The campaign liar, who has been so much in evidence during the past few weeks, can now take a rest.

When Jasper Smith was nominated he told the convention he was going to get his shoes soled. It would be a good time to use them upon the republicans who knifed him.

A campaign of abuse invariably elects candidates who are slandered. And the result of the campaign in Tillamook, we are glad to say, is no exception to the general rule.

It looks as though a number of republicans, not only in Tillamook county, but all over the state have gone on the black list and a star is placed opposite their names, which indicates "A Political Bolter!"

England has made peace in South Africa after capturing and annexing the Transvaal and the Orange Free States, and the democrats of Oregon are proclaiming to the whole United States that they have captured this state and will annex the state capital.

Some of the republicans who have opposed the republican ticket, and went over to the rule or ruin faction, will not live long enough to blot out the stain on their political characters for a republican primary or convention to recognize them again. Anyway, where are they at?

It was generally conceded by the knowing politicians that the republican state convention made a political blunder when it nominated Mr. J. W. Furnish for governor. Although it may be a bitter pill for Mr. Jasper Smith to swallow on account of being knifed by republicans, after being so loyal to the republic

lican party for so many years and supported the very people who knifed him when they were running for office, he is probably saved a lot of worry by not being elected.

There is one thing that the Headlight is proud to state in this issue, Tillamook is in accord with the national administration. And, another thing we feel glad of, is the fact that a majority of the people of the county, realizing the great importance to Tillamook of government improvements, have given Mr. Tongue and Mr. Eddy handsome majorities, although a bitter fight was made against the latter by Mr. Maxwell and the bolting republicans. Now that the fight is over and people are not likely to be prejudiced as in the heat of a campaign, we believe they will give a sight of relief to think that the improvements to Tillamook bay and bar are in no wise jeopardized by those who sought to defeat Mr. Eddy, and thereby deprive the county of the influence it has lacked in previous years. We feel jealous of the county's interests, and we would like to impress this upon the minds of every person in the county, the next time we get into a political fight, when the county's interests are at stake, let us be broad minded and fair minded so as not to be influenced by those who want to force their personal, professional and business grievances into politics for the sake of venting animosity. That state of affairs in the past election came near costing the county a great deal of influence and the improvement of the bay and bar might have been delayed indefinitely, for if we fail to support those who are in a position to accomplish something for the county, surely we could not expect them to make an effort on our behalf.

War on Mosquitoes

Brookline, Mass., is a beautiful town, which, in spite of the fact that it has the largest per capita wealth in the United States, is greatly troubled by mosquitoes, whose breeding places are numerous ponds and lagoons that diversify the landscape. An association has been formed there to fight the mosquito pest by pouring oil on the water wherever it can be properly used. The petroleum cure was not taken seriously at first, but experiments for two or three years are reported to have been successful. New Jersey people are sure that a thin deposit of coal oil on the surface of pools or marshes is fatal to incipient mosquitoes. Cuba's medical record in this respect is the most important of all. A hundred men were employed in Havana and \$50,000 spent in applying oil to stagnant water and it is claimed, apparently with conclusive figures, that these measures stamped out yellow fever and largely reduced the cases of malarial fever.

At all events, the mosquito has become a confirmed suspect. The insect unceremoniously treats mankind as its prey, destroying as far as indulged, human comfort and temporarily marring personal beauty. It also spreads deadly diseases that slay thousands, and the careful, highly intelligent medical authorities of the United States army, after long observation, asserts that such is the case, a general declaration of hostilities is a necessity. It is hard to say what rattlers and mosquitoes were made for, but the burden of proof of utility rests upon them. Snakes retire before civilization while the mosquito maintains business at the old stand with an industry that never flags. War on mosquitoes has become more than a fad and communities that resort to coal oil are pioneers in an important cause.

AGAIN IN ERUPTION.

Another Outbreak of Mount Pelee Dixie Sails for the North.

FORT DE FRANCE, Martinique, May 31, 7 p.m.—The steamer Dixie arrived here from St. Vincent last night and left early this morning for New York. Professor Robert T. Hill, United States Government Geologist, is among the passengers on the Dixie. George Kennan and his party are still up country.

At half past 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the submarine cable broke again and at 2 o'clock Mount Pelee was in violent eruption. Reports received here say the north craters are pouring great torrents of mud in the direction of Vive. Yesterday afternoon there was an enormous eruption of steam and ashes.

This morning, a correspondent of a New York newspaper went to St. Pierre with the Government party engaged in burning the bodies of the victims of the first eruption, but the party was forced to leave, the volcano throwing out columns of black smoke and loud detonations being heard. The Riviere Blanche is again the course of a torrent of intensely hot mud, giving off steam and falling into the sea. A portion of the party that went to St. Pree this morning was in much danger, and the captain of the boat who took the newspaper correspondent and his party to the ruined town says he will not return there again.

The National Geographical Society has scored a great triumph. Professor Angelo Heilprin ascended to the top of the crater of Mount Pelee this morning, in company with two guides and Mr. Leadbetter. While on the summit several violent explosions occurred, but notwithstanding that great danger surrounded him Professor Heilprin spent a long time taking careful observation. Looking down the crater, he found a huge cinder cone. The opening is a vast crevasse 300 feet long and 150 feet wide. While engaged in this task the lives of the members of the expedition were continually in danger, and one particularly violent explosion covered Professor Heilprin from head to foot with vitid matter. He persisted, however, and found, as had been suspected, that there were three separate vents for the volcanic matter. Meanwhile, Mount Pelee, seeming to resent the intrusion of man into her awful territory, bleached out huge volumes of steam, ashes and boiling hot mud. Professor Heilprin made the important discovery that the crater of Failaise has an eruption at the same time as the summit crater and ejects precisely the same matter. Both craters showed a new phenomenon during the professor's visit when mud was thrown up in huge columns, while heretofore the mud has bubbled or boiled out and flowed downward. There is reason to believe that great damage may result from the outbursts of this mud to the rich plantations still uninjured.

The ascent was made on mules to an altitude of 700 metres, the line of vegetation. There, leaving a mule that had carried him, the professor proceeded on foot to the site of Lake Plamiste. He found the lake completely dried up and crossed the bed, passing up a slope to the crater's edge. This, which has formerly been a high bluff, Professor Heilprin found had fallen into the crater. This is the first important verified topographic alternation noted. Professor Heilprin remained at the summit crater over two hours.

United States Consul Ayme took breakfast this morning with Special Delegate Block, who is desirous that the people of the United States should believe that the authorities are acting effectively and without loss of time. The criticism of the course of the authorities by correspondents, he said, was unfounded.

The re-establishment of business in Fort de France is restoring confidence and the work of relieving the distress in distant districts is being effectively carried out by a perfected organization.

A strange case is that of Mrs. Mary Elvira Gillispie, who at the age of 84 has just been admitted to a hospital in Denver. She is the mother of thirty-seven children, including fifteen sets of twins, but all have drifted away from her and she knows not the address of one of them.
