Sparks from the Anvil.

Will John D. Edwards reside inside or outside when the election is over?

It is amusing to hear the untrified talk. It's two years since they indulged in it, so we would not deprive them of what little pleasure they enjoy simply chewing the rag.

Mr. Charles Grissom, of McMinnville, received the nomination on the democratic ticket for joint representative for Yamhill and Tillamook counties. Poor fellow. The republicans in Tillamook won't do a thing to him next June.

Simon's fine political work can be seen in the fusion movement in Portland. It is nothing more than a prostitution of Simonized republicans with the democratic party of Multnomah county. Will someone please keep the pedigree.

A number of the delegations to the democratic state convention pungled up \$50 for campaign purposes. What was the matter with the Tillamook delegation, John? Surely it was not still suffering with democratic hard times after so many years of republican prosperity.

The editor felt a little amused when told on Monday that a report was being circulated that the Tillamook newspapers were going to oppose Furnish. It was certainly news to us. Those who set the report about will have occasion to sing a different key when the band begins to play.

The plank in the republican platform of Tillamook, and latter in the state platform, for the retention of the Philippine islands appears to be causing favor-able comment from the press, and it is only right that it should, for the republicans over in Tillamook knew what they were about when they made the retention of these islands the battle cry of the republican party.

As long as the democratic party advocates the surrender of the Philippine Islands, it must expect defeat. We glory in the plank of the republican party for holding on to the islands. This is to be the issue between republicans and democrats, for the gamut has been thrown down by the latter, who says "Let's scuttle out of the Philippines," to which the republicans reply, "No, gentlemen, we're there to stay."

The Ocean Wave says the democratic convention left the office of school superintendent vacant. You can't ruffle George's temper with a statement like that, for the law gives him permission to hold on for another two years—no court the school marins if he wants to. Probably the other candidates think George has a snap and wonder why they should be put through the political mill again and not the school superintendent.

"You look back over the Headlight for the past two years and you'll find that what Baker predicted in politics and in most other things have turned out exactly as the Headlight said they would," remarked a juror on the street Monday. So they're beginning to catch on, even though some people are ready to commend the editor one week and rip him up the back the next week. However, such is life in a newspaper office in the far West.

Governor Geer in defending himself from misrepresentation and speaking of politics, said, among other things in a letter to the Oregonian, that "As an exclusive, or even as a partial business, it is more likely to lead an honest man to the poor house than elsewhere." That is probably true of politics in Marion and Multnomah, because it is almost impossible for an honest man to remain honest in those counties after once getting into politics, to wit, Governor Geer's veto of the Portland city charter.

Conduct unbecoming a chairman at a republican primary in Tillamook county comes high, for C. E. Hadley was fined \$100 on two counts on a charge of assault and battery. Ex-Senator J. W. Maxwell can congratulate himself that his ungentlemanly language at the Fairview republican primary was not also made the cause of an action in which he could have been arraigned before the circuit judge. But newspaper men prefer to inflict their own penalty, in their own way, upon those who malign them, for they know the power of the press.

Mr. San Downs, chairman of the democratic county central committee, whose duty it will be to manage the campaign for the untrified, thinks he could accomplish something if he had the republican campaign to manage, but not otherwise. Sam is mistaken, for he had just as well start in to dig the political grave and compose the epitaph. And by way of a suggestion we offer:

Mr. George E. Chamberlain has been nominated on the democratic ticket for governor, and the untrified are congratulating themselves that they have a strong candidate. We beg to differ with our democratic friends, as they will realize when the fight is over. What has brought Chamberlain into prominence is the fact that he has been shrewd enough to hob up at times when the republican party was divided and obtained prominence by associating himself on the popular side. We think he has missed the mark this time, for anything that is tinged with Simonism is not going to be popular in this campaign, as Chamberlain will find to his sorrow when the scrimmage is over.

The factional fight in the republican party of Tillamook county is gradually simmering down, as it certainly should, for those who took part in it realize now

that all personal feeling in the matter should be a thing of the past and that the republicans must go to the polls united, shoulder to shoulder. It will give Tillamook a bad reputation if a few disgruntled republicans should be the means of reducing the regular republican majority of two to one, but as to jeopardizing the county ticket or any of the candidates, that is out of the question. The question is, can the republicans beat the democrats more than two to one? Let's try.

Since the Herald failed in its efforts to graft another four years graft upon the taxpayers of Tillamook county, and having been subsidized with free whiskey for that purpose by the rule or ruin faction, that newspaper has never offered a word of explanation why public opinion was so unanimous against what it had been advocating—graft. So nonplussed was the Herald at the drift of public opinion that it has been mum ever since, so much so it has not even raked up a cuss word to compliment the editor of the Headlight for taking up the fight in the interest of the taxpayers of Tillamook. We leave it to the taxpayers to decide which of the Herald or local newspapers is deserving of support and expressed the sentiment of the taxpayers, irrespective of party, in the recent little scrimmage as to who should administer county affairs for the next year.

The party in the south part of the county who occasionally prey on the Ocean Wave about the court house ring must be the real and original ring, for no one knows anything about a court house ring in Tillamook City, so it must be more often located in the south part of the county than anywhere else. But let us quote from the Ocean Wave, which says that our readers may better understand:

"I have heard of green goods and sure-thing men, but never met them until the republican convention at Tillamook, when I met what we call the courthouse ring, down here. When two or three men in a party can make up a slate for a whole county ticket and one of them take a long whip, or tongue I might have said and say 'Line up there you tea-pullers of the south end and vote straight—we are the people,' and sit on the throne and tell the republicans of the south end who shall be their commissioner in that end of the county, brother republicans it is time to get off the car and get in shape to do some scratching next June."

Just to show the absurdity of this letter and that the alleged court house ring did not control the republican convention, let us give the first vote for county commissioner: C. Ray, 9; M. R. Hansen, 18; G. W. Bodyfelt, 13; J. W. Hellenbrand, 9; C. B. Wiley, 12; A. D. Sanders, 6; Roek, 1; A. Benchid, 1; W. West, 2; E. Leach, 1. This ought to convince everyone, with so many candidates, that no one had said to the delegates "Line up there you tea-pullers of the south end and vote her straight," with the exception of, probably, the party who wrote the letter, but delegates did not propose to be rode by a republican (?) who wanted to and is willing yet to "Scratch 'em!"
