W. R. Illingsworth has received notice that the Secretary of the Interior has confirmed the decision of the Commissioner in his timber claim, which was decided in his favor. This is one of the claims which was contested by Hayes.
Next Sunday, April 26, at 11 a.m., the members of the United Brethren congregation will gather with the Methodists in the M.E. church. The pastors of these churches will deliver addresses and afterwards administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
A reception was given at the school house on Saturday evening to Miss Annie and Oliver Waldvogel, who will leave for Coos county in the near future. Quite a large number of the pupils of the public school were present and a nice time was participated in.
The last edition of R. L. Polk & Co.'s Gazetteer, a business directory of Oregon and Washington, came to hand on Wednesday, and is a valuable book for business men. It contains a nice description of Tillamook and gives the names and occupations of business and professional men in this city.
Mrs. Roach and son, C. H. Hicks, of Bay City, have joined the procession and left Tillamook, going out on the steamer on Sunday. Mrs. Roach goes to Centralia, Wash., where she joins her husband.

Mr. Hicks sold his interest in the store to his partner, Peter Nelson, and has resigned as postmaster.
The steamer Sue H. Elmore, which left on Saturday morning, went on the mud flats and remained fast until the afternoon tide. Her passenger list included Miss McKinley, Otto Walther, A. Schroeder, J. Duncan, H. Edmunds and wife, H. Sweet, H. V. Gist, S. Downs, R. Brenner, F. N. Bowen, F. H. Dayton and C. F. Goddard.
The only business before the city council on Monday night was an ordinance introduced by Councilman G. Grayson amending the ordinance passed at a previous meeting granting Clark E. Hadley an electric light franchise. The new ordinance stipulates that the plant is to be installed within 18 months. The ordinance was passed by unanimous consent of the council, as was also the one repealing the ordinance passed at the previous meeting.
At a meeting on Tuesday afternoon of the Board of Trade in Mr. C. Thayer's office, a proposition was made by Mr. J. B. Wetherell, a geologist and oil expert, to bore for oil on Mr. R. M. Haunerkrat's place. Mr. Wetherell told the Board that he was well pleased with the surface indications and expected to find oil. He made a proposition whereby he would put in a plant, in conjunction with Mr. E. S. McCoy, to cost \$6000, provided the citizens would raise \$2000

and put it in a stock company. The latter sum to be used for developing work and not drawn upon until the machinery is on the ground, which would be about four weeks. Mr. Haunerkrat was asked, supposing they found oil on his land, what per centage he would require, and his reply was 15 per cent and that he would not make any charge for the purpose of making experiments. The Board looked favorably upon the proposition and appointed Messrs. T. B. Handley, C. Thayer and C. W. Talmage to draw up a prospectus and Messrs. A. McNair, B. O. Snuffer and D. T. Edmunds to solicit the people and ascertain whether the \$2000 can be raised.
