A petition is being circulated, to be presented to Governor Geer, praying that he pardon William Heitmiller, who is serving time in the state penitentiary for attempting to kill Emil Arndt at the Truckee saw mill. It looks to us that as Heitmiller got off with a light sentence of four years for so serious a crime, our citizens should be content to allow him to serve out the full time and not attempt to interfere with the course of justice. On the other hand, however, there are those who think that Heitmiller, being a man somewhat advanced in years, and it was family troubles which placed him under mental strain when he committed the rash act, is now deserving of sympathy and should be pardoned.

It is with much regret that we have to announce the death of Mrs. Cora Cary, wife of Mr. Howard Cary, which took place on Wednesday, at Pendleton, where her husband had taken her for the benefit of her health. She had been at her mother's (Mrs. Poland's) home at Salem for several weeks previous, where she had been gradually failing in health. Her husband left here two week ago to take her to Pendleton, thinking the change would do her good. Her death has caused a gloom to her many friends in Tillamook, where she was greatly beloved and respected. It is not known at present whether the remains will be brought here for burial.

The new company took charge of the Tillamook Lumber Company's saw mill in this city on Tuesday, with Mr. White house in charge. We wish the new company success and hope, when it has put in its new machinery, it will chew up the logs with that rapidity there will never be a scarcity of lumber again, and, further, we trust its light will burn brightly and not blink out so often. Considering everything, it is a surprise Mr. Taft has kept the mill and electric lights running as long as he did, but it is best for the city that a change has been made in the company, and we have no doubt but what it will turn out a good investment.

At a meeting of the members of the Presbyterian church at the home of Mrs. Hays on Friday, as a parting reception to Rev. C. P. Metzler, who left Saturday for the mission field in China, nearly the whole of the members were present. It was a social gathering, and during the evening Mr. B. L. Eddy expressed the sentiment of the congregation in saying that the bond of esteem and affection for Mr. Metzler would be lasting, and although they were sorry to part with him, yet their sympathy, prayers and best wishes went with him to the noble work to which he had been called. And in token of this, Mr. Eddy, in behalf of the congregation, presented Mr. Metzler with a purse of money to be used as he thought best in his work. In thanking his congregation, Mr. Metzler said the two years he had been in Tillamook would remain a pleasant part of his history, for he had received considerable encouragement and assistance from the members, and he asked that this be bestowed upon the new pastor, Rev. S. S. White. The Presbyterian church is steadily growing in membership and is in good financial condition. Two amusing incidents occurred, which are worth mentioning. At the farewell social at Bay City the ladies had rice and chop sticks and at the farewell in this city on Friday a case was bedecked with an image of a Chinaman. Mr. Metzler, with his happy disposition, enjoyed the novelties.

The question of forest preservation is a very practical one and a great deal of interest is being taken in it, particularly in these western states where destruction of the forests has been making rapid headway during the last few years. Prof. Leibeg of the United States geological survey has expressed the opinion that the accessible forests of the country will not last another fifty years under the present drain of timber cutting, grazing and fires and there seems good reason to accept this view. During the last forty or fifty years the drain has been enormous and it increases from year to year. In sections of the country where formerly dense forests existed not a tree has been left standing and the raid on the western forests is more vigorous now

than ever before. Nearly all the timber lands available have been occupied and means are being adopted to convert the growing trees into commercial lumber. The destruction this year by forest fires is believed to have been more extensive than in any previous year and this fact has greatly stimulated interest in the question of forest preservation.

Died from Shot Wounds.

At Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, Oregon, Sunday, November 2nd, 1902, Scott Thomas, aged about 50 years. The remains were conveyed to this place Monday evening from Portland, and services were held in the Union Church at two o'clock Tuesday, conducted by Elder J. A. Campbell, of the Christian Church.

Following the services at the Church the remains were laid to rest in the North Yamhill Cemetery, a large concourse of friends, of which the deceased had many, and relatives being in attendance.

It will be remembered that the unfortunate man while hunting in the Nestucca country several weeks ago, was accidentally shot through the hip through the premature discharge of a rifle in the hands of his son, who was accompanying him. It was realized at the time that the wound was a very serious one, and he was taken to the hospital for treatment and everything possible done to nurse him back to health, but without avail. At times he appeared to be doing well, and hopes were built up for his recovery only to be

disappointed. Mr. Thomas was well and favorably known to almost everyone in this place, where he had made his home most of the time for several years.—North Yamhill Record.
