The picture is eight to ten inches long, of a bright red and appears to be burned in the flesh. He suffered no ill effects from the shock in a short time after it occurred.

Another Mount Pelee Eruption.

CASTRIES, Island of St. Lucia, B. W. I., Sept. 1.—The British steamer Korona arrived here yesterday evening from Fort de France, Island of Martinique. She reports that a terrible eruption of Mount Pelee occurred at 9 o'clock Saturday, and people who arrived at Fort de France, from the northern part of the island reported that the village of Merne Rouge, near the district previously devastated, had been entirely destroyed, and that LaCarbet, a village on the coast which was destroyed at the time of the great eruption, had been swept by a tidal wave, about 200 persons lost their lives.

A hoop from the Island of St. Vincent which reached here this morning, reports that Mount Pelee's crater is now quiet, but the detonations Saturday night were the loudest heard up to that time, and the inhabitants were terribly alarmed.

Strike Growing Serious.

BRAMWELL, W. Va., Sept. 2.—The great mines of the Pocahontas Colliery Company are on fire. This morning strikers applied the torch to various portions of the mine near the west entrance which is on the Virginia side, and the mine is now said to be burning furiously. The guards and strikers fired volley after volley at each other, but at this hour it is not known whether any one was killed. The Governor of Virginia will be appealed to send troops to Pocahontas at once.

HAZLETON, Pa., Sept. 2.—John Harvilla, aged 34 years, a nonunionist, employed as coalhauler at the Beaver Meadow Colliery, of Cox Bros. & Co., was shot in the right eye this morning while attempting to drive away unknown parties who had bombarded his house with stones.

The Dutch Government has consented to the division of the Powle estate in The Hague valued at \$14,000,000, among nine heirs, who live in America. Seven heirs live in New York, one at Quincy, Ill., and one in Chicago. They are all in New York now and expect that the property will be handed over to them in a few weeks. The reported settlement of the estate is the outcome of a contest inaugurated by the American heirs about 20 years ago. The Dutch Government was at first averse to handing the money over to the Americans, but they proved their case. The property is to be divided share and share alike, and with accrued interest each expects about \$1,500,000. Nicholas and John Powle were the forbears of the American heirs. The estate is said to consist of land reclaimed from the sea by the building of dykes.

President Roosevelt's speeches bristle with small words, short sentences, common and solid facts.

Increase in Small Banks.

Under the provisions of the gold standard act of March 14, 1900, nearly 1100 banks have been established on the new basis, and mainly in the Southern and Western states. In thirteen Southern states 285 new banks have been started. Texas leads all the states in this respect, with 141 new banks. Oklahoma and the Indian Territory have each added about fifty banks to their facilities, and few have a capital exceeding \$25,000. Two thirds of the new institutions have a capital of \$50,000 or less and are located in towns of less than 6000 inhabitants. Applications to the comptroller of the currency are still numerous. The national bank circulation has been increased \$100,000,000. Banking advantages have been multiplied throughout the country, and the movement continues to the satisfaction of the people generally.

The region most benefited by the law of 1900 is that in which opposition to the gold standard and the Republican party was strongest. In the South the Democratic solidarity is just as absolute as ever, but nevertheless that section is deeply indebted to Republicanism for this widespread improvement in banking operations, along with the 100-cent dollar, expansion, protected Southern industries, and last, not least, prosperity. Populistic states acknowledge the obligation and have generally swung back to the Republican line, but the South is still for anything to beat the Republican party. Yet it flourishes under Republican policies, and perhaps would do more for itself if there was any serious danger of the defeat of the Republican principles and measures under which it thrives.

Both branches of the Cuban Congress have passed resolutions calling for the release of all convicts now confined on the Island of Cuba who fought in the Cuban army. The resolution proposes to be general and irrespective of the crime that the ex-soldier is guilty of. The proposition met with some opposition by some of the most conservative members of the Congress, but the revolutionary members succeeded in getting it through. The two branches of Congress have appointed a committee which is to wait on President Palma Friday, asking him to make the action desired. The resolution proposes that all of the convicts be released on October 10.
