The Tillamook Lumber Company is in the electric light system to stay, and in a few days will be in a position to give the city the best service it ever had, and at reasonable rates.

Mr. C. E. Hadley, who was granted a franchise on Monday evening for an electric light system, expects to put in a plant at the north fork of the Wilson river some time this summer, which will cost about \$10,000.

Taylor Wilson, who met with an accident in Grayson & McNamers' barn, by falling from the loft, was in a serious condition on Sunday, and was not expected to live. On Monday he took a turn for the better and is now considered out of danger.

Mr. A. G. Reynolds has sold his photo studio and business in this city to Mrs. A. H. Adams, who will conduct it in future. Mrs. Adams has had several years' experience in the business while in the East, and the patrons of this studio will be assured of receiving the same excellent grade of work in the future as in the past. Mr. Reynolds will remain in charge of the studio until about June 1st.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, with Mayor Talmage in the chair and Councilmen G. W. Grayson, H. W. Cary, E. Jenkins and F. L. Sappington present. The bills allowed were: Water rent, \$30; recorder's salary, \$15; marshal's salary, \$45; Cohn & Co., \$1.65; C. E. Reynolds, \$2; L. Olds, \$10.50. The ordinance to license auctioneers, making the charge \$12 per annum, or \$2 for every day, was passed to its final reading. An ordinance was read, and also passed to its final reading granting C. E. Hadley a franchise to install an electric light system. It was for 99 years and the ordinance did not specify any time that the system should be put in.

Died, at Idaho Falls, Idaho, on April 6th, Mr. Leonard Crenshaw, father of Mr. Henry Crenshaw. He was born in Jefferson county, Iowa, on Nov. 2, 1846. The deceased gentleman was well-known in Tillamook, being a resident of this county for several years previous to his moving to Idaho some ten years ago. He owned the North Yamhill toll road and operated the stage and carried the mail. At one time he owned quite a bit of property in the city and had an interest in the Tillamook Lumber Company, and it was Mr. Crenshaw who bought the present electric light plant. The deceased died on his wife's birthday, and he was a man who was greatly respected by all who knew him.

Editorial Tit Bits.

"Press Day" at the circuit court Monday ought to be a drawing card.

It looked on Saturday as though people were held responsible for their political sins.

Rule or ruin politics in Tillamook had another spike put into its political coffin on Saturday.

As the HEADLIGHT predicted, the delegates to the congressional convention go to Eugene unpledged.

Say, Green, were those proxies you had in your pocket loaded with Hermann bombs, but didn't get a chance to explode?

Eddy was the political hero in Tillamook on Saturday after he had given the republicans who desert their party a tongue thrashing.

It looks as though the republicans are ready to kiss and make up after the factional and personal fight of several years that set them scrapping.

The delegates from Tillamook to the congressional convention include four attorneys and one test puller, and the latter is a Lamb at that.

Friend, Con Desmond, attended the convention on Saturday, and we wish to state it wasn't tanglefoot politics which made him feel happy, even though he was a staunch and true Eddy man.

Those who wanted to do a somersault into Binger Hermann's band wagon did not stop to consider whether he was of the same opinion now that he was a few years ago when he told some of our citizens that "Tillamook bar was [straight enough]."

Frank Richardson showed good politics at the convention on Saturday, when he saw that his faction was in a hopeless minority, by proposing that the rules be suspended and the nominees of the majority faction be elected by acclamation. Shake, Frank.

It may surprise some of our readers, but the HEADLIGHT, although a staunch and loyal friend of Mr. Eddy, is not very anxious to see him get the nomination for congress. We need more men of Mr. Eddy's caliber in Tillamook, men who can push themselves to the front with their own ability and industry.

What Tillamook is wanting is persons who are ready to invest in new industries and who, thereby, create wealth, give employment and make a weekly pay roll. Most every business and profession is overdone in Tillamook City, and unless new industries are started up no one need expect that business will boom this summer.

The HEADLIGHT may be wrong, but it looks to us as though another electric light plant in a city the size of Tillamook is crowding the procession at an awfully rapid rate. If the money was put into some new manufacturing enterprise, such as a condensed milk factory, saw mill, etc., which would give a pay roll and help increase the population of the city, then, and, probably not before, will two electric light plants pay in Tillamook city, for with two plants running neither can get a monopoly of the business.

The Herald this week advocates that the people of Tillamook City, to induce new industries to locate here, offer saw mill sites to those who want to go into the milling business. That would be a good move, but it is commencing at the wrong end. If Tillamook City ever expects to become a manufacturing city it will have to show a much more generous spirit in the future than in the past, and if the business men were putting their heads together and devising some plans whereby a tug boat could be kept here to tow lumber schooners over the bar, the California lumber buyers who are looking to Tillamook to secure their lumber, would readily enter into contracts to take the entire cut of several mills.

In the County Schools.

