

T. H. TONGUE DEAD.

Sudden End of Oregon Representative --Heart Disease The Cause.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Representative Thomas H. Tongue, of the First Oregon Congressional District, in the presence of his daughter Bertha, and his secretary, Miss Ruane, died suddenly in his room at the Irvington, in this city, at 12:50 this afternoon.

The physicians who were summoned, and the family physician, Dr. Bovee, as well as the coroner, agree that death was due to acute indigestion, which superinduced paralysis of the heart.

At 10 o'clock he received a call from two Oregon friends, H. H. Gilfrv and Orville Dodge, with whom he discussed at length matters of personal and political character.

Before either the doctor or his son arrived, however, Representative Tongue had passed away, having become unconscious at the time heavy breathing set in.

As her father breathed his last, Miss Bertha and Miss Ruane, practically an adopted daughter, completely collapsed, and were attended by the physicians who arrived almost immediately.

Thomas H. Tongue was born in Lincolnshire, England, June 23, 1844; removed with his parents to Washington County, November 23, 1859, where he has since resided; was educated at Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., graduating from that institution in June 1868; removed to Hillsboro, his present home, in September of that year; was admitted to the bar in September, 1870, and has since been engaged in the active practice of his profession.

Mr. Tongue was also largely interested in farming and stockraising, taking particular interest in raising and training blooded horses. He was always a staunch Republican, but was not active in political affairs until 1888; in that year he was elected a member of the State Senate, serving a term of four years; served as a member of the judiciary committee and during the last two years was chairman of that committee; in 1890 was chairman of the state Republican convention; in February, 1892, was elected president of the state organization of Republican clubs and served for a term of two years; was a delegate to the Republican National convention in Minneapolis in 1892, and was the Oregon vice-president of that convention. He has served six years as Representative from the first Congressional district of Oregon in Congress.

Besides his wife, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Tongue, residing in that county, five daughters and two sons survive. They are: Mrs. A. E. Reams, Jacksonville, Or.; E. B. Tongue, Hillsboro; Marie Tongue, Hillsboro; Mrs. Frank Freeman, Portland; Thomas Tongue, jr., now in Washington; Bertha Tongue, also in Washington, and Florence Tongue, Hillsboro.

Mr. Tongue was a faithful and tireless worker, a man of recognized ability and loyal to his friends and family.

He was a member in good standing in the local Masonic lodge, I.O.O.F., Knights of Pythias and local Grand.
