He was paid \$235 for constructing it, the county paying for the material. It is pronounced the worst constructed bridge in the county and had to be braced after it was finished to keep it from falling over. Oh, yes, take a look at it and be convinced that the stability and lasting qualities of Sappington's work are only short lived.  
It is only right to ask what kind of a dicker the Sappington-Maxwell factions made with the Toll-Neuhalem delegation which came down from Nehalem last week? It is reported that the Sappington-Maxwell factions promised, should two delegations come down from Nehalem, as usual, they would seat the delegates from the lower town on the understanding that they vote for the Sappington-Maxwell slate. ### Sappington's Poor Apology.

County Judge G. W. Sappington's reply to the Headlight, published in the Herald, has the ear marks of an attorney's answer to an argument when he has the worst side of a case with no evidence to refute the accusations, consequently had to admit the "graft" and then tries to prove justification that the county received value for the money that had been paid him. But the most amusing part of the reply is the studied silence on the most serious accusations that the Headlight has hurled at Sappington, on points like these: Silent partnership in county contracts, the illegal system of a county judge participating in county contracts, failure to account for monies received for lumber and turning the same over to the county treasurer, the cost of the boarding house and planked road, etc. These are matters which Sappington purposely avoids. Then notice how he tries to crawl fish by throwing the whole responsibility of his connection with the saw mill upon ex-Commissioner C. H. Wheeler and Commissioners C. Ray and L. Parrish. We consider this cowardly, for each of these gentlemen, as well as most people, know Sappington's despot disposition, especially in that of the county saw mill. Sappington did not state that even Ray and Parrish, when they saw the "graft" was greatly on the increase they shut down on it and contracted with the county judge to furnish lumber at \$4. Everybody knows also that this is illegal and not right for either of the members of the commissioner's court to participate in or sanction. The Headlight will answer Sappington's contention that what money he received for work the taxpayers have received value for the money. We deny it, and point to the Beaver Creek bridge

### A Natural Fool, Tool Democrat.

### Another Sappington Muss.

The Whitney, Stinchfield Co. has not paid their taxes for two years. They are willing to do so, and have proffered their money with the exception of the road tax, as they contend that this tax had been expended in the road district in which it was collected, which Judge Sappington, as most everybody knows, has not done. Consequently as the taxes could not be received in part they were declared delinquent and the property advertised and sold by the sheriff. The taxes amount to about \$7,000, and in consequence of not being paid, the county is paying interest on outstanding warrants for that amount. Of course this will cause litigation. When the case comes up for argument and Sappington is put on the stand he will have to admit that he has deprived most of the road districts of their road funds, and, consequently, of road improvements, and should the case be decided against the county because the county court has exceeded its discretionary powers by neglecting some road districts for the benefit of others, coupled with the fact that the county judge was a contractor in building bridges at a big profit and was a contractor for plank, etc., etc., it is going to cause a muss in refunding the road tax. Oh, yes, the county judge has placed the county over the barrel by riding the saw mill and boarding house hobby horses to death.

### Referred to County Court.

A correspondent in the Ocean Wave, signing himself "L.," in commenting upon the "Sappington Graft" article in the Headlight, has asked several questions which this newspaper has already dealt with. We thought we had made most of these questions plain by showing them up quite recently, but as this is an opportune time to give Judge Sappington a "square deal," instead of the Headlight answering them right off we will first refer them to the county court to answer. Here they are:  
These are all valid objections but will the Headlight be more explicit, the people want more light, for instance who appointed the judge to run the sawmill?  
Who authorized the judge to run the boarding house at the expense of the taxpayers and who audited the bills for the provisions?  
Who gave the judge the contract to furnish the lumber for roads?  
If the judge has any silent partners who are they?  
What authorized the judge to build unsubstantial bridges, and who approved the bill for big pay?  
Whose teams did the judge send from the south end of the county to Bay City and at what price?  
A court-martial has been ordered to try Major Littleton T. Waller and Lieutenant John H. Day, of the Marine Corps, on March 17 next, on the charge of executing natives of the Island of Samar without trial. Some of the circumstances in the case are peculiarly atrocious. One native was tied to a tree and publicly shot in the thigh. The next day the man was shot in the arm. The third day he was shot in the body, and the fourth day the native was killed. Friends of the two officers attribute their actions to loss of mind due to privation which they suffered in the Island of Samar.

### General Methuen and four guns have been captured by General Delarey.

General Methuen was wounded in the thigh. Three British officers and 38 men were killed. Five British officers and 72 men were wounded. One British officer and 200 men are missing. The fight in which General Methuen was captured occurred before dawn, March 7, between Wynburg and Lichtenburg, Orange River Colony. The British forces numbered 1200 men. The Boers captured all the British baggage. General Methuen is retained as a prisoner.
