The new creamery, erected for the Tillamook Dairy Association in the place of the old factory at Fairview, commenced manufacturing butter on Tuesday.
Mesdames Harrison and Shrader gave a "Cat Social" in Todd's hall on Tuesday evening, which proved to be a well attended and enjoyable affair.
School Clerk Coates gives notice that all outstanding warrants against this school district should be presented for payment and interest will cease from this date.
The democratic primaries were held on Saturday, but there was very little interest taken in them. The democratic county convention is set for Saturday in this city.
Dr. O. H. Davenport made a quick trip to Portland, leaving on the Vossburg on Friday he had one day in Portland on Saturday and was back in this city on Sunday evening.
It has been decided to locate the Tillamook County Bank on the lot where Mr. T. Coates has his office, and Mr. S. A. Brodhead has the contract to put up a new building 18ft. by 40ft.
Mr. B. L. Eddy went out to Portland on the steamer Monday morning to attend the republican state convention in Portland, and Mr. A. W. Severance left the same evening on the stage for the same purpose.
The steamer Geo. R. Vosburg when coming to this city Wednesday, owing to the low stage of the tide, ran aground when off the Elmore place and remained there until the next tide. She reached this city the same evening and left again this morning.
From the number of passengers who patronize the Geo. R. Vosburg, it is plain to see that the traveling public appreciate the competition in passenger rates, for it is plain to everyone that \$5 is too much from Tillamook to Astoria, and that the probability of having to lay over for several days, while this is no inducement to home seekers to come here.
Mr. U. Henderson, who brought Rev. C. Mills and wife in from Sheridan, made the statement that a few years ago he invested \$50 in Angora goats and put them in the foot hills of the Coast range near Sheridan, and after keeping them four and a half years, he sold the herd, including the mohair he had previously sold, realized \$925 on the investment.
Mr. E. D. Hoag, recorder of Star lodge, A.O.U.W., received on Saturday from the Grand lodge of Oregon a check to pay the death claim of the late C. W. Vaughn in the sum of \$1,000, who died the beginning of March. This shows the promptness in which the Ancient Order of United Workmen pay their death losses. We are glad to state that Star lodge is again taking in a number of new members, and as the order is the oldest and safest of all the beneficiary fraternal orders, it gives life insurance at as low a figure as it is possible to make it.
A fine of \$500 was imposed by Collector of Customs Fox at Astoria on Saturday on the tug George R. Vosburg, Captain Loll, for violation of section 4, 475 Revised Statutes, namely, unlaw-

fully carrying more passengers than is stated in the certificate of inspection. The tug arrived at Astoria from Tillamook and brought 28 passengers, while her certificate allows her to carry only 12. As the custom officials were waiting the arrival of the Vosburg at Astoria, it is thought they must have been notified by someone wiring to them from Tillamook. Who did so?
J. L. Vosburg, of Tillamook, is visiting at the home of Dr. George B. Van Waters, his brother-in-law, at the rectory on East Morrison street. Mr. Vosburg is connected with the Wheeler Lumber Company, which is having the lumber schooner built in the Johnston shipyard. He says that the Wheeler Lumber Company has been making extensive improvements in its sawmill, nearly reconstructing it. He says further that the people are very much interested in the steps which are being taken for the construction of a railway, and is of the opinion that Portland will reap a great advantage from such a railway, owing to the vast resources of that county, which, he says, is an empire in itself.—Oregonian.
Tillamook Cases Affirmed.
Otto Johnson, respondent, vs. James F. Tomlinson appellant, from Tillamook County, R. P. Boise, Judge, affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Beun.
This was a suit to quiet title to a small strip of land lying between the Government meander line and the line of ordinary high water in Tillamook and Trask rivers, both of which are tidal streams. The plaintiff contended that the land in controversy was upland, and belonged to him; the defendant claimed under a deed from the state, contending that the land was tideland. The Circuit Court decided in favor of Johnson, whereupon Tomlinson appealed.
The Supreme Court, in affirming the lower court, lays down the following rule of law:
"Where a stream is intended to be meandered by public surveys, the stream, and not the actual meander line, as run on the riparian owner's."
After an examination of the testimony it is held that there is a strip of upland lying between the meander line and the actual line as run by the Government and the line of ordinary high water, and that this land belongs to plaintiff, who is acknowledged to be the owner to the meander line.
Orpha Cutting, guardian, and Katie R. Wilson, appellants, vs. Fred Scherzinger, I. W. Helms and T. J. Lucy and G. H. Page, petitioners, respondents, from Tillamook County, R. P. Boise, Judge, affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Beun.
This was an appeal from a decree affirming in part an order of the County Court setting a guardian account. The bondsmen petitioned the County Court to credit the guardian with sums of money expended by him for the support, maintenance and education of his wards. At the same time, Orpha Cutting, who had been appointed guardian when C. D. Cutting was removed, filed a petition asking the court to approve as his final account a statement filed by C. G. Cutting. The court, however, decided that the credit should be allowed, and an appeal was taken.
The Supreme Court lays down the general rule that a guardian should procure authority from the County Court before expending any of the principal of the guardianship funds in his hands, but nevertheless he may expend such funds for the maintenance of his ward and thereafter have the court approve his action and allow him credit therefor. After a review of the evidence the Supreme Court holds that the money was actually expended as claimed by the bondsmen, and that the County Court properly gave the guardian credit therefor.

