BARBARIC PAGEANT.

Sir Philip Burne-Jones Amazed at Extravagance of Newport.

The Famous English Painter Declares That Only Old Rome or Babylon Saw Anything Like the Women, Gowns and Jewels.

Sir Philip Burne-Jones, the famous English painter, who was at Newport, R. I., this summer, appears to have been about as decidedly impressed by the "400" as Col. Watterston of the Louisville Courier Journal, has been.

The difference in the point of view held by the artist and that of the editor is that the former is dazzled by the barbaric extravagance of the millionaires who flock to Newport. Sir Philip before leaving Newport discussed the fashionable set as follows:

"Display never was so organized and perfected as at Newport. The overwhelming extravagance of it all is a new thing in the world. It is like the pageant of some splendid barbaric dream.

"I say there is nothing like it anywhere else. There could not be in France, of course. Italy is out of the question. Germany has nothing and certainly England has nothing that resembles it.

"The atmosphere of wealth really is oppressive. It rather numbs one—produces in a man of moderate means a feeling of abject poverty, begets a feeling quite as if one were trailing about in rags, you know.

"The women, their gowns, their jewels, the splendor of these houses—maybe Rome saw something like it, or Babylon, but surely we have to go back to those fabled days to find anything to liken all this to.

"It is a tremendous spectacle; it is a colossal sumptuous picture. Their clothes are so overpowering, so aggressive and insistent—a phenomenon. Their souls probably are way down somewhere, wrapped up, hidden away, buried, but one does not easily catch sight of them. It is difficult to get at their real selves because of their clothes, their gorgeous clothes.

"Oh, I shouldn't care to speak of it from the artist standpoint. Neither do I understand that the display of taste is the object of it all. As a pageant it is gigantic and will never be rivaled."

ANOTHER MASTODON.

Portions of the Skeleton Have Been Unearthed Near Newburgh, New York.

Portions of another mastodon were unearthed in the town of Newburgh, a short distance from the city of Newburgh, N. Y., a few days ago by E. W. Dukois, a farmer, while engaged with his men in digging a driveway through a meadow.

The unearthed portions were near the surface, only two or three feet down. A rib, part of the jaw and part of a tusk or foot were found. One of the teeth is 2 1/2 inches wide by 3/4 inches in diameter, in six sections. Another tooth is in four sections, 8x3 1/2 inches in size. The other teeth came out in pieces. The frontal bone is also badly decayed. One piece is about a foot square, with the eye socket. The rib, 3/4 feet long and 2 1/2 inches wide, was found five feet under ground and broke in two as it was being lifted from the muck.

A number of mastodon remains have been found in Orange county, notably on the Brewster farm, town of Newburgh, in 1845; on the Kelly farm, Little Britain, in 1870; on the Shaefer farm, town of Newburgh, 1899, and at Monroe two years ago.

MAY SEND MAILS BY WIRE.

Italy Investigates a New System for Electric Transmission at a High Speed.

The Italian minister of posts and telegraphs, Sig. Galimberti, and the leading officials of his department have examined a plan submitted by an engineer named Piscielli for the establishment of a system of electrical delivery of the mails, by which letters are to be transmitted in aluminum boxes along overhead wires at the rate of 248 miles an hour.

A commission has been appointed to report upon this system before instituting experiments between Rome and Naples. Between these two points the inventor claims that he can deliver letters in 25 minutes, while the time to send mail from Rome to Paris by this system, Sig. Piscielli says, could be reduced to five hours.

Humble Heroes in the News.

On the day when Craig, the president's bodyguard, lost his life in the performance of his duty, two other heroes figured in the news. Michael Holman, of New York, 68 years of age, was struck down by runaway horses while thrusting a baby in its carriage out of danger. Merion Brethert, of Jersey City, written with mail-pox, walked 13 miles to a pesthouse rather than endanger others in a public conveyance, says the New York World. Both may die as the result of their unhesitating courage, which shines as brightly as any deed performed on the battlefield.

Empress' View of Antos.

The empress of Germany entertains an eminently sensible estimate of the devil wagon. She insists, says the Chicago Chronicle, that it is too dangerous to use in the army maneuvers and should be reserved for actual warfare.

COLLAR PHILOSOPHY.

There are few subjects which should be discussed with anything but an impartial mind if it is desired to render a just opinion on their merits and demerits, and the subject of collars is assuredly no exception to this rule. At the same time it must be admitted that the only proper way to discuss this subject is first to remove it—a somewhat paradoxical statement, but perfectly clear to all who affect collars and are aware of their tendency to irritate one if one is at all heated, as they naturally are expected in debate. Thus the collar, if retained, would become one of the strongest arguments against itself.

Therefore, we will remove our collar and plunge at once into a discussion of the reasons for its existence, its good points and its shortcomings, and its ultimate fate, and endeavor, if possible, to decide whether the world would be any happier or brighter for the abolition of collars, or whether collars per se have added to the gaiety of nations.

The exact time when collars were first worn cannot be set down with any degree of certainty, but it is reasonable to assume that they came into being for utilitarian rather than for ornamental purposes. It is well known that the collars of our medieval ancestors were substantial enough to protect the throat from the swords and pikes of belligerent acquaintances, and it is to be conjectured that the immediate forbears of the modern collar had an equally useful if not so strenuous an origin. As a matter of fact, then, it would appear at first glance that the collar of today is but a degenerate descendant of such weighty progenitors; but a survey of the uses to which collars are now put should convince one that the plain linen band has grounds for existence equally well based with those of its great-great-great-great-grandparents.

In the first place, collars serve to overcome the shortcomings of nature. A six-inch neck with a protruding Adam's apple could never hope to get on in the world unassisted by a collar. Such a neck would be simply impossible. Similarly a one-inch neck with a four-inch chin. Some of our greatest financiers and most astute statesmen were it not for the ubiquitous collar. Hence the variety of collars, and hence the necessity for keeping one's neck well groomed. The farmers' boys who achieve national fame doubtless owe much to the collar they donned when they entered upon an urban career.

The rich men's sons who wear their talents and mien through life monuments to failure may justly attribute many of their errors to an ill-advised selection of collars. Everything has a place and every neck has a collar, but not any collar.

Again, collars are hygienic in the extreme. This may not appear true on the surface, but may safely be stated in view of the world discoveries that the medical gentlemen are now making. We live in a world of germs. The food we eat, the water we drink, the very air we breathe are all laden with insidious, wicked and death-dealing organisms of less than atomic corporeality but more than monstrous activity. Everything with which we come into contact is germinant, the wise men of the mortal coil us. Through the very pores of our skin death blows are delivered. Now, the neck is one of the weakest parts of the human body, and at the same time is one of the most important parts. The collar guards the neck against the satanic germ. Eureka! a new reason for wearing collars is discovered.

Still further, collars form an index to the progress of a nation. The peoples who wear collars are incomparably further advanced than the peoples who leave their necks as nature provided them. Even the savages who string beads into a species of collar are on a higher intellectual plane than their fellow savages who do not run to beads. In our own country a striking example of the importance of collars from a national standpoint is afforded by the Chinese exclusion act. Do you think we would ever have excluded the Chinese if they wore collars? But spread the news abroad. Should the benighted laundrymen of Chinatown ever learn that all their fellow countrymen need do in order to get an entrance into this desirable kingdom is to don collars, the well-laid plans of congress would be agony forever. Our collar makers would die; a merry time, but the rest of the nation would pay the piper.
