A large number of city charter bills were passed, including the amendment to the charter of Tillamook City.

No Cry for Referendum.

The 90-day period within which petitions may be filed with the Secretary of State for referendum on any enactment of the Legislature, will expire May 21.

Thus far there has been no visible movement to demand a referendum. Should a referendum be demanded it is not unlikely that the validity of the initiative and referendum will be tested in the courts.

The constitutionality of that amendment is seriously in question because the amendment was proposed in the Legislature of 1899, when other amendments were pending.

However, suggestions have been heard since the Legislature adjourned that the initiative and referendum might be employed. "What's the use of having that amendment," asked a man. "If we are afraid that we'll get it knocked out by using it?"

The act which has been most threatened by the referendum is the Lewis and Clark appropriation. Less than 440 electors, by signing a petition, may require a referendum. The hostility against that appropriation comes largely from persons who believe the Legislature did not enact sufficient legislation for taxation of corporations.
