Protect Timber Lands.

Protection of Timber lands from fire is one of the subjects with which the next Oregon Legislature will have to wrestle.

What remedy the timbermen will advise is not known yet; in fact, they do not know it themselves.

Forest rangers are suggested as proper agents to prevent fires. Such officers are employed on the Government lands.

Several timber land companies employed men last summer to patrol their forests. The companies believe that their foresting is the means of preventing great losses.

"We do not insist," said a timberman "that the state government employ all the rangers necessary to prevent fires but we think it should help to do so.

"These fires are serious blights on the development of the state. In a few minutes they turn the product of 200 years into a smoking ruin.

It is currently reported that the Japanese Government within the next six years will build four battle-ships, six first-class cruisers and various lesser craft, at a cost of \$10,000,000 annually for the next six years.

According to advices received at San Juan from Venezuela by the steamer Caracas, it seems certain that the revolutionists will triumph, probably in a fortnight, and that La Guyara and Caracas will capitulate.

GRANT'S PASS, Oct. 11—A snow-white deer, the kind that the fairy books and old hunters tell about, was killed in the woods of Cow Creek Canyon and brought to this city yesterday by G. W. Donnell.

Many old Southern Oregon hunters who saw the carcass of the freak deer claim that they have never seen anything of the kind before in the Southern Oregon mountains; however, they declare that such deer have been known at times in various parts of the country, but are very scarce and but seldom seen.

Mr. Donnell says that the freak was with two ordinary deer. It presented a very striking appearance with its snow-white coat. The carcass of the deer was sent to Portland last night to an expert taxidermist for mounting.
