A court-martial has been ordered for the trial of General Jacob H. Smith, who was in command of the United States troops on the Island of Samar.

In view of the published reports that Speaker Henderson is opposed to the ship subsidy bill, following the opposition of the Iowa Senators, it was stated by those aware of the Speaker's views that he has expressed no opinion and reaches no conclusion on the subject thus far.

It seems hardly credible that business circulars of firms in the United States should be sent to England to be mailed there to addresses in the United States for the purpose of saving postage, yet this is the actual fact, according to the Herald correspondent at London.

The three earthquakes on Friday night reduced to ruins Quesaltenango, the second city of importance in Guatemala, and having 25,000 inhabitants, and completely destroyed the town of Amatitlan. Both of these towns were capitals of the departments of the same name each bears.

While the Central West is sweltering in Summer temperatures, Nevada, Wyoming, Idaho, Southern Montana and parts of Utah and Colorado are experiencing a snow storm that at some points has taken on the proportions of a blizzard.

While there is little or no probability that Congress will at this session vote to restore the army canteen, a determined effort will be made to build up the post exchange. The post exchange, by the way, is the old canteen with the sale of beer eliminated.

By a vote of 247 to 52, the House passed the Cuban reciprocity bill, amended to remove the differential on refined sugar. The bill shows that 142 Republicans and 123 Democrats voted for the bill and 42 Republicans and 10 Democrats against it.

Dr. Pentecost, who was appointed to go to Manila and organize missionary work for the Presbyterian church, spoke on "The Moral Condition of the Philippine Islands." He said: "Millions of inhabitants of these islands do not live up to the standard of half-civilized people, and not a few tribes are still barbarous, wholly unteched and totally ignorant of civilization or government."

A Helena, Mont., special says: Four physicians who were called in consultation last night in the case of Thomas Crystal, who was shot last Friday by J. S. Keeler, former president of the Montana Engineers Society, are unanimous in their findings that Crystal's spinal cord was completely severed by a bullet, an injury that usually causes instant death.

After the turbulent scene of Friday-morning the passage of the revised Cuban reciprocity bill, the House settled down to routine business Saturday. An opportunity was found however for the two elements in the recent struggle to give expression to their feelings.

It is true that General Mills, the Commanding General, has access to all military reports. That is one of the functions of his office that has not been abridged, except in rare cases.

The United States Supreme Court granted leave to the State of Washington to file an original bill for an injunction against the Great Northern Railway Company, the Northern Pacific Railway Company, and the Northern Securities Company, in connection with the petition of that state recently filed in the courts.

By order of President Hill, Great Northern engineers have taken up the question of early utilization of water in the Cascade Mountains for generation of electric power with which to operate Great Northern trains across the Cascade Mountains for a distance of 100 miles, in the statement made by the Tacoma, Wash., correspondent of the Inter Ocean.

Dawson telegrams state melting snows have formed streams sufficient to permit clean-up operations. The washing out of gold commenced last week, and will keep up for two months. During the winter the greatest damage in the camp's history have been thrown up on the banks of the creeks, insuring an aggregate clean-up estimated at \$30,000,000.

George E. Chamberlain, Democratic candidate for Governor, has received a letter from Judge Stephens A. Lowell of Umatilla County, the prominent jurist and distinguished politician, who was himself prominently mentioned for the office of Governor, in which he congratulates Mr. Chamberlain on his nomination and assures him of his hearty support at the coming election.

Judge Lowell writes that he is "opposed to the high office of Governor of the state becoming a matter of bargain money, and as a reproach to the methods of a political freebooter, I shall vote and work for the Democratic candidate."

150 Lives Lost on Burning Ship.

CAIRO, Ill., April 21.—One of the worst disasters in the history of river navigation occurred shortly after 4 o'clock Sunday morning near Ogden's Landing, near this city. While almost all on board were asleep, the steamer City of Pittsburg, from Cincinnati to Memphis, was discovered to be on fire, and in a few moments was burned to the water's edge. The loss of over \$80,000 on the steamer does not include the cargo, both being a total loss.

The fire was discovered in the forward ward hatch at 4:05 A. M. and burned fiercely. Most of the passengers were still in bed when Second Clerk Phillips gave the alarm. The engineers at once started all the pumping engines, and the crew brought all the hoses into play. Amid the streams of water on all sides, the flames from the lower deck and dense clouds of smoke, the passengers rushed from their staterooms and a frightful panic ensued. The appeals of the officers and crew could not appease the terror-stricken crowds that interfered with those who threw water on the flames, as well as those working with the lifeboats. Few could adjust life preservers or do anything else for themselves. Boats from the shore took off numerous passengers.

CAIRO, Ill., April 21.—Although no complete list of either the victims or survivors is yet obtainable, investigation today indicates that almost one-half of the 150 people on the City of Pittsburg were lost when that ill-fated steamer was burned yesterday at Ogden's Landing, between this city and Paducah.

Nora Fuller Mystery About Cleared Up.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—The local police claim this morning to have discovered the identity of the murderer of Nora Fuller, the 15-year-old girl who was assaulted and murdered in a vacant house on Geary street.

Hadley was well known and it was only a few days ago that suspicion was directed toward him and that was on account of his inexplicable absence from his place of employment. It hardly seems possible that he is the murderer, yet the police so declare. His absence is certainly a suspicious circumstance. The murderer lured his young victim to death by advertising for a girl to do house work. Nora Fuller, the helper of a poor mother and a large family of children, answered the advertisement. The girl, with the mother's consent, met the man, who was known as Hawkins, at the Popular restaurant at 5 one evening. She was not seen alive again. Her body was found in a Geary-street house 10 days later. The man had assaulted her and killed her to hide his crime. Evidence was found to show that the

fiend had deliberately planned to lure some girl to the place, as he had rented it, and put a bed in a top back room. There was no other furniture.

No body saw the couple go to the house, and up to today there has been no evidence to show the identity of the murderer, except that he was known to Proprietor Krone, of the Popular restaurant as C. R. Hawkins, under which name he bought the second-hand bedstead.

The news that the police charged Hadley with the crime has caused a sensation here. The police have wired his name and description to all cities in the United States and the principal foreign cities.

Chief of Detective Seymour believes that Hadley has committed suicide.
