As it is imperative, for the success of the school, that only a first class principal be employed, it appears to us that the board should try and ascertain what other teachers are available so as to have a number to select from. Personally, we want to see the directors appoint the person who is best suited for the school, and for that reason the board should not be in too much of a hurry in deciding.
At the annual meeting of the Tillamook Creamery Company on Saturday, a 10 per cent dividend on the stock in the creamery was agreed upon and it was decided to pay the directors at the rate of \$2 a day for the time they were attending to the company's business. Unless the river and harbor bill contains an appropriation of \$27,000 for Tillamook, Senator Mitchell will propose an amendment to the bill for that amount when it reaches the senate. Eddy in the state legislature that Senator Mitchell was elected, Mr. Mitchell is pledged to work for an appropriation for the improvement of Tillamook bay and bar. This is something which will not only be a great benefit to Tillamook co., but will materially add to the industrial and commercial wealth of Oregon, and as it is a project which has been long delayed, and one worthy of support, there should not be any opposition to the improvement on account of the cost. It begins to look like old times to see the Oregon delegation at the national capital working for the interest of Oregon now that Senator Mitchell is back there again, and as the last republican county convention in this city was an important factor in sending Mr. Eddy to the state legislature, and consequently Mr. Mitchell to the United States Senate, the republicans in Tillamook county should feel proud that they are in a large measure to be commended for bringing this state of affairs about. It might have been different had the old time anti-Tongue and anti everything but themselves factions had their way. We hope the next republican county convention will be permeated with the same ideas as the last convention, for, taking a retrospective view, it must be admitted it acted wisely.

We are sorry to announce the death of Mr. Jesse W. Carey, who left this city a few weeks ago on a visit to his brother-in-law, Mr. Rolla Canfield, who resides at Agness, Southern Oregon. While on his way there he was taken down with pneumonia at Glendale, Douglas county, where he died last Thursday, Feb. 12th, and was buried there Tuesday. Deceased was born in Hamilton county, Ind., Nov. 15, 1844, and was one of the pioneers of Curry county, Oregon, arriving at that place on October 15, 1869. Deceased leaves a wife and two sons in Tillamook City, one brother and sister in Noblesville, Ind., one brother in Eastern Oregon, and three brothers in South Western Oregon. He had been a resident of Oregon for over 30 years. The news of Mr. Carey's sickness and death was a great shock to the deceased's family, especially as it was impossible for his wife to get out to him. Coos and Curry papers please copy.
A council meeting was held Monday evening with Mayor J. L. Briggs in the chair and Councilmen S. A. Brodhead, W. H. Reynolds and Albert Mason present. The bill of J. A. Taft Co. for electric lights for January, in the sum of \$19, was ordered paid. The city council then entered into an informal discussion of the light question, and as Councilman Mason objected to Mr. Taft charging the city a different rate, he was appointed a committee of one to wait on that gentleman. It was stated that some of the members had called upon Mr. Taft and he had refused to make a reduction. Councilman Reynolds brought up the matter of the marshal's salary, which had been raised by the previous council from \$40 to \$45 per month on account of the warrants having to be discounted. Mr. Reynolds said as the marshal was receiving pay for his warrants he would bring the matter up again. The water question was talked over, and the council appeared undecided whether it wanted to pay the company \$30 a month for the poor protection it gave, especially as the company had broken its promise to put in a larger reservoir, so the matter was left open for future action. Sunday closing of saloons was introduced by Councilman Reynolds. He argued that at no time the saloons were kept closed
