"NO SMALLPOX!" Says Dr. Bartel, but it is Up Against Him to Prove It!

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.] In your last week's paper, rather unpleasant mention is made of me in connection with the Loomis case. As a fair-minded man I believe you to be, I ask of you to allow me to answer.

Being frequently questioned about the reported smallpox, I went and examined Mr. Loomis to satisfy myself. However, I did not give nor intimate my opinion to him nor any of his folks.

When I did give it the next day I was requested to do so by Mr. Loomis and Dr. Smith. I, therefore, had a perfect right to do so.

Mrs. Loomis, to make sure that word should reach me, sent word through the city marshal, Dr. Smith and Mr. Jasper Smith, successively.

Dr. Smith and I had quite a talk about the case. He giving for proof that Mr. Loomis had been exposed to smallpox, or what was supposed to be smallpox, just thirteen days before. That when called in Mr. Loomis was suffering pain in back, arms, legs, more or less nausea and headache.

Admitting, however, that the proof was very circumstantial, only two or three eruptions appearing, I expressed my preference to keep out of the case.

When Dr. Smith told me he was done with the case, had discharged him, and that I should go and see Mr. Loomis. Furthermore, that I should turn him loose if I thought him free from smallpox.

Yet I had no notion of going until Mr. Jasper Smith brought me word to be sure to go.

Being thus sent for and having the attending physician's permission, I went and found Mr. Loomis recovering from the soreness of arms, legs and back resulting from operating Mr. Nodine's patent armstrong sternwheel schooner, or whatever you may call the craft. It appears that Mr. Loomis and party took passage in said vessel and worked their way down to Garibaldi and back the same day, reaching home utterly exhausted.

This might explain the sore arms, legs and back. Now as such unaccustomed exertion and exhaustion usually disturbs digestion, the result would be nausea and headache.

As to the eruptions, I found some pimples, such as any young man may sport with perfect propriety. These were in their various stages of development, the last one appearing three or four days earlier, otherwise there was not the slightest evidence of disease, consequently I was obliged to say: "No smallpox."

It appears that Dr. Smith had told Mr. Loomis also, that, in case I should not pronounce it smallpox, Mr. Loomis should go free. This information they gave me after making my diagnosis.

As to the findings of Drs. Wiley and Smith, they were no surprise to many, for they agreed also against Dr. Mills in the examinations of the cases south of town. However, the subsequent course of the disease has proven Dr. Mills correct, as also does a personal examination of the Wells case by myself upon request of Mr. Wells.

If Mr. Loomis was broken out with smallpox as has been asserted, he should have been quarantined for at least three weeks from date of appearance of eruption, as that always runs a definite specific course, characteristic to smallpox only.

This eruption heals off not short of 18 days and may last 24 or more days, consequently the power of contagion lasts that long.

Therefore, Mr. Loomis at large is dangerous to the community if he really suffered from smallpox, and the authorities ordering his release have committed a grave error. As the disease never abates itself after reaching the eruption stage, but runs its full course, though mild it be, and as Mr. Loomis has no such eruptions of the specific nature of smallpox, for he has been discharged from a ten days quarantine as cured. It follows that Mr. Loomis was not afflicted with smallpox.

[When the present smallpox epidemic

first made its appearance about two years since, owing to its mild form, not a few doctors took up a position and contended that the disease was not smallpox. Whether this was because some of them lacked the experience and did not know or that they were sparing for a little newspaper notoriety, we are not in a position to know. One thing is certain, the medical profession has come to the conclusion that it is smallpox and precautions are being taken, wherever it breaks out, to quarantine it, both in large and small town towns and in rural districts, building pest houses and having trained nurses to attend the cases.