Early in March blank reports were mailed from County Superintendent G. B. Lamb's office to the various county schools of the county requesting the teachers to report the condition of their respective schools. With very few exceptions, the teachers reported promptly at the end of the month, and following will be found the substance of the reports:

Fourteen schools were reported exhibiting some interesting facts. 324 pupils were enrolled and the average daily attendance was 259. Thus it will be seen that quite a large number were out of school each day during the month. Much valuable time was lost by absence and lateness at school, there being 135 cases of the latter. The child is forming habits that will materially effect his success in life. If he is permitted to arrive at school late or remain at home on some slight pretext, a habit is being formed which will lead him to neglect the responsibilities that come with maturity, thus rendering still less his chances of future success.

Parents, are you so indifferent to the welfare of your child as to permit him to be out of school unless the case be one of the most urgent necessity? Several cases were reported in which children were taken out of school for the summer work at home. In one instance a boy 14 years of age was expelled from school for willful disobedience to the directions of the teacher. Such cases should not occur. The parents should co-operate with the teacher in governing the pupil. To allow a pupil to break the law of right and duty in the school is to encourage him in disobedience of the laws of the country when he attains to manhood. One of the chief functions of the public school is to train the child for good citizenship, which requires recognition of law.

Three schools are to be commended for having no cases of tardiness. In District No. 19, time lost by absence is very large, considering the small enrollment. District No. 23 has a most excellent record in that respect. The Oretown school (district No. 6) is to be commended upon the neat appearance of the school building, inside and out. Fresh paint and new furniture has been added, making the school room bright and cheerful for teacher and pupil. Several other districts have made much needed improvements to the school grounds.

The condition of the schools for the month was satisfactory. Teachers are earnestly working for the good of their schools, and the parents and school officers generally manifest public spirit by rendering assistance. It is to be regretted, however, that occasionally a parent is found who will not believe in the teacher's ability to teach his child. Such an idea is often obtained through the child's inability to understand the teacher's motive. To such a parent I would suggest that you do not talk about the shortcomings of the teacher in the presence of the pupil, but go quietly to the teacher and talk the matter over in a mild manner. An understanding can generally be reached.

There were six graduates from the 8th grade at the last examination. The diplomas were granted to the Misses Eva and Lena Bunn and Helen West, of Beaver, and the Misses Maggie and Edith Watt and Waldo Doughty, of Bay City.

Teachers' salaries are much better this year than last. It is a matter of encouragement that school boards no longer look for the low priced teacher, but one of ability, regardless the cost. A teacher lacking in preparation and professional pride is costly at any price, however low it may be.

The last legislature having changed the time of making the apportionment of school funds no further apportionments will be made until after the annual school meetings in June. This will relieve most of the districts of the inconvenience of having on hand more than the law allows. School boards may calculate on drawing about \$5 per capita at that time.

The late school law contains a provision whereby school districts may consolidate. There are several localities in this county where this can be done to advantage, and it is to be hoped that a number of the districts will avail themselves of this privilege, as schools can be maintained cheaper and much more satisfactory under such a plan.

One of the most elaborate Nihilist conspiracies of assassination that has ever come to light in the Russian Empire has been unearthed by the secret police agents of the Czar. A conspiracy has been formed to murder several high officials of the government and, it is said, this was to have been followed by the killing of the Czar. Among those marked for slaughter were the Minister of the Interior and the Minister of the Religion, both of whom have incurred the enmity of the Nihilists.

An anti-race suicide club has been formed by students of Columbia University, eligibility for membership in which may be summed up thus: If you are single you agree to marry as soon as your income will allow, and your family must not number less than five; if you are married you agree to stay married even until the third or fourth wife, and the same family requirements prevail. It is said that the son of president Palma was one of the first members of the club and that President Roosevelt is to be elected an honorary vice-president.

Robert George, a young man about 22 years of age, was instantly killed on Saturday evening while trying to board a moving train on the road of the Cathlamet Logging Company, on Elkman Creek. He had been running a donkey engine in the camp, had finished his day's work, and, with others, was on his way from the woods. As a log train was going by, he tried to jump on the engine but missed his hold and fell between the cars and was crushed to death. The body was taken to his home at St. Helens for burial. His father, who was engineer of the engine drawing the log train was a witness of his son's death.

At 1 o'clock Sunday morning fire was discovered on the third floor of the Mount Shasta Hotel, California, and in spite of all efforts made to control the water it could not be controlled, and in a few minutes had crossed the street on the south, to the Gongwer building on the north, to the Thompson building on the northwest to the Shasta Annex, and on the southwest to the Western Hotel. Heroic work was done, but it swept everything in all directions, pushed fire walls and destroyed brick, stone and concrete buildings as if they were pine. At 2 A. M. the fire had spent its fury and was under control. The fire spread so fast that people had to run for their lives. No lives were lost.
