Circuit Court.

Judge Burnett convened circuit court on Monday, which was in session until Tuesday, there being only one criminal and four civil cases on the docket, which were disposed of as follows:
Fred C. Baker, plaintiff, vs. R. M. Watson, defendant, action for libel. B. L. Eddy for plaintiff and T. B. Handley and C. W. Talmage for defendant. The demurr of the defendant was overruled and was given until the 20th to answer and the plaintiff until the 30th to reply.
State of Oregon vs. M. Potter, malicious mischief. B. L. Eddy for defendant. This was a jury case, and the defendant was found guilty of destroying a coat at Three Rivers by shooting at it while he was driving along the road, which belonged to T. J. Owen. Defendant and his witnesses set up the plea that he was shooting at a kingfisher and did not see the coat. Judge Burnett fined Potter \$50, which is the lowest fine for such an offense. Potter paid the fine, preferring that to spending 25 days in durance vile.
R. M. Watson, plaintiff, vs. F. C. Baker, defendant, action for libel. T. B. Handley and C. W. Talmage for plaintiff, and B. L. Eddy defendant. The defendant applied for a continuance of the case on the ground that one of his witnesses, J. W. Ferry, had been detained at Astoria and could not make connections. The court continued the case.
Theodore Kingsley, plaintiff, vs. The Tillamook Logging Co., defendants. B. L. Eddy for plaintiff and Claude Thayer and G. O. Nolan for defendant. This

case was tried before a jury on Tuesday, and Kingsley was given a verdict in the sum of \$384.74.
W. J. Smith, plaintiff, vs. Claude Thayer and Clark E. Hadley, defendants, action for money. A. W. Severance and B. L. Eddy, attorneys for plaintiff. The case was continued.
