Editorial Snap Shots.

It must be, Geo. Brownell, of Oregon City, has again been up to his slick and slippery political tricks, by the way he wanted to get into Harvey Scott's band wagon when he thought Fulton would be dropped and Mr. Scott taken up in the senatorial fight.

The friction between dairymen on account of the controlling interest in some of the factories and the effort to form a combine has broken out in earnest, the Mecca of discontent being in the Fairview and Red Clover districts, and from all appearances a new factory will be started at the cross roads where the grange hall is situated.

Let's hope the judges in the debating contest won't be raw hide republican protectionists and free trade democrats, for if they are there's going to be a hot time in the old town while the judges chew the rag over their preconceived ideas on the tariff. Charge the audience two-bits extra. Professor, giving them permission to listen to the judges, for it will be a night job, sure.

With about 30,000,000,000 feet of standing timber in Tillamook county, only 18,000,000 feet of lumber was cut for shipment last year, the Truckee Lumber Company at Hobsonville cutting 13,000,000 and the Wheeler Lumber Company at Nehalem 5,000,000. For the local trade J. A. Taft Co. cut 3,000,000 and the Yellow Fir Co. 1,679,000. What will it be when Tillamook bar is improved?

Do not lose sight of this fact. That by sending Mr. B. L. Eddy to the state legislature on the last two occasions he put himself in a position where he could do more to bring about the improvement of Tillamook Bar than any other person or combination of persons have ever done. So let us give praise where praise belongs. It may surprise some people when we make this assertion: That a few persons, who have business interests in this county, oppose even the improvement of the bar and have written letters to Washington opposing harbor improvements. The late Congressman T. H. Tongue gave the editor of the HEADLIGHT this information.

The troubles and perplexities of an editor are sometimes many and varied. The Headlight man, unintentionally, some months since, brought the ire and indignation upon himself of Capt. J. Dawson, because we did not give the veteran weather prophet the whole of the credit for getting the bar surveyed and obtaining the recent appropriations for the improvements in the bay. The Headlight has always treated Captain Dawson with all due respect, and we are sorry that he should have taken offence, but if he has harbored an idea that he is entitled to the credit, and no one else, we are not going to say one word to change his ideas on that point, especially as it is a pleasure to him to think so.

What's the trouble, anyway, with the business and professional people of Tillamook City that they cannot bury their trivial, petty jealousies and get together and devise means and ways whereby the city can encourage new industries and attract emigration to the county? Are we going to allow the city's business and the city's future to decline because we lack the push, the enthusiasm, the unity of purpose? That's what makes a dead, businessless city and brings discouragement. People who come in from the outside, also traveling men, tell us that other towns are now wide awake and making the best of their opportunities, especially Coos County, where they have been encouraging industries, consequently business has commenced to boom there. This has even attracted quite a few Tillamookers, who will in the near future migrate there to participate in the lively business affairs. Let's get out of the indifferent, exclusive rut we have fallen into in Tillamook City and see what we can do to keep abreast of the times in a commercial, industrial and business way. We have everything to gain and nothing to lose by hestiring ourselves in trying to get new industries.

The question of a successor to the late Congressman T. H. Tongue is still far from settled. No one seems to have any "cinch" on the republican nomination. The Headlight man has asked Mr. B. L. Eddy if he expects to be a candidate, and he informs us that he will not. He says that many prominent republicans of the district have assured him that the nomination is within his reach, but Mr. Eddy seems to have no desire to take up his residence at Washington. It would be a streak of good luck for Tillamook if Mr. Eddy could have gone there as congressman, for upon our next representative rests the responsibility of getting an appropriation in the next river and harbor bill for the improvement of Tillamook bar. Therefore, it will be necessary for the delegation from Tillamook

to the next congressional convention to use considerable tact and judgment, for no matter who may be fortunate, the delegation should go there and work for the aspirant who will pledge himself to this improvement. Mr. Eddy was fortunate in this particular with Senators J. H. Mitchell and C. W. Fulton, and having stood loyal to them in their hard and protracted senatorial fights, they can be relied upon to do everything in their power when the bill is in the senate. By all means send a strong, influential delegation to the republican congressional convention from Tillamook, for bar improvement is the great and burning issue as far as this county is concerned.

Mob Attempt to Lynch.

BAKER CITY, Or., March 3.—Two hundred men made a determined attempt this morning to lynch Pleasant Armstrong, in the jail here, for the murder of Minnie Ensminger, at North Powder on December 24.

Most of the men were railroad employees, ranchers and miners from North Powder, and who were friends and acquaintances of the Ensminger family.

They gathered at Baker City at midnight and attacked the jail at 2 o'clock this morning.

The Sheriff had warning of the approach of the mob and, just in time, spirited Armstrong across the street to the Bowen Building, where he was kept under guard till daylight.

The mob would not disperse until it had searched every nook and corner of the jail.

The attempted lynching will be investigated by the court and the grand jury and the leaders brought to trial, if possible.

Armstrong and Minnie Ensminger were lovers. The girl's parents objected to their union and they made a compact to commit suicide together.

Instead of keeping the agreement, Fles Armstrong killed the girl and permitted himself to be captured and charged with unlawful murder.

Jailer is Slain.

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 1.—In a desperate and bloody encounter with a prisoner in the County Jail this afternoon Jailer David Morrell was beaten on the head with a lead pipe, shot three times and left lying dead on the floor of the jail.

The murderous prisoner was an ignorant Swede named Christ Benson, in jail for grand larceny. Benson escaped, leaving the inner and outer doors of the jail open and the door of the steel tank, containing seven other prisoners, unlocked. Benson is still at large.

Jack Kahla, a trusty in the main corridor of the jail, gave the alarm at the nearby home of Sheriff Jesse Mills. Mills was absent, but Mrs. Mills seized a revolver, ran to the jail and held at bay the tank prisoners until help arrived.

The prisoner has been captured at Elma, Wash.

Proclamation by the President.

Whereas, public interests require that the Senate should convene in extraordinary session;

Therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, do hereby proclaim and declare an extraordinary session of the Senate of the United States to convene in the capital city, Washington, D.C., on the 5th day of March, 1903, at 12 o'clock, noon. All persons who at that time may be entitled to act as members of the Senate are hereby required to take notice.

Big Fire in Portland.

The handsome Dekam Building at the corner of Third and Washington streets, Portland, was gutted by fire, which originated in an unknown manner at 12:30 on Tuesday morning. No lives were lost, but damage to the structure and the stores and offices in it was wrought to the probable extent of a quarter of a million dollars.
