There is a bill before the state legislature to tax timber lands owned by non-residents at its actual value. That's a good law and should pass, for at present it is the persons who does the improvements who have to pay the biggest share of the taxes.

The bill to amend the city charter, which introduces the referendum into city affairs and authorizes the city to borrow to the extent of \$50,000 for water, light and sewerage systems, has passed and only awaits the governor's signature to become a law.

Representative Eddy has introduced a bill to require counties to levy a tax for school purposes which shall aggregate at least \$8 per capita for each and all of the children within the county between the ages of 4 and 20 years. The tax at present is at least 5 mills on all the assessed property in the county.

Another petition is being circulated and signed by most of the large taxpayers and business men of the city, calling for a special meeting of the school district to reconsider the new school building. As the erection of the proposed building is delayed, it is now thought by some of the citizens that it would be more desirable and economical to have a new two-story, eight-roomed building.

Senator Kuykendall introduced a concurrent resolution, which was adopted, that President Roosevelt be invited, on behalf of the Oregon Legislature, to visit this state on the occasion of his forthcoming trip to the Pacific Coast, and providing for the appointment of a joint committee of the Legislature to act with the Governor in receiving and entertaining the President.

The snow on Saturday night was general throughout the county, and Sunday it had a wintery appearance, although the weather was bright and warm. The snow had the effect of bringing out a few sleighs, but Old Sol soon spoiled what fun was in that direction. Owing to so much snow in the mountains, Saturday's mail did not arrive until four o'clock the next morning. Seven feet of snow was reported in the mountains.

A special school meeting of district No. 9 is called for the 26th February, at 2 p.m., in the opera house, for the following object: To consider the advisability of changing the present plans of the new school building now in course of construction; to authorize the board to contract a debt not to exceed five per centum of the value of the taxable property for the purpose of building a school building and to issue negotiable bearing warrants.

Alder Circle, W. of W., was pleasantly surprised on Wednesday evening by the members of the Woodmen lodge. A delicious lunch was served and an enjoyable time reported. Alder Circle is in a very prosperous condition, having received eight applications for membership at the last meeting. The rates for joining Alder Circle have been reduced for a short time only from \$4 to \$2.50. As a safe and cheap method of insurance, this order stands second to none, while its social and fraternal features are also worthy of notice.

To curb extravagant county officials from running counties into debt there is a bill before the State legislature which will make the eyes of county judges and commissioners bug out, especially if they are well fixed. This is the essence of the bill: "The county expenditures of every county in the state of Oregon shall be confined to the amount of the annual levy therefor; and members of the County Court or Board of County Commissioners or any other county official, who shall authorize, incur, cause or create or officially approve any expense or liability for the county in excess of the amount of the levy that may have been made for the county expenditures, shall be jointly and severally liable, individually and personally, for the amount of such excess."

Representative B. L. Eddy has received the following letter from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, which speaks for itself:

The Portland Chamber of Commerce, Portland, Or., Jan. 22, 1903.

Hon. B. L. Eddy, Salem, Or.
DEAR SIR:—The petition of the citizens of Tillamook County that the fund of \$27,000 now available for work on Tillamook Bay be expended largely for dredging Hoquartion Slough between Tillamook City and deep water in Tillamook Bay, which you sent to Allen & Lewis, and which was referred to us, has received the careful consideration of our Navigation Committee. The Committee, after inquiry, endorsed the petition and recommended that the Chamber request Captain Langhitt to accede to the wishes of the Tillamook people, if such can be done for the best interests of the commerce desired, and is in his opinion the best method of procedure. We have, therefore, sent the petition to Captain Langhitt with the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce.

Please inform the people of Tillamook that we are at all times ready to assist to the best of our ability in any matters of navigation or commerce in which we may be of service, and trust that you will call on us whenever we can do anything in your interests.

RAILROAD FOR TILLAMOOK.

Reported that the Astoria and Columbia River Rail Road Will build to Tillamook City.

For several weeks past we have heard that the long expected railroad to Tillamook is to be built in the near future, but thus far have not been able to ascertain whether the report is based upon facts, although those who are in a position to know what is going on in the railroad world appear to think that the report is true. We give the report for what it is worth, leaving our readers to judge for themselves. It is to the effect that the Astoria and Columbia River Railway Company is to extend its line from Seneide, tapping the Nehalem country and that the line is to be built to Tillamook City. As a majority of the people have predicted this is the direction in which a railroad will come to Tillamook, it is likely to gain some credence.

From the Astorian we take this item of news to Tillamook, which, we hope will prove more than an idle rumor, like so many we have previously heard:

It is reported that arrangements have been completed for the extension of the Astoria and Columbia River railroad into Tillamook county. The work of extension will, it is said, be commenced shortly. Rumors to this effect have been current periodically for several months past, but the Astorian is assured that this report is correct. The local line will, if report proves true, be run into Tillamook city, and also to the heavily timbered regions in southern Clatsop and Tillamook counties.

City Council Meeting.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday, with Mayor C. W. Talmage in the chair, and Councilmen Geo. W. Grayson, A. E. Imbler, W. H. Cary and E. Jenkins present.

It was decided to order a new side walk, as per petition of C. E. Reynolds and Wm. Ryan.

A petition was read for a side walk on the south side of First street, from Thayer's corner to end of street. The necessary notices were ordered posted.

The ways and means committee recommended that the recorder's salary be raised from \$10 to \$15 per month, and an ordinance was ordered drawn to that effect.

An ordinance was read providing a penalty for the refusal or neglect of any officer, which was as follows:

If any person within the corporate limits of Tillamook City, Oregon, being required by any peace officer or magistrate to assist him in the execution of his office, in the preservation of the peace or the arrest of any person for a breach of the peace or the service of any process, shall neglect or refuse to render such assistance, such person, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the city jail not less than three days nor more than ten days, or by fine of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$20.00. The ordinance was passed to its third reading and unanimously passed.

Mayor Talmage recommended that the proper committees investigate what could be done in regard to cheaper lumber and better gravel for the city. Several of the councilmen thought the gravel had too much clay mixed with it.

C. E. Reynolds asked if the city council would grant an auctioneer's licence for one year. This was left over until the next meeting.

Ordinance No. 140.

An ordinance providing a penalty for the refusal or neglect of any person to aid an officer.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain as follows:—

Section 1:—If any person within the corporate limits of Tillamook City, Oregon, being required by any peace officer or magistrate to assist him in the execution of his office, in the preservation of the peace or the arrest of any person for a breach of the peace or the service of any process, shall neglect or refuse to render such assistance, such person, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the city jail not less than three days nor more than ten days, or by fine of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$20.00.

Read first time February 3, 1903, at 8:30 o'clock p. m. Read second time February 3, 1903, at 8:32 o'clock p. m. By unanimous consent of the members of the Common Council present put on its third reading on this the night of its introduction and read for the third time February 3, 1903, at 9:05 o'clock p. m. and upon the question "shall the ordinance pass" the vote resulted as follows: Ayes, 4; Noes, 0; whereupon the Ordinance was declared duly passed.