Not being in the medical profession, it is not expected that we can decide either way, but in looking at the situation from a common sense standpoint we must admit that it is smallpox or that the leading men in the medical profession in our large cities are a lot of ignoramuses and the precautions which are being taken to prevent it spreading is all humbug. That is the only conclusion that a layman can draw whose mind is not prejudiced one way or the other. Now as to the contention about the cases in Tillamook, right from the first Dr. Bartel was hostile because the county and city officials did not employ him to consult with the other doctors, consequently he made it somewhat of a personal grievance. Drs. Wiley and Smith, being the oldest, and recognized the ablest doctors in the city, it was only natural that the authorities should rely upon them to ascertain whether it was smallpox or not. That they emphatically pronounced the disease smallpox is well-known, and they continue to do so, consequently the city and county authorities took the necessary precautions to have the cases quarantined, exactly what other places were doing. Under all the circumstances, with Drs. Wiley and Smith's experience with smallpox cases, it certainly seems to us that those who want to differ with these gentlemen are adducing nothing to substantiate their assertions, and as to Dr. Bartel's letter throwing any additional light on the subject it does not, for the burden of the letter is that Drs. Wiley and Smith and the county and city officials are all wrong, while Dr. Bartel, who has his reputation yet to gain as a successful practitioner in Tillamook, knows it all. Such an absurd notion is altogether too ridiculous. Before coming to Tillamook Dr. Smith attended several hundred persons in Eastern Oregon suffering with the same disease, and, furthermore, he is willing, we understand, to send for a specialist, and if it is not pronounced smallpox, he would bear the expenses. Now it is up to Dr. Bartel to take up this proposition to sustain his contention that it is not smallpox. Will he do it? If not, then he should be the last man to rush into print and take the position he has, when the burden of proof is against him. For the good of the general public we hope there will be no crowding, and we shall have no object to Dr. Bartel depositing the money to pay the expenses of an expert, at the HEADLIGHT office, to be returned to him if the specialist says "No smallpox!"—EDITOR.]

Ordinance No. 134. An Ordinance to vacate Henshaw's Addition to Tillamook (now Tillamook City), Tillamook County, Oregon.

Whereas W. S. Hays has petitioned the Common Council of Tillamook City to vacate the lots, blocks and streets of Henshaw's Addition to Tillamook, (now within the corporate limits of Tillamook City,) and

Whereas on the 18th day of August, 1890, one Al Henshaw was the owner of the following described real estate situated in Tillamook County, Oregon, to-wit:

Beginning at a point five hundred seventy (570) feet West and twenty-six hundred and five (2605) feet South of the northeast corner of the E. Thomas Donation Land Claim; running thence south four hundred eighty (480) feet; thence west four hundred eighty (480) feet; thence north four hundred eighty (480) feet; thence east four hundred eighty (480) feet to the point of beginning, containing one and twenty-nine hundredths (5.29) acres, lying in Section 25 in Township 1 South of Range 10 West of Willamette Meridian.

And on said last mentioned date said Al Henshaw and wife platted and attempted to dedicate an addition to the town of Tillamook (now Tillamook City) upon the said described tract of land, but that owing to an error in the description of the land in said plat and dedication, the said plat and dedication failed to cover the greater part of the land intended to be covered, but which largely to land which did not belong to said Henshaw or to his wife, but was owned by other persons, and

Whereas said addition has never improved and no lots or blocks have been sold out of the same, but the said tract of land has ever since said attempted dedication remained vacant and unused for agricultural purposes and no road, street, alley or other public highway has ever been opened through the same, and

Whereas, said W. S. Hays has become the owner of all the said described tracts of land and of all the lots and blocks intended to be platted as said Henshaw's Addition; and

Whereas, the vacation of said plat of said Henshaw's Addition would not obstruct any public road or highway laid out or established by law, and no person whatever has made any objection to said vacation and no person whatever has any interest opposed to the vacation of said addition; that the petition of said W. S. Hays for the vacation of said Henshaw's Addition was filed with the City Recorder of Tillamook City, on said March 17th, 1902, and written notice of said petition was, on said March 17th, 1902, set up in three of the most public places in Tillamook City, containing a description of the property to be vacated, and said notices were posted for more than thirty days prior thereto.

Whereas said attempted plat and dedication of said Henshaw's Addition to Tillamook are recorded in Book "1" at page 186 thereof, Records of Deeds of Tillamook County, Oregon.

Now therefore, the people of Tillamook City do ordain as follows:

That the whole of said Henshaw's Addition to Tillamook including the lots, blocks and the streets attempted to be platted and dedicated therein, be and the same is hereby vacated, and said plat and dedication shall henceforth be held for naught. And the public highways shown on said plat are hereby vacated and surrendered unto the said W. S. Hays, his heirs and assigns forever.

Read first time April 21, 1902, 8:15 o'clock p.m.

Read second time April 21, 1902, 8:17 o'clock p.m.

By unanimous consent of the members of the common Council present put on its third reading and read for the third time in open council April 21, 1902, at 8:20 o'clock p.m. and upon the question "Shall the ordinance pass," the vote resulted as follows: Ayes, 4; noes, 0.

Whereupon the ordinance was declared duly passed.
