the city council on Monday was to call the attention of the health officer to "swill" being thrown in some of the back yards and appointing Fred Arthur special policeman to arrest those who may get too fresh on account of imbibing more than their feet and head can carry during the holidays. The council adjourned until the 30th so as to wind up the business for the year.

Let us hope, if Tillamook county is to have a railroad, it will be constructed before the Lewis & Clark Centennial in 1905, for it will only show a lack of enterprise if this county is left without railroad connections. We understand that all projected railroads in Oregon are to be finished by that time. Let us hope, that of all the plans to build a road to Tillamook the past 12 years, one of them have been really projected.

The usual custom in this city of having the Christmas tree entertainments on Christmas eve was to be encroached upon on account of the protracted meetings, and the time set was five o'clock, a most inconvenient hour for parents and the general public. We think we express the sentiment of the community when we say that the protracted meetings should be put off one evening for the Christmas tree entertainments, and we are glad to hear that this will be done.

We call this from the Lincoln County Leader, the neighboring county on the south: "Eli Gaither returned last night from some place. He says he is sorry the Leader's statement that he had gone to Tillamook county was not true, as he would rather be in Tillamook county than any other spot in Oregon." No one doubts Eli's word, for the people who would rather be in Tillamook county than any other spot in Oregon are those who have located here.

One of the newly elected councilmen is wanting an ordinance passed to compel people to keep up their cows the whole year. That is tough on Old Bossy after she has been so industrious all summer mowing down the grass and keeping the city neat and clean in that respect. True it is that some cows will jump the fence and play havoc with gardens and garden truck, which is very annoying. Still for all that there are some redeeming features in the present ordinance.

Governor Geer is in receipt of a contribution of \$250 from three men at Harney, Tillamook County, for a fund for a memorial to the late President McKinley, and the amount will be turned into the bank of Ladd & Bush to be forwarded through the First National Bank of Portland to the headquarters at Cleveland, O. This is the first contribution at the executive office for this patriotic purpose, though it is presumed that Oregon people have made many such through other avenues.

The Tillamook Social Club was organized on Friday evening at Todd's hall for the purpose of affording amusement for its members this winter. The club is to be an up-to-date affair and will meet on Friday evenings. The first officers elected were: President, C. Ben Riesland; vice-president, Henry Crenshaw; secretary, Selma Allen; treasurer, C. F. Franklin; guard, Mr. Zimmerman. The club already numbers about 50 members, including most of the young people and a few married couples.

The report which reached us last week that the lumber barge C. H. Wheeler had been saved is not correct, for subsequent news from Newport, Or., on Friday says the tug Geo. R. Vosburg arrived that morning from Nehalem with appliances to take the C. H. Wheeler off the beach. The barge was found to be broken in two and will be a total loss. Three hundred thousand feet of lumber is still aboard, and will be saved, also the steering gear, capstan, anchors, cable and rigging.

Mr. W. N. Vaughn was in the city on Wednesday, for the first time for over two months, having been down sick and came near being called to the happy hunting ground. This old pioneer is on the mourner's bench and wishes to be forgiven for his sin, for he said, "Before I die I want to be pardoned for one sin. As a rule, people do not trouble much about their political sins, and this is a new departure to see one of our respected citizens confessing and craving for pardon for this particular wrong doing. We wonder whether the other 408 voters are smiting themselves and praying, "Be merciful to me, also a sinner!"

In round figures the financial condition of Tillamook City at the present time is about \$400 in debt, divided about equal between the general and road funds. This will be increased by the end of the year probably by \$150 when December's expenses are added. Considering there were \$400 outstanding warrants when the present council came into office, all of which have been paid, the expenditure has been kept about even with the receipts. Owing to the purchase of the new fire hose and other appliances, amounting to over \$800, which was a large item of expenditure, and placing electric lights in the residence portion of the city, making a good public improvement and one which is appreciated and the money well spent, were expenditures which the previous city council had not to contend with. When the annual reports are made out it will be seen that, considering everything, that the city is in good shape financially, better than most of the councilmen thought, and they can congratulate themselves, with the thanks of the public, that it is so.

The Tillamook Dairy Association, by deciding to erect a new creamery, is fully alive to the changed conditions which are everywhere discernable in the dairy industry in Tillamook county. The association's factory at Fairview has served its day and a more commodious, modern buildings required to handle the business. The formation of the association and the erection of the present creamery were instrumental in causing a greater interest in dairying in that section, so much so that the creamery at Fairview has had a steady growth and did the largest volume of business of any creamery in the county. It is in the line of progress and enterprise that the Tillamook Dairy Association should have a new building with a butter making and cheese factory. We believe it will not be many years before most of the milk will be taken to the larger factories where the cost of manufacture is reduced to the minimum. Where two creameries run at only half capacity it is plain to see that it must cost more to manufacture, in which case either the dairyman or the manufacturer must foot the bill.

#### Here's a Wonderful Contrast.

The blizzards, snow storms and 32 degrees below zero in the East and Middle West the past week is something that is unknown in Tillamook county, and to those who have never experienced such severe weather it reads more like a fairy tale. But the sensation is anything but a fairy feeling when the thermometer is down 30 below zero and a strong wind

blowing. People ought to feel thankful that they live in Tillamook, for, mark the contrast, they are wearing about the same clothing now as they did in the summer and the dairy herds are pasturing in the green meadows. It was heat and drought which paralyzed the East and Middle West last summer, when Tillamook was enjoying a cool and delightful atmosphere, copious and refreshing showers of rain, and the green meadows producing a luxuriant growth of grass and clover and the whole county looking a perfect picture of freshness and beauty. No wonder that people are desirous of coming to Tillamook when they see that the climatic conditions are so different, and where they can enjoy life the whole year without distressing heat in summer and blizzards, snow storms and cold in the winter. Tillamookers are a happy, contented, prosperous and independent class of people, and there is no reason to doubt but what the splendid climatic conditions are responsible for this satisfactory state of affairs. If the people in the East and Middle West, instead of the blizzards, snow and cold, could only enjoy the mild weather which we are enjoying they would think they had landed in paradise, sure, for Tillamook is known as the land of paradise in the Far West. And the farmers and dairymen on the outside, or on the other side of the Coast range, don't know what they are missing, and the money they are losing by not coming to Tillamook and engaging in dairying.
