

PANAMA CANAL.

Business View—It Will Cost Us a Million a Year.

Some economists are asking, Will the Panama canal pay? Presumably one is in a position to definitely answer that question. Colonel George Earl Church, writing in the Journal of the Royal Geographical Society, London, insists that it will not pay.

Ninety-six per cent of the inhabitants of the world, says Colonel Church, live north of the projected Panama canal route. What great trade is there likely to be, therefore, in a north to south or a south to north direction? Next, with regard to trade from east to west or from west to east, the three continents of Europe, Asia and Africa must be left out of the question. The distance from Plymouth in England to Yokohama in Japan is 1725 miles shorter by way of Suez than by way of Panama. Now Plymouth and Yokohama are as far apart as any two important ports to the three continents under consideration. If Plymouth-Yokohama trade does not go by way of Panama, what European-African-Asiatic trade will? We are cut down, therefore, to the trade to or from or between the Americas. This trade Colonel Church analyzes. He thinks that he finds that in the case of the ports on the western coast of South America it has been much exaggerated.

Proceeding along these lines of argument, Colonel Church reaches the conclusion that the toll receipts at Panama will bring in about \$900,000 a year. This is at the rate of a dollar a ton, the biggest possible rate. Meanwhile there will be interest—perhaps—on the \$180,000,000 or more which the canal will cost, and there will be maintenance expenses reaching \$2,000,000 a year. The deficit, therefore, will be over \$1,000,000 a year.

Murder in First Degree.

EUGENE, Or., March 4.—The case of E. E. Lyons occupied the entire time of the Circuit Court to-day. The entire forenoon was consumed in securing a jury, a number being examined and rejected for various reasons. Finally about noon the jury was completed and sworn, and in the afternoon the trial began. The attorneys for the prosecution and for the defense made very brief preliminary statements outlining the case to the jury, after which the taking of testimony began. The evidence was very much the same as has been published in the papers, except as to the fact of members of the family interfering with the Sheriff in the performance of his duty.

The aged and infirm father and mother of Lyons were brought into court and their testimony taken. It was a touching sight when Mrs. Lyons was brought in on pillows and for the first time since the tragedy saw her son. Tears stood in many eyes besides those of the prisoner and his mother. Her testimony was mostly on the point of her interference with the officer. She stoutly denied having attempted to prevent the Sheriff from performing his duty, but says she was asking the Sheriff for what crime he was arresting her son when the shot was fired.

The prosecution was brief in submitting its testimony and about 4 o'clock rested its case. The defense was also brief.

The jury was only out ten minutes. It returned into court with a verdict of murder in the first degree.

On Friday Lyons was sentenced to death to be hanged in six weeks.

By the capsizing of a flatboat used as a ferry at Spiers Falls, N. Y., nine men were drowned. There were 60 men in the boat. The current was very swift and a mass of ice and logs struck the craft. In the confusion, one man jumped out, and in jumping seized the tackle rope. This caused the boat to tip, half the men falling into the river and being carried down by the swift current. The bodies of Michael Kennedy and two Italian laborers have been found.

Rev. Father R. H. Bell, S. J., is at present receiving a great deal of attention in scientific circles in San Francisco, and, in fact, throughout the world by reason of his invention of a system of wireless telegraphy which his friends claim equals, and in some respects excels, the invention of the famous Marconi. Father Bell is at the head of the physics and chemistry department of Santa Clara college, near San Jose. His feat is that of inventing a delicate receiver and transmitter, and with them sending messages overland for forty miles. The initial message was sent from the capitol of St. Ignace college in San Francisco to the tower of the Santa Clara college. The most remarkable thing about the feat is the fact that it was done with an ordinary Bunsen battery of eleven cells, bearing from twenty to twenty-five voltage. Sending a message forty miles is equivalent in round numbers to sending a message 400 miles over the sea. Father Bell's friends believe this feat is greater than Marconi has accomplished over land.

Our Vast Internal Commerce.

