We have received a copy of a bill introduced by Mr. Eddy to provide for the taxation and regulation of domestic corporations, and foreign corporations, joint stock companies and associations and for the recording and filing of certain information concerning them, also to regulate the formation of corporations.

The new engine for the Tillamook Lumber Company is expected in on the next boat, when the saw mill will be fixed up with new machinery and otherwise renovated and put in good condition, the plans for which have already been decided upon. It will take a month to do the improvements, so the city will be minus electric lights during that time.

Representative Eddy, whose attitude in the senatorial fight has been a question of doubt with the politicians, on Wednesday, made a vigorous reply, challenging the statement that Geer is the people's choice. He declared that his own county had given a large vote for Geer, yet this did not express their real sentiment. When Eddy proceeded to nominate Charles W. Fulton, declaring him the real choice of the people and ably qualified for the high office, there was an enthusiastic demonstration by members who have been supporting him.

A city council meeting was held Monday evening, with Mayor C. W. Talmage presiding, and with Councilmen F. L. Sappington, Howard Cary and E. Jenkins present. On motion of Councilman Sappington and carried unanimously, the city printing was awarded to the Headlight and Herald, ordinances, etc. appearing in both paper at 5c. a line. As the committee having in hand the matter of raising the recorder's salary was not ready to report, it was given further time. An ordinance to prohibit minors from entering and loitering about tipping houses was introduced and passed to its final stage by unanimous consent. A petition was read for a side walk, signed by C. E. Reynolds and Wm. Ryan. The recorder was instructed to post the necessary notice.

At a meeting of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, a petition from Tillamook was read asking for the co-operation of that body in getting dredging work done in Tillamook Bay. The letter was referred to the transportation committee, with the request that the matter be attended to at once. "The people of

Tillamook have suffered a long time," said President Livingstone, "and we should give the petition prompt attention." The petition declared that experience had proved that considerable of the jetty and dyke work was more harmful than useful, and that the best results had been secured from the government dredge. It asked that the chamber request that the greater part of the \$27,000 appropriation shall be used in dredging instead of building any further dykes or jetties.

A preliminary meeting, for the purpose of organizing a local athletic club, was held on Thursday evening. Quite a number of the sports of the city were present and took a lively interest in all that was done to make it a success. A temporary organization was formed with C. Ben Riesland, president; D. Millar, vice-president; H. Edmunds, secretary; Chas. I. Clough, treasurer. Between eighty and ninety persons have signified their intention of joining the club, and it is the idea to make it a live and interesting organization, with all the business men as members. After appointing a committee to frame a constitution and by-laws, which is composed of H. Edmunds (chairman), B. C. Lamb, F. Richardson, B. O. Snuffer, C. W. Talmage, A. J. Cohn and C. B. Riesland, the meeting adjourned until Wednesday evening next, when a permanent organization will be the first order of business.

The young pupils belonging to Mrs. Hays' class were more taken up with the novelty of facing a big audience than they were with their singing. "The Honey-suckle and the Bee," by the larger pupils was nicely rendered and well executed for a class so recently formed. As usual, Mr. Goddard came in for applause. Mrs. H. H. Alderman and Miss Queenie Kelly pleased the audience with their performance on the piano.

Death of J. S. Elliott.

At his home at Riverdale, Tillamook County, Oregon, January 18, 1903, Jacob Schuyler Elliott, aged 73 years, 6 days.

Jacob Schuyler Elliott was born in New York, January 12, 1830. He was married to Miss Jennie Cotton in 1852, and with her removed to Oregon in 1860. He resided in Multnomah County until 1871, when he came to Tillamook and purchased a piece of land on the Kilchis, which by persistent energy he converted into a comfortable home and a profitable farm, and where he spent the better half of his life, surrounded by children and grandchildren and neighbors whose esteem and affection he held by a uniform course of integrity, earnestness and neighborly kindness.

He is survived by a widow and five children: Margaret Jennings, of Kilchis, Tillamook county; Cora Erving, of Portland, Oregon; Anna Babbadge, of Portland; William B., Tracy R., and Charles A. Elliott, all residing at Kilchis. He had been a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church for the past 12 years and his funeral, which took place Friday, was conducted by Rev. S. S. White, Minister of that denomination. It was attended by the largest cortege of carriages ever seen in the county, made up of neighbors and friends who thus testified to their appreciation of his manly life and virtue.

The deceased was a most devoted husband, as well as a kind and affectionate father, and on this account his death is more keenly felt by his widow and family, who bore their loss with Christian fortitude and hope of meeting again where there is no more parting or sorrow.
