

PLANS HOSPITALS.

Steel Company to Build One at Each of Its Twenty-Two Plants.

A Year's Experiment Proves That a Place, Where Injured Employees Can Be Quickly Cared For, Is a Paying Investment.

It is stated that a hospital for the treatment of emergency cases will be established on the grounds of each of the 22 plants of the American Steel and Wire company.

The determination of the company to establish a hospital at each of its plants was arrived at after a year's experiment with a temporary emergency hospital, erected for the company in Allentown, Pa.

Each hospital will be of plain brick construction, two stories in height, with baths, sitting rooms, library, dining-room and sleeping apartments for the nurses.

A corps of six nurses and two druggists and thorough ambulance service will be requisite for each hospital, in addition to the resident physician.

GROWTH OF IMPORTS.

Manufacturers' Materials During the Year 1902 Compared One Half Goods Sent Into This Country.

Growth in the importation of manufacturers' materials and the increasing share which such materials form in the total imports is the most remarkable feature of the foreign commerce of the United States in the fiscal year just ended.

Combining the two classes of articles for use in manufacturing, those "in a crude condition" and those "wholly or partially manufactured for use as materials in the manufactures and mechanic arts," it is found that the total value of importations for use in manufacturing, which amounted in 1881 to \$217,371,551.

This phenomenal growth becomes even more striking when it is compared with the growth in importation of all other articles than those for use in manufacturing.

THE PASSING OF NEWGATE.

The Famous Jail of English History Which Has Stood for Centuries Being Torn Down.

The work of demolishing Newgate jail, the historic old prison, so long a feature of the city of London, has been begun.

The decision to tear down Newgate prison was taken a long time ago, but various causes have hindered the beginning of the work.

For a long period criminals sentenced to death were hanged in front of Newgate. It is many years since a public execution took place there.

BOSTON TEA-PARTY BOWL.

Rhode Island Collector Has the Yearly Belle That Figured in the Tea Tossing Event.

The famous historical punch bowl of the Boston tea party has just fallen into the hands of a Rhode Island collector of antique furniture.

On the 19th of last December Marsden J. Perry, a Providence railway magnate and a banker with a fortune of several millions, married Mrs. Marian Lincoln Bogert at Worcester, Mass.

The new home of the bride was a marvel in its interior decorations, and there were many very attractive and costly articles of ornamentation.

The great men of Boston of that day had a feast after the tea tossing episode, and the affair was not rounded out in true Yankee fashion until the punch had been furnished for the notable occasion by one of the distinguished ancestors of the present Mrs. Perry.

The mansion in question is one of the earliest of the colonial in the state of Rhode Island, and it fell into the hands of Mr. Perry about a year ago.

MORE BUSINESSLIKE.

Affairs of Treasury Department Handled More Expeditiously.

Reforms Inaugurated by Secretary Shaw Which Will Insure Better Attention to the Interest of the Public.

Robert B. Armstrong, private secretary to Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, has worked out the details of a modern system whereby the business of the department will be conducted as expeditiously as in the most progressive mercantile houses.

Secretary Shaw realized the need of a change in this respect when he took charge of the office, and he entrusted the details to Mr. Armstrong who worked out a simple but thorough system of card catalogues, electric time stamps and more complete plan for filing.

In the same connection all telegrams heretofore have been received by the treasury department through the medium of messengers. Hereafter all telegrams addressed to the treasury department will be received by direct wire in the department copied in duplicate and the original stamped with a time stamp and delivered direct to its proper division.

AROUND WORLD ON FOOT.

American Reaches Bloemfontein on Long Trip to Win a Wager of Five Thousand Pounds.

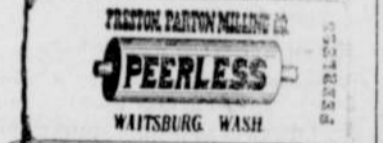
