SALIDA, Colo., July 14.—A report was received here shortly before noon today that the Denver & Rio Grande narrow-gauge passenger train, which left here early last night, was held up and robbed by several men near Sargents, west of Marshall Pass. The robbery occurred at 1:50 o'clock today at Chester, Colo., 250 miles west of Denver. The engineer was compelled at the point of a revolver to stop the train by unskilled men, who had climbed over the tender. Two safes in the express car were blown open, but it is claimed by the officer of the Rio Grande express Company that the robbers failed to secure any plunder from the safes. The passengers were compelled to alight from the cars and line up alongside the tracks in the canyon, and they were relieved of their money and valuables. Many of the passengers threw away their money watches and jewelry among the rocks before the robbers searched them. There were many tourists among the passengers, and it is presumed that the losses of some were heavy. The train was the westbound narrow-gauge passenger train, which left Denver last night. It is not known how many passengers were aboard, but the cars as usual at this season were all filled. The scene of the robbery is in a wild mountainous country at the foot of Marshall Pass, on the west slope, and the robbers, of whom there were four, escaped into the mountains. Notice. TRACY KILLED MERRILL.

Body of the Convict Found by a Woman in the Woods Near Chehalis. CHEHALIS, July 15.—Mrs. Mary Wagoner and her 12-year-old son have found the dead body of David Merrill, who with Harry Tracy escaped last month from the Oregon Penitentiary, four miles southeast of this place. The body was discovered shortly before dark last evening, while Mrs. Wagoner and her son were searching for blackberries. The body was slightly decomposed, but easily recognizable as that of Merrill. There was a bullet hole in the back and another in the wrist. The body was dressed in dark blue trousers, a dark coat, a black hat, and heavy shoes. It had been dumped over the log head first, and lay with the face concealed. Mrs. Wagoner's son came here this morning and notified the Corner of the find, and the body is now being brought in. A settler named Verba, who lives a few hundred yards south of the place where the body was found, has identified it as that of one of two men who went past his place at 5:30 A. M., June 28, the day Tracy said he killed Merrill. Both men, Verba says, were heavily armed, and he thought at that time that they were Tracy and Merrill. TACOMA, July 15.—A Chehalis special to the Evening News says: Superintendent Westendorf, of the State Reform School, and Dave W. Bush have returned here, and confirm the story of the finding of the body of the escaped convict, David Merrill, who was killed by his pal, Harry Tracy. The body is undoubtedly that of Merrill, and he was killed at 9 o'clock, Saturday morning, June 28. The body was found by Mrs. Wagoner and her 12-year-old son, of Napavine, yesterday afternoon, who will claim the reward of \$2750. While picking berries, they discovered the corpse thrown over a log and jammed between two tree stumps, a few feet off of the main road. A bullet hole is plainly seen in the back and also in the wrist. Another is believed to be in the neck. Three 30-30 Winchester shells were found, one behind a cedar tree on the roadside, and two about 10 feet from the corpse. The indications are that Tracy fired the first shot from behind the tree, and then compelled the assassination of his dying pal and brother-in-law. Tracy first told the story that he had killed Merrill the day that he rode in a captured launch to Seattle, July 2. Body Being Brought In. SEATTLE, July 15.—Merrill's body, found by a woman and a boy, named Roberts, yesterday, near the main road below Chehalis, in the place described by Tracy. The boy saw a hand and foot projecting from between two logs and he called Superintendent of the Reform School Westendorf, Deputy Sheriff Brinker and a newspaper man watched the body all night. Coroner Green, of Lewis County, has gone to bring the body into Chehalis. Everything confirms Tracy's story, as the body is dressed as first seen when he and Merrill were together. How Merrill Died. Tracy's story of the killing of Merrill, is that while in the vicinity of Castle Rock, Tracy learned that Merrill was responsible for his getting into the Oregon penitentiary. Merrill was a hindrance in the fight, anyway, he said. He was careless, and left a trail like a log, so Tracy resolved to pick a quarrel with him. In this he succeeded, and the two agreed to fight out their difference in an open spot. Standing back to back, it was agreed that each should advance 10 paces, turn and fire. Tracy, looking over his shoulder, saw Merrill start to fire at nine paces, so he wheeled himself, fired, and Merrill dropped dead. Tracy Shot Twice. While eating breakfast in the shanty at South Bay Wash, he was starting on his sensational trip to Seattle on the gasoline launch N. S. Tracy told the story of Merrill's death. At that time and since the tale has been regarded as a lie designed to cover Merrill's escape, but to-day's developments show that the desperado told only the bare truth and that his companion in crime fell beneath his rifle from a dastard shot in the back. Tracy's story of the deed is as follows: "I shot him in the back," said Tracy, "but he was going to shoot me. We quarreled. The day before the quarrel we found a newspaper which contained an account of our escape and the pursuit. That account gave Merrill equal credit with myself for the deeds which I alone committed. The newspapers since we escaped have all along persisted in giving him equal credit for the escape and the get-away with me. The fact of the case is that he did not have the nerve of a rabbit. He always wanted to sneak through the country, keeping under cover, and preferred to go hungry rather than show himself for the purpose of getting food. Tracy Was Jealous. "That is not my style. No man can take me alone. And if I had a proper traveling companion, a man of nerve, I couldn't be taken by a regiment of dupes. If I am shot it will be from behind, and with a double-barreled gun. The opposite direction is a matter of nerve who knew how to handle a gun, we could go wherever we wanted to and not be compelled to keep under cover a portion of the time, as I am in traveling alone. Merrell a Coward. "But Merrill was no good. He was never anything but an impediment to me, and I am glad he is out of the way. I never could trust him on guard except in places where there was no danger, anyway, and then he was so frightened that at times he would wake me up needlessly in the fear that we were being surrounded. So when I got the paper and saw that the reporters and the people thought he had some nerve it made me hot. I thought at first I would shake him and travel alone, but before we decided to separate I taunted him with his cowardice and he got huffy. Then we agreed to fight a duel. This was in the woods in Lewis County, not far from Chehalis. A Regular Duel. "We agreed to start together from a line and walk ten steps each, in opposite directions from each other, and then turn simultaneously and begin firing. From his hazgling in arranging the terms, I was convinced that he was intending to turn before he had taken the ten steps, and I was determined not to let him get the drop on me. So when I had taken eight steps, I turned around and took a

General News.

