

No Condensed Factory for Him.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT. No condensed milk factory for me. Why? Because I can make more out of my milk.

The butter made at the creamery in Fairview from April 1st to close of the year 1902 from my milk brought me \$1.11 and a fraction per 100lbs. of milk. Then I had skim milk left.

And now, to come at the value of it, I must give a little of my experience.

For several years I kept no pigs and raised no calves, but gave my skim milk to my hens. I charge my hens with the wheat I buy, and give them credit for eggs and chicks sold. For the year 1900 they had to their credit \$228.00 above the cost of wheat.

In 1901 I thought I would try feeding the skim milk to pigs and calves. So I bought two pigs and raised my calves. In the fall they were worth about \$80. Now we will see how the hens came out. They got no milk, but they had \$244.00 worth of wheat and had to their credit \$18 above the cost of the wheat. So I said it did not pay to feed the milk to calves and pigs as well as to hens.

So, in 1902, I kept no pigs and vealed the calves at six weeks and gave the milk to the hens. Result: Fed hens \$217 worth of wheat, sold \$372 worth of eggs, leaving to their credit a balance of \$155, against \$18 the year before. Now take the \$137 difference in the hens' credits for the two years and add to that \$40.00 for year calves, and you have \$177 dollars for the skim milk, or over \$1.11 for the whole milk, makes \$1.91 per hundred pounds of milk.

Now the condensed factory won't do that. And while the skim milk fed to the pigs and calves paid 28 cents per hundred, it paid most three times that fed to the hens. Of course the hens and calves got part of their living off what they picked up on the place.

Digging Out the Dead.

FRANK, Alberta, April 30.—The minds of the people of Frank, what remains of them, are blank in consequence of the awful disaster of yesterday morning when a great portion of Turtle Mountain slid across the valley of Crow's Nest Pass, bringing death to 63, for the total has now grown to that number, of the residents of the community, and doing damage so great that it cannot yet all be told.

Throughout yesterday and at intervals during the night and today, the slide continued with the result that Frank has been depopulated. Many residents went to Blairmore, a village two miles distant, where they obtained shelter, while many more left the country altogether, going to distant points. Few of these are expected to return. Those who remained were principally persons in business, who could ill afford to desert their interests, or were possessed of that spirit which prompts men to remain where life is in danger for the sake of their fellowmen or to do the work which must be done in the interest of relatives of those who have been sacrificed.

But two residences in the town were occupied last night, and they by people not their owners, but who were of the stuff which does not desert so long as a duty remains to be done. Hotels out of the range of danger were filled, but all others had fled.

Today the scene has been one of desolation, hard to be realized except by comparison to the recent volcanic eruptions in the West Indies, though on a much smaller scale. Those who had not taken the precaution to preserve their epidermis by placing distance between themselves and harm continued the search for the victims of the disaster, but with poor results. But two more bodies have thus far been recovered. One was that of F. Farrington, a minor. The other man was mangled beyond recognition. This makes the total number of bodies recovered nine. One more body was today identified as that of Francois Rochette, a laborer in the employ of the coal company. But one of the bodies recovered remains unidentified. The dismembered portion of one body has been found, but the rest of the body could not be found.

The Santa Maria volcano in Guatemala has broken out again. The news was brought by the steamer San Juan, which left Champerico on the afternoon of April 17, the day the fresh eruption is said to have taken place. Couriers from the interior brought word that the volcano had broken out, that a storm of ashes was falling, and that the inhabitants of the surrounding country were panic-stricken. The atmosphere in the direction of the volcano was thick at Champerico when the San Juan sailed.

At Hartford, Conn., with the bridal party approaching the chancel and the church filled with fashionable people, the Rev. Dr. James J. Goodwin, of Christ Episcopal Church, refused to perform the ceremony and dismissed the guests, because, in reading the marriage license, he found the bridegroom had been divorced ten years previously. The wedding was to have been that of A. Lincoln Chase, manager of the department store, and Miss Gladys A. G. Geer, daughter of one of the oldest residents of Hartford.

Quaint Features of Life.

