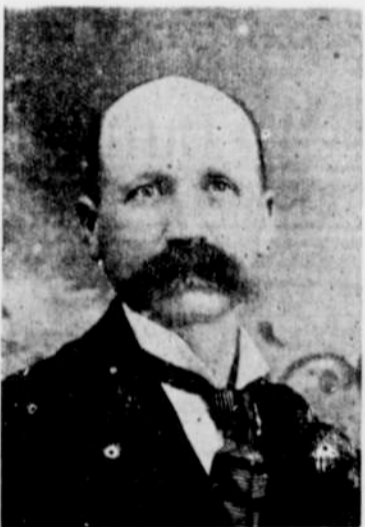

#### To Fight Glass Trust.

St. Louis, Feb. 25.—The St. Louis Plate Glass Company has been formed and will be incorporated under the laws of Missouri with a cash capital of \$2,000,000. It is independent of the glass trust and will be a competitor of that organization. Twelve hundred acres of land have just been purchased at Valley Park, on the Missouri River, 17 miles from the city, the contracts have been let for buildings and machinery, the ground staked off, and by the first of November it is expected to have the plant in operation with a capacity of 20,000 square feet of glass per day, giving employment to 600 men.

At Valley Park it is proposed to found a model town of the Pullman III, type, with paved streets, electric lights, hotels, good houses, schools and churches.

#### Attacks the Monroe Doctrine.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—David Mills continues in the March number of the Empire Review, his strictures on the foreign policy of the United States as embodied in what he described as the "revised edition of the Monroe Doctrine," says a London dispatch to the Tribune. He cites passages from the speeches of President Roosevelt and Senator Lodge, as proof that American diplomacy regards the Western Hemisphere as under the exclusive domination of the United States and as excluded from the established doctrine of international law. He asserts emphatically that all the states of the Western Hemisphere stand on a footing of equality and that the United States has no claim in international laws greater than Canada's rights. He cites President Cleveland's and Secretary Olney's action on the Venezuela question and the Government to allow foreign powers to acquire coaling stations in the West Indies, and argues that the United States will receive some day the same answer which it once gave the Barbary States, "We prefer war to tribute."

#### Killed Sweetheart's Family.

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Angered because his persistent demands for a dowry sufficient to give him a start in housekeeping were refused, and seeking revenge on the family of his sweetheart, George Childrose, a stenographer, today shot and instantly killed Henry Meyer, the girl's father, and slightly wounded Emma Meyer, her sister. Her mother and another sister escaped other shots, intended for them, by rushing into the street. Then believing he had killed the entire family, Childrose sent a bullet through his own brain and fell dead at the door of his sweetheart's room. The couple became engaged last Tuesday, and the young man at once began his demands that the father, a retired mechanic and inventor, furnish money to start the couple in housekeeping. The demands were so large and persist-

ent that the paternal consent to the proposed union was withdrawn. When he was dismissed Childrose vowed to kill the whole family, and the tragedy followed tonight.

#### Emperor's Yacht Launched.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—In a dazzling rain and in the presence of a brilliant assemblage, amidst cheering and the roar of cannon, the German Emperor's new schooner yacht Meteor was launched from Shoc ter's Island today. Unlike the weather, the arrangements were perfect, and no untoward incident marred the occasion. The President, Mrs. and Miss Roosevelt, Prince Henry and the distinguished party accompanying them were enthusiastically cheered on arriving at the platform built just back of the bow of the Meteor.

Without delay after greetings had been exchanged, Miss Roosevelt stepped forward, and, taking hold of a silver-covered bottle containing German champagne, broke it on the side of the vessel. Immediately she seized a silver ax and severed the rope which released the weights holding the Meteor. The vessel went gracefully into the water, with the American flag breaking out at the taff rail. American and German National airs were played, and from scores of craft containing excursionists came enthusiastic cheering.

Miss Roosevelt wore a dress of sapphire-blue velvet, a large black hat trimmed with ostrich feathers, and a fur muff and box.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Before the unveiling given on the Imperial yacht Hohenzollern today in honor of President Roosevelt by Prince Henry of Prussia, a golden bracelet with a picture of Kaiser Wilhelm in diamonds was presented to Miss Alice Roosevelt. It was the Emperor's gift to the young lady as sponsor for the new yacht Meteor. The presentation was made by Prince Henry on behalf of his brother, the Emperor. The Prince made a brief address and the young lady thanked him very much. The bracelet is of very hand some workmanship, and the portrait of the Emperor in diamonds is well made.

#### Scraps of News.

As the result of a collision on the Auburn branch of the New York Central, seven miles west of Auburn, N.Y., between a west-bound passenger train and a steam derrick, five trainmen are dead, two seriously injured and two missing.

The United States transport McClellan, which left New York on Monday for Manila by way of Gioraltar and the Suez Canal, had on board 200 school teachers, most of whom come from the Middle States, the South and West.

John T. Davis and his associates have discovered a mountain of arsenic in a range 50 miles southeast of Tacoma. This is claimed to be the first important body of arsenic ever found in America. The supply heretofore has come from Cornwall. The United States now imports nearly \$100,000 worth yearly.

Senator Frue, president pro. tem. of the Senate, gave directions to the Clerks of the Senate Monday that the names of Senators Tillman and McLaurin, of South Carolina, must not be called on roll calls until further notice. This fixes the status of the Senators, who are practically suspended from all senatorial functions.

The New York Life Insurance Company has commenced a foreclosure suit against the Chamber of Commerce at Portland, the receiver and other parties, to secure possession of the property on a mortgage for \$450,000 long since due, with interest for over two years and \$10,000 attorney's fees.

The Supreme Court on Monday delivered its opinion in the case of Minnesota versus the Northern Securities Company in application of the state to file a bill of complaint in that court. The opinion was read by Justice Shiras, and the motion for leave to file the bill was denied on the ground that this court was without jurisdiction.

Information of the sinking of an unknown vessel and the probable drowning of all on board has been received at Philadelphia. The schooner Fannie Palmer, from Norfolk for Boston, is reported to have collided with an unknown ship 12 miles from Fenwick Shoals, February 19. The vessel sank and it is believed the crew went down with her. Fenwick Shoals is 12 miles south of Cape Henlopen.

Mrs. Annie Whitlock has been awarded the \$500 reward offered by Multnomah county for the arrest and conviction of the murderers of James B. Morrow. Such was the opinion rendered by Judge George on Monday. King escaped with the remark that while he had assisted in bringing the criminals to justice, his connection with the case was such as to put him in a bad light, so much so that he would not be entitled to any consideration.

Cripple Creek, Colo., is in a state of terror, owing to a preconcerted attack upon assay offices doing business in the district. Beginning at 3 o'clock Monday morning, and following in rapid succession, six explosions wrecked as many assay offices in Victor, Cripple Creek and Goldfield. The raiders did not hesitate to jeopardize life, as all but one of the buildings were occupied by sleeping families. Men, women and children were hurled out of their beds by the shocks, and serious injuries inflicted.
