The Steamship Competition.

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.]
DEAR SIR,—The long looked for has come. Low rates on passenger and freight transportation. C. H. Wheeler has consented to take a controlling interest in the new wharf to be built on Hoquarton slough. This is going to be a wharf for the accommodation of the public, presenting two sides for deep water landing, and being commodious, large and close to the business center.
The company backing this enterprise is able to draw on a reserve of millions, so that competition does not cut any figure. The Vosburg will temporarily handle the work, while a large boat is being built for the run. This new craft is going to be a vessel made for the pleasure and comfort of the public.
Passengers rates will be \$3.50 each way, and freight rates to merchants will be \$3.50 per ton. If the merchants and business men of this county want to be able to get in more freight let them assist a few rustlers to get in more passengers. People is what we want and must have to make this country what it ought to be. The Vosburg is determined to do what it can to turn the tide of emigration this way—help her along. It will develop our water front, increase our passenger lists by seventy-five per cent, and be an incentive for prospective settlers to come and look at our opportunities. When once landed here, people seldom leave.
Competition in transportation rates always attracts the attention of the public. The Vosburg is heavy competition has come to stay. Help her along. Don't think that the Elmore, just because she has made you a slave to her traffic and arbitrary rulings, is going to continue to hold you in her iron grip. Progress always emancipates the oppressed—throw off the yoke and help the new undertaking along. You want to be on the successful side, don't you? Well, you know the rest.

U'Ren, Senator Direct Legislation League, Oregon City, Or.—Dear Sir: I beg to acknowledge receipt of yours of February 17, just received, in which you state that the Portland Board of Trade has referred to its committee on legislation League of Oregon for their indorsement and approval of the proposed amendment, to the constitution of the State of Oregon, providing for the initiative and referendum.
I think you know without any expression from me that I not only am now but have been for years heartily in favor of this proposed amendment, and I have no hesitation in expressing myself at all proper times and in all proper ways in its favor.