If Harry Tracy, the multi-murderer, is taken alive he will not be hanged in Washington, but will be sent back to execute his awful crimes in Oregon. General Chaffee has been relieved of the command in the Philippines and ordered to the command of the East by an order issued by Secretary Root. Sixteen Northwestern University students, following the footsteps of Professor Crook, the man who never kissed, or was kissed, have formed an anti-osculation society, with Crook an honorary member. Each member has taken an oath to refrain from kissing as vulgar, though delicious. State Factory Inspector McAbee of Indiana has sent a circular letter to the larger manufacturing concerns in the state recommending that they provide bathing facilities for the employes. He cites the beneficial results from such a course at Michigan City, and says a bath after a day's work will do much to remove the desire for stimulants. Wu Fing Fang received official confirmation of the report of his recall. He will return with all convenient haste to China, and when he has arrived there he will write a history of his life, which will be published in America. He does not expect to have his head cut off on his arrival in China, but chooses to regard the change in his positions as a promotion. The findings in the court-martial cases of Major Waller and Lieutenant Day, and General Chaffee's comments thereon were made public Tuesday. Chaffee finds the evidence is opposed to the finding of the court-martial which acquitted the officers. He says the execution of natives by Major Waller's orders was opposed to all the laws of war, but he partially excused the act on the ground of Waller's men's condition at the time of its commission. The Marquis of Salisbury has resigned the Premiership of Great Britain, and Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury, and government leader in the House of Commons, has been appointed to succeed him. The Marquis of Salisbury tendered his resignation at an audience which he had with King Edward last Friday, Saturday Mr. Balfour visited the King, and accepted Premiership. One of the important questions discussed by the President and Secretary Root was that relating to Governor Taft's negotiations with the Vatican respecting the Philippine friars. Both Mr. Roosevelt and the Secretary of War deem it unwise that the friars should remain in the archipelago while the prestige they now possess. The attitude of the friars is regarded not only as a menace to the peace of the islands, but also as an obstruction to their government and to the civilization of their inhabitants. Ten years ago Thomas C. Clark, of Newark, N. J., jokingly gave his niece, Miss Julia A. Malcolm, of Vestal, Pa., a deed to certain Colorado lands which he thought valueless. She said she would keep the document to remember him by, and has since been earning her living, teaching school. The other day she received a letter from Colorado saying that there was a lead mine on her property and \$25,000 was offered for a half interest. Miss Malcolm thought it was a joke, but finding that it was not she accepted the offer. The State Bank of Idaho, at Weiser, has received from Assayer J. W. Currie, of Salt Lake City, returns from samples of ore sent him from the Thunder Mountain claims of J. E. Haggerty. The samples showed the phenomenal value of 53.90 ounces silver and 170 ounces gold, equaling \$3513 gold and about \$29 silver. Mr. Haggerty, who is in Salt Lake City, will return and leave immediately for the camp to bring 1000 pounds of the ore to Weiser to be placed on exhibition, citizens of Weiser having subscribed \$200 to pay the expenses of bringing it to that city. A special from Dawson says: The steamer Portland arrived at St. Michael July 2, and left next day for Port Townsend. The news was brought to Eagle by the steamer Sarah, which reached there today and advised we were wired to the Dawson agent of the Northern Commercial Company. The Sarah got the news by wire at Nlatlo. The Portland was in good condition, and all her passengers and crew were well. The cargo was in good order. The steamer Jeanie is safe at Nome, according to the officers of the Melville Dollar, which reached Ladysmith, B. C., from Nome. George Fisher, giving Pittsburg as his home, has made an attempt to see Mrs. McKinley, claiming that he had important disclosures to make to her of the plot which led to the assassination of her husband. The colored porter notified him that Mrs. McKinley was too ill to see any one. Fisher then went to Major J. H. Robertson and told him his story. He had been in Cleveland, where he made an unsuccessful attempt to see Senator Hanna. He declares that the anarchists have set a price of \$60,000 upon Hanna's head, and that five attempts have been made to assassinate him. The Townspeople Trusts bought him a ticket to Pittsburg, to get him out of the city. Hisses and cheers greeted Bryan's name when it was mentioned at the Tammany Fourth of July banquet. The cheers are ominous for the Democracy. There was a time when Bryan thought New York was part of the enemy's country, but as he got 125,000 votes more there in 1900 than he did in 1896, he has a right to assume that he was pretty well treated in that locality, even though he stood far behind McKinley there in both canvasses. It is plain from recent manifestations that the Nebraska has many friends in the Empire State yet. This is a fact that is likely to give some concern to the reorganizers. The Democratic presidential aspirant of 1904 who has Bryan's oil-will may as well prepare for overthrow. Either in the convention or out of it, Bryan will pass sentence of political death upon him.