The American people generally have no conception of the vastness of the internal commerce of the United States. They are made familiar from time to time with the foreign trade of the country, but it is only once in ten years that they are permitted to become acquainted with the enormous business that is done within our own borders. It will undoubtedly be a surprise to most of our people to know that the domestic trade of the United States is larger than that of any other country of the world by hundreds of millions of dollars and equal to the entire international commerce of the world.

Yet that is the fact according to official statistics. These place the internal commerce of the country at twenty thousand millions of dollars, in comparison with which our foreign commerce is a mere bagatelle. The astonishing figures include only one transaction in each article produced, while in fact a very large number of the articles produced pass through the hands of several "middlemen" between those of the producer and those of the consumer. If that fact be considered it will be seen that the estimate is less than it should be. The manufacturers of the United States are now about double those of the United Kingdom and nearly equal to those of France, Germany and Russia combined, while the value of the agricultural products of the United States far exceed that of any other single country.

These facts most forcibly demonstrate the overshadowing importance of the home market and show beyond question the necessity of preserving that market for the advantage and benefit of our own people. That has been the policy of the republican party and it has been splendidly justified by results. The Americans are the greatest consumers in the world. As a market for manufactures and choice foods ours measures three times that of the next best nation on the globe. Our 80,000,000 consume as much as 240,000,000 of the population of Great Britain. Could anything more strikingly enforce the wisdom and expediency of protecting the home market and maintaining the policy which has built it up? The manufacturer, the agricultural producer and the workman are all interested in maintaining this great home market, which enormously surpasses that of any other country and is steadily increasing.

Struck a Salt Mine.

No work is done at present on the well which is being bored for oil by H. Hirschburg on the B. F. Whitaker farm, five miles from Independence, on the Dallas road, says the Salem Statesman.

The well is now down 987 feet, and is four and one-fourth feet in diameter at the bottom and five and five-eighths feet at the top. Work was suspended a few days ago, and probably nothing will be done for about two months.

It seems that no one is sure just when the salt was struck, but along in June last its effect was noticed on the tools used in drilling and one of the men tasted the water and found it to be very briny. However, nothing was thought of this, and the walls were cased in as the drilling went deeper. Finally a large flow of salt water was struck and one day one of the helpers boiled one and a half gallons of the liquid until the water was all evaporated, and a full pound of pure salt was left. Samples of this salt were analyzed at the experiment station at Corvallis by the Southern Pacific Railway Co., and by the Salt Combine, and, as a result the salt was found to be chemically pure, analyzing 99 per cent pure. This analysis shows it to be one of the best salt wells in the United States in regard to the quality of the product. The opinion is that when the fresh water flow is shut off, a gallon of the liquid will make a pound of pure salt and possibly more, and the flow will furnish 1,000 gallons of the water per hour, which is expected to furnish at least 23,000 pounds of salt each day.

The experts and authorities who have investigated the matter, say that the salt well is worth more than they ever expected to realize from oil and advise Mr. Hirschburg to abandon his search for oil and turn his energy toward developing the salt industry. However, he does not intend to give up the search for oil, as he is satisfied it can be found. The formation drilled through was sandstone and shale, which is the same as found in oil regions, but it was too hard. If a strata of porous sandstone is struck a flow of oil will probably be struck also.

It was not expected that oil would be struck at a less depth than 1,000 feet, the projectors are not all discouraged, but consider the prospects good and are encouraged by the fact that a good flow of gas was struck, and also oil in considerable quantity, but not sufficient for commercial purposes. A new well is to be bored for oil about 500 feet away, and the old well will be used as a salt well.

The Siberian Railway Commission, on the occasion of its recent session in the 10th anniversary of the beginning of the work at Vladivostok, held under the presidency of the Czar, published figures concerning the cost to date. The Trans-Siberian Railway, with a length of 5628 versts (about 3000 miles), cost \$192,300,000, including the first order of rolling stock, though not including an appropriation of \$47,160,000 to reinforce its means of transport. The committee has likewise appropriated \$5,160,000 for river and harbor improvements, etc., \$15,320,000 for colonization purposes, and about \$2,500,000 for gold mine surveys, churches, relief, etc.
