In the matter of the approval and acceptance of the Jenkins bridge across Wilson River, the court found upon examination that part of the decking and approaches were not completed, and some of the stringers falling short of the number called for in the contract, and after the court had examined the bridge again the clerk was authorized to draw a warrant for \$2435 00 in favor of the contractors, less \$12 for shortage of lumber in stringers, also to draw warrant for approaches at \$1.75 per lineal feet, number of feet of approaches to be reported by the county judge.
