

**ANOTHER CONTESTANT**  
**After the Tillamook Settler's Timber Claims.**

OREGON CITY, May 18.—W. G. Howell, of Portland, today filed contests against 82 of the famous Hayes' timber claims in Tillamook County. Charles E. Hayes some time ago filed contests about 90 of these claims, but the Department of the Interior has decided adversely in about 50, leaving 40 cases now pending at Washington. Junior contests were subsequently brought against many of these claims by G. O. Nolan and W. J. Law and the same have not been decided. Howell asks that the applications of Hayes et al be dismissed as fraudulent and void and that in the meantime no decree in favor of any of the contestants be allowed until he, Howell, has a hearing in the proceeding.

In contesting the title to these lands Howell has prepared a printed form in which are set forth allegations of conspiracy and collusion between the parties who have figured in the contests up to the present time in an alleged effort to defraud the Government of these valuable timber lands. The contestant alleges that in each of the 82 cases, the entry made was fraudulent, collusive and speculative and not in good faith, that the entrymen never went upon said land prior to making his entry nor did he personally examine the land as required by law; that the said entryman, before making application, conspired with one Claude Thayer, Maurice Leach, Clark Hadley, George Cohn et al, to obtain fraudulent title to the land described and to divide the proceeds of the sale of the said land and that the application was made in pursuance of such conspiracy with said parties above named; that the entryman knowingly and fraudulently subscribed to the required affidavit and in doing so committed a fraud against the Government.

Continuing the contestant says: "Affiant further alleges that one C. E. Hayes, and one G. O. Nolan, and one W. J. Law, have filed a pretended contest or contests against said timber land application; that said contests of said Hayes, Nolan and Law, so filed are collusive and speculative, and that the same were made in the interest of said entryman and of said Claude Thayer, Maurice Leach, Clark Hadley and George Cohn et al, who are co-conspirators in trying to obtain title to the land above described and that said contests were made in the interests of the above named parties and for the purpose of delay and not in good faith.

"That all the pretended contests filed by the said Charles E. Hayes, G. O. Nolan and W. J. Law were filed for the purpose of preventing the lawful entry of said lands by other parties, duly qualified, who were not parties to said fraudulent conspiracy.

"That said timber land application is illegal, fraudulent and void as are also said pretended contests of Charles E. Hayes, G. O. Nolan and W. J. Law, and this said contestant is ready to prove at such time and place as may be named by the Register and Receiver for a hearing in such case, and hereby respectfully requests that a hearing be ordered upon the allegations made herein, in order that the contestant may make proof of the truthfulness of said allegations and to end that said timber land application No. — may be declared forfeited and cancelled, and that said pretended contests may be dismissed as fraudulent and void, that in the meantime no decree in favor of any of said contestants, under the pretended preference right arising out of any of said contests, or otherwise, be allowed, the said contestant hereby agreeing to pay the costs of such a hearing."

**Taxes on Estates.**

SALEM, Or., May 17.—One of the important acts of the last Legislature which will go into effect on May 21 is the inheritance tax law. All county courts and administrators will be governed by the new law, but a large majority of the estates which will hereafter be probated will not be subject to the tax.

The tax applies only to estates with an appraised value of more than \$10,000 and the tax is to be collected only upon the excess of \$5000 that may go to any one person. In the case of an inheritance by an uncle, aunt, nephew or niece the tax will apply to the excess of \$2000 passing to any one person. On bequests to relatives farther removed or to strangers the tax will apply to the excess of \$500 passing to any one person.

A majority of the estates that come within the jurisdiction of the county courts of this state are appraised at \$10,000 or less. Inheritance amounting to more than \$5000 are comparatively few, and when that amount has been deducted for each heir the remainder, in most cases, will not form the basis for a very large tax.

The inheritance tax law applies to all property coming within the jurisdiction of the Probate Courts of this state which shall pass by will or statutes of inheritance, or by deed or gift in contemplation of death or intended to take effect after the death of the grantor, gifts to charitable institutions excepted.

**A Kansas Experiment.**

The following bill has been introduced into the House of Representatives, Kan., by one of its members, who claims that farmers are being held up by chicken fanciers and made to pay exorbitant prices for fowls of popular breeds, as settings of eggs. He thinks the state could afford to establish a plant and introduce them at normal prices. This is the bill:

"That the governor establish a state chicken hatchery for the purpose of raising Wyandott, Blue Leghorn, B. P. Rock, Cochon and whatever breed he sees fit. Said stock shall be used to stock the farms of Kansas and also for supplying private individuals at reasonable prices. The hatchery plant to be established at Oberlin, Kan. Six thousand dollars is asked for the establishment of the plant. Immediately after this law goes into effect, the governor shall appoint a superintendent at \$1,200; an assistant at \$900 a year; and every two years thereafter, these officers shall be elected by the people."

It seems that if it goes into effect a woman is to fill the head chair, and as women are most interested in poultry this is one office she surely is born to fill. It may be that if Kansas gets this idea through, other states will look up the matter also.

There is need of better poultry on the farm. Poor grade fowls lower the market. Everywhere you look along the poultry houses, back or in front of the market place, it is scrub stock, create piled on crate. A market can be overstocked with the scrubs, but never with first class birds.

**Tit Bits.**

It will be a good joke on Governor Chamberlain if the Port of Portland Commission bill is declared unconstitutional. When the bill was before the legislature it was said it was framed in the interest of the politicians, and the labor organizations were fighting the old board and wanted to see the members ousted. When the bill came before the governor for his approval, he was between the devil and the deep blue sea so allowed it to become a law without his signature.

The Iowa idea on the revision of the tariff seems to be growing in popularity. This idea is to take the duty off on articles that can be manufactured as cheaply in this country as abroad. It is understood that President Roosevelt is in harmony with this idea.

Colonel Taylor, with a force of constabulary, defeated several bands of fanatics in the interior of Cebu Island, May 14, killing 20 and wounding several of them. A few of the constabulary were wounded. Lieutenant Walker is missing. The fanatics repeatedly charged the constabulary line.

So large was the immigration at New York last week that the commissioners of immigration refused to allow them to land. Nine thousand six hundred immigrants arrived last Wednesday and only 5,559 were allowed to land, as the force of government employes at Ellis Island was too small to care for them.

There seems to be no doubt that Russia, in spite of its protests to the contrary, is determined not to evacuate Manchuria. After a movement of troops from New Chwang into the country they counter-marched and occupied the forts that Russia has been building at the last named place.

There have been conflicting statements as to the price that the United States paid for Louisiana. A statement comes that Napoleon at first asked 100,000,000 francs for it. As England was about to blockade the mouth of the Mississippi river, he accepted the offer of Monroe and Livingston of 60,000,000 francs for it. This is equivalent to \$15,000,000.

At Boulder, Mont., Alex. Waymire has been sent to the insane asylum. He was employed on the Great Northern at the Boulder tunnel. He conceived an idea that a freight would meet the express in the tunnel. He flagged every train that came along. His mania became so intense that it upset his reason on other things.