TO BUILD NEW BRIDGES. County Court Gives the Contract to F. L. Sappington.

The county court met on Saturday, with County Judge G. W. Sappington and Commissioner C. Ray present, for the purpose of opening bids for the construction of new bridges.
In the matter of the construction of a bridge across Wilson river at or near G. T. Jenkins' place, and the awarding of a contract, A. M. Austin, county surveyor not appearing, the bids filed with the County Clerk were duly opened in the presence of the court, as follows:
W. D. Wood and Frank Long's bid was \$2900.00; for the approaches per lineal foot, \$2.33.
F. L. Sappington's bid was \$3435.00; for the approaches per lineal foot, \$1.75.
C. F. Royal & Son's bid, on two plans, as follows: No. 1 construction, \$2810.00; No. 2 construction, \$2590.00; for the approaches per lineal foot, \$1.68.
The Puget Sound and Dredging Co.'s bid, \$2920.50; for the approaches 16 feet wide per lineal foot, \$2.59; 18 feet wide per lineal foot, \$3.25.
G. O. Nolan's bid, without furnishing or referring to plans or specifications, \$2170.00.
It appearing to the satisfaction of the court that the bid of G. O. Nolan was too indefinite, the bid was rejected, and it further appearing that the bid of F. L. Sappington was the lowest bidder for the construction of the bridge and approaches, it was ordered that the construction be awarded to F. L. Sappington upon his executing a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$500 to be approved by the Clerk, and it was further ordered that G. W. Sappington, County Judge, and Homer Mason, County Clerk, be authorized to execute on his part of the county a contract with F. L. Sappington in accordance with his bid.
In the matter of the construction of a bridge across Trask river at or near Lewis Johnson's place, bids were opened as follows:
W. D. Wood and Frank Long's bid was \$2900.00; for the approaches per lineal foot \$2.33.
F. L. Sappington's bid was \$2435.00; for the approaches per lineal foot, \$1.75.
C. F. Royal & Son's bid was, No. 1 construction, \$2810.00; No. 2 construction, \$2590.00; for approaches per lineal foot, \$1.68.
G. O. Nolan's bid for the construction without furnishing or referring to plans or specifications, \$2265.00.
It appearing to the satisfaction of the court that the bid of G. O. Nolan was too indefinite, the same was rejected, and it further appearing to the court that the bid of F. L. Sappington was the lowest, it was ordered that the contract be awarded to F. L. Sappington upon executing a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$500.00 to be approved by the clerk, and it was further ordered that G. W. Sappington, County Judge, and Homer Mason, County Clerk be authorized and directed to execute on the part of the county a contract with F. L. Sappington in accordance with his bid.
In the matter of the sale for delinquent taxes for the year 1900 of the lands belonging to Whitney, Stinchfield & Remick, the sales were ordered cancelled upon payment of the taxes, without the cost which have accrued by advertising.

publican county convention. Here's the ludicrous point. The republican primaries, and especially the republican convention, were almost unanimous in their opposition to Sappington, yet Watson, Sappington's little henchman and poor tool of a newspaper and saloon tooter, is representing (?) the republicans of Tillamook at the state convention. This is not a very flattering picture, gentlemen, but you are at liberty to pass your opinion upon it and decide whether you like inconsistent politics.
Governor Geer has only himself to thank for his defeat in failing to secure re-nomination. When he vetoed the Portland city charter at the request of Simon in face of a movement the people in Multnomah county had been fighting for several years and happened to win on two years ago, Geer put himself in an unenviable position in the public mind by committing such a serious political blunder. He exercised poor discretion when he obeyed one man rule and disregarded the will of the people. It has turned out exactly as the HEADLIGHT predicted at the time, and Geer thereby lost the chance of a life time to become United States senator. The Simon people knew what kind of a trap they had caught Geer in, and it is safe to say that they are now rejoicing with a great deal of satisfaction at Geer's downfall. This was only another Simon trick to get Geer out of the way.
Probably, when everything is considered, it is not at all surprising that the county court should have ignored the law and business methods in calling for bids and letting the contract for the construction of bridges across the Wilson and Trask rivers. Let us refresh our readers' memory a little, for the law says the county surveyor shall make complete surveys, plans, specifications and estimates for all bridges, culverts, roads, ditches or other public works to be constructed under the authority of the county court, and shall report the same with his recommendations thereon. It is plain that the county court has entirely ignored this part of the law, for the reason, no doubt, that County Judge Sappington has no use for County Asses-

sor Austin. Consequently the court, not the surveyor as the law requires, advertised for bids, and the most peculiar part of this was each bidder was to furnish his own plans. Here is the most unbusiness like transaction, for with no plans and specification from which all bidders could figure, each had to furnish his own plan, consequently no two bidders are able to bid on the same work. No business man, or dairyman, if he was going to build a residence, would do so in that way, without there was something behind the scenes. And, further, what is it going to cost for shears and the total amount for each bridge when finished?
It has been common gossip ever since the county court took up the matter of building these bridges that an injunction could be served upon the court, but by whom we have been unable to learn, and that it could be made to stick on account of the indebtedness of the county and the manner in which the county court ignored the law in regard to the county surveyor preparing plans and specifications, is not doubted by those who are versed enough in law to give an opinion.
The HEADLIGHT is not opposing public improvement, nor the building of the bridges across the Trask and Wilson rivers, although there are a number of people who contend that other parts of the county are in more need of bridges. However that may be, we are content to leave that to the discretion of the county court.