Germany has a pay wedding, at which the bride receives her guests with a basin before her, in which each person entering deposits a jewel, a silver spoon or a piece of money. In some parts of Germany the rule is that the expenses of the marriage feast shall be met by each guest paying for what he eats or drinks. The prices paid for viands and drink are high and the young couple often make a handsome profit out of their wedding, realizing a sum sufficient to start them nicely in life.

On account of the thieving propensities of the "paleface" the Indians have abandoned their old burial custom of depositing valuables belonging to the deceased with the corpse. The Breeze of Bliss, I. T., is authority for the statement that the Indians now place money in the bank and put the certificate of deposit in the coffin for the dead Indian to take along to the happy hunting grounds, as they have found this to be a much safer method.

The Philadelphia Record recalls some political prayers made by chaplains of legislative bodies. It was inoffensive, but in poor taste, when a chaplain in the Delaware legislature prayed: "O Lord, thy servants are in a deadlock. Give them the key." During the last Cuban insurrection a chaplain in a legislature prayed "that the United States might supply with arms, if necessary, those in Cuba who were struggling for liberty," and that he "might insist upon upholding the Monroe doctrine." The chaplain of the Illinois house prayed God to "contract the capacious maw of the penal, reformatory, charitable and educational institutions of Illinois. May they learn to be content with less money, and may we who refuse to worship a golden calf also refuse to worship gold in any other form." The chaplain of a populist convention in Arkansas prayed that the state might be delivered from democratic control. In the Colorado legislature Dean Peck prayed that the populists and democrats might be resigned to their fate. A populist chaplain in Kansas prayed God to "palsy the brain and still the heart of the treasonable conspirators," to wit: the republicans. In a Massachusetts campaign a minister prayed for the triumph of righteousness, and then broke out: "O Lord, what's the use of beating about the bush? Give us Briggs for governor."

The largest mule in the world, a product of Missouri, is to form an impressive feature of the art exhibit at the St. Louis show. The animal is barely three years old, stands eighteen hand high, weighs 1,841 pounds and has a rear pressure of 282 pounds to the foot.

John Firman, 25 years old, living at Paterson, N. J., has two hearts beating in his own breast. He is a fine specimen of physical manhood, and constantly enjoys good health. In 1898 it was decided that he had a double heart when he was examined for enlistment with the Second Regiment, at Paterson. Since then Firman has been more or less interesting to physicians. An X-ray photograph shows the most peculiar heart formation the doctors of Paterson have ever seen or heard of.

A comparatively new South Dakota industry which has as yet attracted little attention is pigeon raising, which is carried on extensively by the Mennonite colonies in Hutchinson county. The industry is proving very profitable, as is shown by the record made by the colonies during the last twelve months. During that time one of the colonies cleared \$1,100 from the sale of pigeons. Another cleared \$1,400. Four other colonies in the county are also engaged in raising pigeons for eastern markets. It is estimated that the pigeon industry of Hutchinson county brings into the county an aggregate of at least \$6,000 each year.

When the food value of milk is considered it is remarkable that it is not more largely used by those who have the facilities for producing it at first cost. Comparing its flesh, fat and bone forming qualities, and the average price at which it is sold, with other foods on the market, the advantage is largely in its favor. Nothing to be found on the farm is more easily digested than pure sweet milk. It is nature's combination for growing animals, arranged in the proper proportion. In an average sample, we find almost 4 per cent of protein or flesh-forming substance; 5 per cent of carbohydrates, or starchy matter, consisting chiefly of phosphates and chlorides of potash, lime and soda.

The Interior Department has decided to create a forest reserve in Southwestern Oregon, in the Rogue River country, a strong recommendation to that effect having been made by the Geological Survey. The first step in this direction has just been taken by Land Commissioner Richards, who has ordered the temporary withdrawal from all entry of practically the entire Rogue River mountain country in Curry, Josephine and Coos counties, extending from Bone Mountain, in Coos county, southward to the California line. The exterior limits of the withdrawal embrace 1,249,920 acres of land, mostly mountainous and heavily covered with timber, but a great portion of the land within the withdrawal is held in private ownership, much of it having been originally included in the railroad grant, and is held now by the company or its grantees.
