The President informed Senator Hans-The President informed Senator Hans-brough and Representatives Moody, of Oregon : Metcalf, of California, and Reeder, of Kansas, that he would veto the irrigation bill if it passed with sec-tion 8, which provides for the state con-trol of reservoirs and ditches. 
